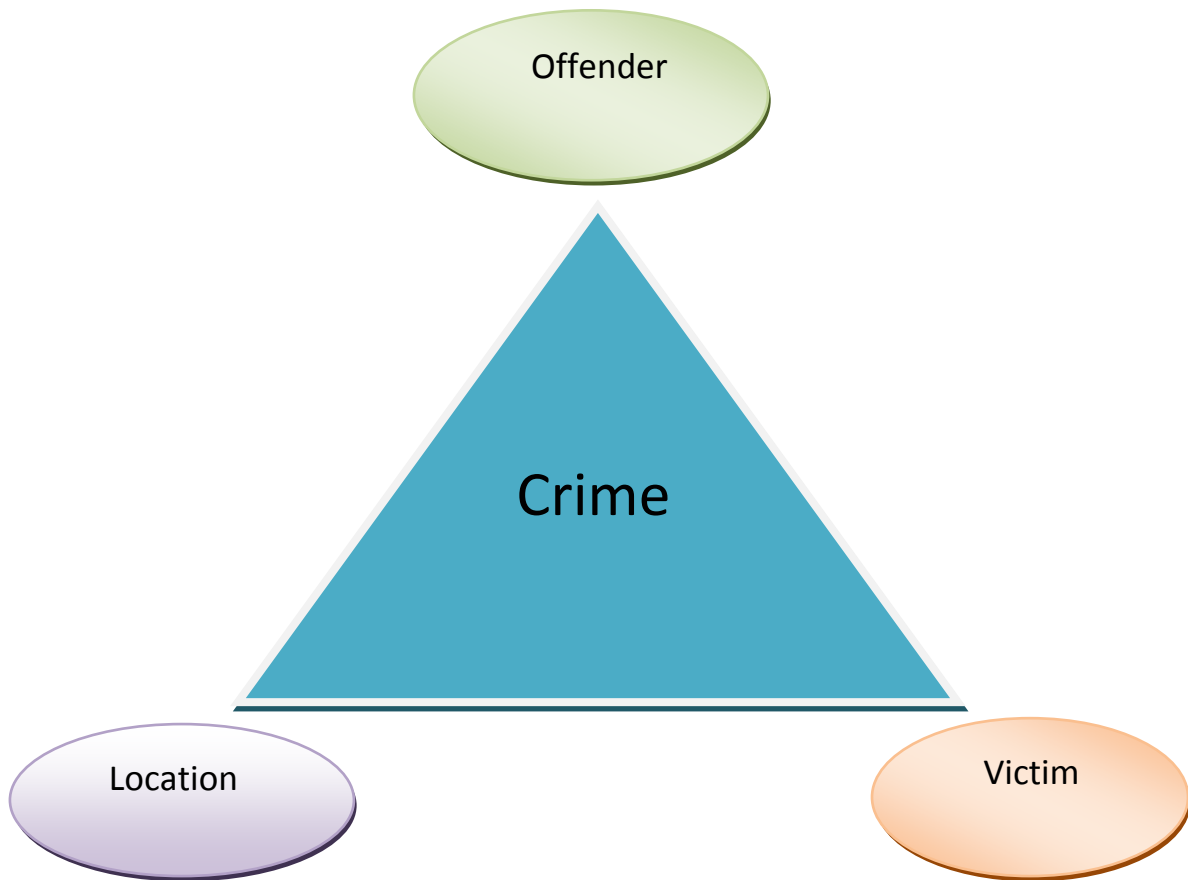


Three requirements for crime to occur
