WHY DEVELOP GUIDING PRINCIPLES/VISION STATEMENTS?



 IS THE COLLECTIVE UNDERSTANDING OF THE IDEAL FUTURE OF A COMMUNITY



- ESTABLISHES A TONE FOR THE PLAN
 AND THE PLANNING PROCESS
- ARE THE CORE VALUES THAT PROVIDE A FOUNDATION FOR THE TMP
- ARE THE BASIS OF ALL DECISIONS AND ACTIONS

PSRC - TRANSPORTATION 2040 STRATEGY



- A COMPREHENSIVE
 THREE KEY **DOCUMENT THAT** STATES THE **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIONS FOR THE** REGION TO MEET ITS MOBILITY NEEDS.
 - **STRATEGIES**
 - 1. CONGESTION AND MOBILITY
 - 2. ENVIRONMENT
 - **FUNDING**

SAMPLE GUIDING PRINCIPLES FROM TACOMA'S LAST PLAN




- Achieve a multimodal transportation system that efficiently moves people and goods with optimum safety and speed, maximizes the conservation of energy, and minimally disrupts the desirable features of the environment
- Tacoma is a world-class walking and biking community in which pedestrians and bicyclists are top priorities in transportation planning. Tacoma's transportation system is useable and welcoming to people of all abilities. Streets accommodate bicyclists in large numbers, sidewalks are user friendly, and residents share the road safely and are fully mobile without an automobile

GOALS AND POLICIES



TRANSPORTATION ELEMENT (WAC 365-196-430):

 The transportation element should contain goals and policies to guide the development and implementation of the transportation element. The goals and policies should be consistent with statewide and regional goals and policies.





GOALS AND POLICIES SHOULD ADDRESS THE FOLLOWING:

- Roadway and roadway design that provide safe access and travel for all users, including motorists, transit vehicles and riders, bicyclists, and pedestrians
- Public transportation, including public transit and passenger rail, intermodal transfers, and multimodal access
- Bicycle and pedestrian travel
- Transportation demand management, including 3Es



GOALS AND POLICIES SHOULD ADDRESS THE FOLLOWING:

- Freight mobility including port trucks, truck, air, rail, and water-based freight;
- Transportation finance including strategies for addressing impacts of development through concurrency, impact fees, and other mitigation; and
- Policies to preserve the functionality of state highways within the local jurisdiction



BOTTOM LINE:

- Goals and polices define priorities in written terms.
- GMA requires development regulations, capital budget decisions and other activities to be consistent with goals and policies.
- There is no clear cut rule about how many policies you should have, but if there is too many polices to evaluate whether they are meaningfully implemented, then clearly there are too many.

- Link to land use create a transportation system that is united with Kirkland's land use plan
- Be sustainable as the transportation system is planned, built and maintained, provide mobility for all using reasonably assured revenue sources while minimizing environmental impacts.
- Be an active partner coordinate with a broad range of groups to help meet Kirkland's transportation goals
- Transportation measurement measure and report on progress toward achieving goals and actions
