



## Legislation Passed January 12, 2010

The Tacoma City Council, at its regular City Council meeting of January 12, 2010, adopted the following resolutions and/or ordinances. 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### **Resolution No. 37967**

Authorizing the execution of an amendment to the grant agreement with the National Association of Child Care Resource & Referral Agencies, in the amount of \$13,090, for a cumulative total of \$379,605; accepting and depositing said sum into the Human Rights and Human Services Special Revenue Fund, to support the further development and maintenance of military-certified child care providers in Pierce County through December 15, 2009.

**Proposition No. 1 - Educational Programs and Operations Replacement Levy**

The Board of Directors of Tacoma School District No. 10 adopted Resolution No. 1858 concerning educational funding. If approved, Proposition No. 1 would permit the District to maintain educational programs and small classes, fund day to-day operations, including teachers, instructional aides, librarians, nurses, technology support, athletics, arts, music and safety programs, textbooks and classroom materials, and maintain playgrounds/playfields, by authorizing the levy of the following excess taxes, to replace an expiring levy, on all taxable property within the District:

The Board of Directors of Tacoma School District No. 10 adopted Resolution No. 1859 concerning school facility improvements and technology upgrades. If approved, Proposition No. 2 would permit the District to renovate or replace three schools and, district-wide, address health, safety, and security upgrades, energy-efficient heating/lighting, roofs, electrical, plumbing, playground/ playfield and technology improvements by authorizing the levy of the following excess taxes upon all taxable property within the District:

## **RESOLUTION NO. 37967**

A RESOLUTION relating to child care services; authorizing the execution of an amendment to the grant agreement with the National Association of Child Care Resource & Referral Agencies, in the amount of \$13,090, for a cumulative grant total of \$379,605; and accepting said sum and depositing same into the Human Rights and Human Services Special Revenue Fund to support the further development and maintenance of military-certified child care in the community that will be accessed by locally stationed personnel.

WHEREAS, on January 13, 2009, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 37708, authorizing the execution of a grant agreement with the National Association of Child Care Resource & Referral Agencies (“NACCRRRA”), in the amount of \$314,155, for the development of military-certified child care providers in Pierce County (“County”), and

WHEREAS, on December 1, 2009, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 37934, authorizing the execution of an amendment to the NACCRRRA grant agreement, in the amount of \$26,180, for a cumulative total of \$340,335, to support the further development and maintenance of military-certified child care providers in the County, and

WHEREAS, on January 5, 2010, the NACCRRRA grant agreement was again amended, in the amount of \$26,180, for a cumulative grant total of \$366,515, to support the further development and maintenance of military-certified child care in the County, and

WHEREAS, through the NACCRRRA, the army has chosen to pay a few select sites across the country to develop additional certified slots in the community so that locally stationed personnel can have equal access to high-quality, army-subsidized child care, and

WHEREAS the NACCRRRA wishes to amend the agreement, in the amount of \$13,090, for a cumulative grant total of \$379,605, to continue developing and maintaining military-certified child care providers in the County; Now, Therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TACOMA:

Section 1. That the proper officers of the City are authorized to execute an amendment to the grant agreement with the National Association of Child Care Resource & Referral Agencies, in the amount of \$13,090, for a cumulative grant total of \$379,605, said document to be substantially in the form of the proposed grant amendment on file in the office of the City Clerk.

Section 2. That the proper officers of the City are authorized to accept the sum of \$13,090 and deposit said funds into the Human Rights and Human Services Special Revenue Fund, for the development of military-certified child care providers in Pierce County through December 15, 2009.



**RECOMMENDATION:** The Public Works - Engineering Division/Special Projects recommends that a contract in the amount of \$771,609.53, including sales tax, be awarded to low bidder **Ebenal General, Inc.**, for Foss Harbor Esplanade Site 11.

**EXPLANATION:** This contract shall generally consist of constructing a 304-foot long esplanade with lighting, railing and park benches. The project will also install thirty-two new piles to support the new Esplanade.

**COMPETITIVE BIDDING:** Specification No. PW09-0836F was opened December 18, 2009. Twenty-five (25) companies were invited to bid in addition to normal advertising of the project. Nine (9) proposals were received. Ebenal General, Inc. submitted the lowest responsive bid. The City is awarding the Base Bid and Alternate Number one (1) only.


The recommended award is 32.3 percent below the pre-bid estimate.

**RECOMMENDATION:** The Public Works, Science and Engineering Division recommends a contract be awarded to low bidder **Wm. Dickson Co. of Tacoma, WA**, for construction of a surface water treatment facility at the corner of S 23<sup>rd</sup> and Ferry Streets. The contract amount reflects a base total award of \$754,290.54, including sales tax.

**EXPLANATION:** The project includes construction of a system to treat surface water from a 50 acre high use area using filtration through treatment media. The project will also include relocation of existing utilities, connection of the new treatment facilities and restoration of the project site.

**COMPETITIVE SOLICITATION:** Request for Bids Specification No. PW09-0565F was opened December 8, 2009. No companies were invited to bid. The project was advertised in the Tacoma News Tribune in addition to normal advertising in the Tacoma Daily Index. Sixteen submittals were received. The table below reflects the amount of the total award.



Section 3. That Section 1.12.640 of the Tacoma Municipal Code is amended, effective as provided by law, to read as follows:

**1.12.640 Application of additional rates.**

5099 A Wastewater Treatment Plant Assistant (CSC 5099), upon completion of 50 percent of the training modules toward a certificate, will be assigned an applied rate of 3 percent above their current step rate of pay, and upon attainment of a certificate, will be assigned an applied rate of 6 percent above their current step rate of pay.

5099, 5105, 5106 An employee in the classification of Wastewater Treatment Plant Assistant (CSC 5099), Wastewater Treatment Plant Maintenance Machinist (CSC 5105), or Senior Wastewater Treatment Plant Maintenance Machinist (CSC 5106) shall receive a certification premium of 3 percent above his or her base rate of pay for holding a Water Backflow Assembly Technician license.

5310 A Fabrication Welder (CSC 5310) assigned to work on Resource Recovery Plant equipment located at the Resource Recovery Plant shall be paid an additional 5 percent above his or her regular rate of pay.

5310 Employees in the classification of Fabrication Welder (CSC 5310), in the Sewer Division, shall receive an additional 5 percent of the regular rate of pay per hour when welding in the grit or sedimentation tank or final clarifier.

5310 A Fabrication Welder (CSC 5310) shall receive an applied rate of 2 percent above his or her regular rate of pay for holding a Washington Association of Building Officials (WABO) Structural Welder or AWS D1.1 Certification.

5310, 5332 A Heavy Equipment Mechanic (CSC 5332) or Fabrication Welder (CSC 5310) assigned to work on equipment located on the landfill shall be paid an additional 5 percent above his or her regular rate of pay while working on the landfill.

5332, Effective on and after January 1, 2001, or any time thereafter that an employee meets the certification requirements established by the collective bargaining agreement, employees in the classifications of Heavy Equipment Mechanic (CSC 5332) shall receive an additional 5 percent over his or her regular rate of pay.

Effective January 1, 2011, a Fire and Marine Shop Supervisor shall be eligible for an application of rate of an additional 2 percent, for a total of 7 percent above his or her base rate, for holding both certifications outlined in the collective bargaining agreement.

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5338 An employee in the classification of Resource Recovery Mechanic (CSC 5338) shall receive a certification premium of 3 percent above his or her base rate of pay for holding a Water Backflow Assembly Technician license.

L160 An employee assigned to work the graveyard shift at Public Works Fleets shall be eligible for an application of rate of fifty cents (\$0.50) per hour for each hour worked on or after 2,100 hours.

Section 4. That Section 1.12.640 of the Tacoma Municipal Code is

amended, effective as provided by law, to read as follows:

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L31 Effective January 1, 2010, an employee represented by Tacoma Firefighters Union, Local 31, assigned to the Technical Rescue Team shall be eligible for an applied rate of 2.5 percent above his or her base rate of pay. Effective January 1, 2011, the applied rate of 2.5 percent will increase to 5 percent for the members of the Technical Rescue Team.

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Section 5. That Section 1 of this ordinance shall become effective retroactive to January 1, 2009. That Section 2 of this ordinance shall become effective February 1, 2010. That Section 3 and 4 of this ordinance shall become effective as provided by law.
