



Legislation Passed June 8, 2010

The Tacoma City Council, at its regular City Council meeting of June 8, 2010, adopted the following resolutions and/or ordinances. Resolution No. 38039

Setting Tuesday, June 22, 2010, at approximately 5:30 p.m., as the date for a public hearing by the City Council to consider the 2010 Human Services Strategic Plan.

Resolution No. 38040

Adjusting the term periods of the Planning Commission; and appointing and reappointing individuals to the Planning Commission, Human Services Commission, Board of Building Appeals, and Public Utility Board.

Resolution No. 38041

Appointing Council Member Woodards to serve on the Government Performance and Finance Committee and Deputy Mayor Fey to serve as the alternate.

Purchase Resolution No. 38042

Awarding contracts to:

1. Clyde/West, Inc., in the amount of \$222,432.00, plus sales tax, budgeted from the Surface Water Fund, for a Tymco 500X Sweeper to expand the level of service in street sweeping – City of Eugene, Oregon Contract No. 2009200059;
2. Tucci & Sons, Inc., on its bid of \$1,176,362.20, sales tax not applicable, budgeted from the Street Special Revenue Fund, for the Portland Avenue Overlay East 38th Street to East 56th Street project – Specification No. PW10 0169F; and
3. Midvale Electric, Inc., on its bid of \$660,930.00, plus sales tax, budgeted from the Tacoma Rail Mountain Division Fund, for on-call signal maintenance on the Tacoma Rail Mountain Division Line, for the period of July 1, 2010 through June 30, 2012 – Specification No. TR10-0129F.

Resolution No. 38043

Authorizing the execution of Amendment No. 4 to the agreement with PCS Structural Solutions, Inc., in the amount of \$28,100, for a cumulative total of \$202,577, budgeted from the Street Special Revenue Fund, for additional design work related to the Broadway Local Improvement District, through December 31, 2010.

Resolution No. 38044

Authorizing the execution of a Memorandum of Understanding with the Puyallup Tribe of Indians for stormwater conveyance system improvements in East R Street.

Resolution No. 38045

Granting a slope easement, a temporary construction easement, and a crossing easement to the Washington State Department of Transportation (WSDOT), for a total amount of \$22,500; accepting and depositing said sum into the Tacoma Rail Mountain Division Fund; and authorizing the execution of a construction and maintenance agreement with WSDOT for the State Route 12 Bridge Widening Project located in Grand Mound, Washington.

Resolution No. 38046

Authorizing the execution of a supplement to the agreement with David Evans and Associates, Inc., in the amount of \$1,366,849, for a cumulative total of \$2,893,216, budgeted from the Street Special Revenue Fund, for the design to replace a segment of the Puyallup River Bridge.

Resolution No. 38047

Authorizing the defeasance of the outstanding Electric System Revenue and Refunding Bonds, 2001 Series A.

Resolution No. 38048

Adopting an overarching set of policies to guide the City Council and staff when proposing or evaluating specific amendments to comprehensively update the Countywide Planning Policies for Pierce County to bring them into compliance with the regional multi-county planning policies that are currently set forth in the Puget Sound Regional Council's VISION 2040.

Ordinance No. 27888

Amending Chapter 1.12 of the Municipal Code, relating to the Compensation Plan, to implement rates of pay and compensation for employees represented by the International Federation of Professional and Technical Engineers, Local 17, which covers approximately 296 budgeted, full-time positions.

RESOLUTION NO. 38039

A RESOLUTION relating to the City's Human Services Strategic Plan; setting Tuesday, June 22, 2010, as the date for a public hearing to consider the adoption of the City of Tacoma's 2010 Human Services Strategic Plan.

WHEREAS, in 1994, the City Council adopted the first Human Services Strategic Plan ("Plan") and made major revisions to it in 2000 and 2005, and

WHEREAS the Plan describes for citizens and human services entities the role of the City in human services functions, establishes goals and strategies, and includes priorities for funding human services programs in the community, and

WHEREAS the City has evaluated plans from other human services funders, analyzed data from surveys of clients, and held focus groups of human service providers, and

WHEREAS a Community Panel of citizens reviewed the elements of the existing Plan, interpreted the evaluated and analyzed information, and is recommending that the City Council revise its Plan by adopting the proposed 2010 Human Services Strategic Plan; Now, Therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TACOMA:

Section 1. That Tuesday, June 22, 2010, at the approximate hour of 5:30 p.m., is hereby fixed as the date and time, and the City Council Chambers on the first floor of the Tacoma Municipal Building, 747 Market Street, Tacoma, Washington, as the place where the City Council will hold a public hearing to concerning the adoption of the City of Tacoma's 2010 Human Services Strategic Plan.

Section 2. That the Clerk of the City shall give proper notice of the time and place of the meeting.

RESOLUTION NO. 38040

BY REQUEST OF MAYOR STRICKLAND, DEPUTY MAYOR FEY, AND
COUNCIL MEMBERS MANTHOU AND WALKER

A RESOLUTION relating to committees, boards, and commissions; adjusting the term periods of the Planning Commission; and appointing or reappointing citizens to the Planning Commission, the Human Services Commission, the Board of Building Appeals, and the Public Utility Board.

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 3.8 of the Tacoma City Charter and Chapter 13.02 of the Tacoma Municipal Code, the Planning Commission (“Commission”) is composed of nine members appointed and confirmed by the City Council for terms of three years each, and

WHEREAS, currently, the commissioners’ terms begin in January of the first year and expire in December of the third year, and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Growth Management Act, the Commission annually recommends changes to the Comprehensive Plan and the Land Use Regulatory Code, and

WHEREAS, on June 23, 2009, the City Council adopted Amended Ordinance No. 27813, modifying the annual amendment cycle from the calendar year cycle to a July 1 to June 30 cycle in order to enhance public participation and facilitate City Council deliberations, and

WHEREAS the Commission has expressed concern that it is difficult to have new members join the Commission in January when it is far along in its review of the proposed annual amendments, and

WHEREAS the Commission has suggested that its terms of office be adjusted to begin in July of the first year and end in June of the third year so that newly appointed members would start their terms concurrently with the beginning of the annual amendment process, and

WHEREAS the proposed term period adjustments are also needed to facilitate the correct staggering of terms of office that through past vacancies and appointments have become out of alignment, and

WHEREAS the Commission's proposed term adjustment can be accomplished with a one-time adjustment to the existing term periods of the nine positions and the reappointment of the incumbent members to their respective, adjusted terms, as set forth in the attached Exhibits "A" and "B," and

WHEREAS, currently, there are two vacant positions on the Commission representing District No. 4 and Architecture, Historic Preservation, and/or Urban Design, and

WHEREAS a third position representing Environmental Community with the applicable adjusted term period is scheduled to expire on June 30, 2010, and

WHEREAS, upon completing the due process for recruitment, the Appointments Committee is recommending Mr. Donald Erickson and Mr. Ian Morrison to fill, respectively, the Architecture, Historic Preservation, and/or Urban Design and Environmental Community positions to the respective adjusted terms, as specified in Exhibits "A" and "B," and

WHEREAS the Appointments Committee will continue to recruit a citizen to fill the District No. 4 position, and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the City Charter and the Rules, Regulations, and Procedures of the City Council, the persons named on Exhibit "B" have been nominated to serve on the committees, boards, and commissions listed; Now, Therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TACOMA:

Section 1. That the term periods of the members of the Planning Commission are modified, as set forth in the attached Exhibits "A" and "B," from the calendar year cycle to begin in July of the first year and end in June of the third year so that newly appointed members would start their terms concurrently with the beginning of the annual Comprehensive Plan amendment process.

Section 2. That those nominees to the committees, boards, and commissions, listed on Exhibit "B" are hereby confirmed and appointed or reappointed as members of such committees, boards, and commissions, for such terms, as are set forth on Exhibit "B."



RECOMMENDATION: The Public Works Department, Facilities Management Division - Fleet Services recommends a contract be awarded to **Clyde/West, Inc., Portland, OR**, for the purchase of a new Tymco 500X Sweeper. The contract amount reflects a total award of \$222,432, plus applicable sales tax.

EXPLANATION: Facilities Management Division – Fleet Services, on behalf of Environmental Services is requesting the purchase of an additional sweeper to expand the level of service in street sweeping for City residents. The City sweeping program will sweep all streets twice a year and provide residents a reliable schedule for what two days the sweepers will be on the resident's street. The additional sweeper will not only be used to provide that predictable level of service but also be used to sweep arterials and pick up sand after winter storms.

COMPETITIVE BIDDING: The City of Tacoma has established an Interlocal Purchasing Agreement with the City of Eugene, Oregon. This purchase is per a Request for Proposal conducted by the City of Eugene and awarded to Clyde/West, Inc., who has agreed this purchase will be per the same prices, terms, and conditions as the original solicitation.

RECOMMENDATION: Public Works Engineering Division recommends a contract be awarded to low bidder **Tucci & Sons, Inc.**, for the Portland Avenue Overlay E. 38th St. to E. 56th St. project. The contract amount reflects a total award of \$1,176,362.20, sales tax not applicable.

EXPLANATION: This project will improve Portland Avenue from E. 38th St. to E. 56th St. with a new layer of asphalt to improve the driving surface. The project includes the improvement of curb ramps, driveways, and sidewalks to ADA standards.

COMPETITIVE SOLICITATION: Request for Bids Specification No. PW10-0169F was opened April 27, 2010. Standard advertising methods were used to advertise the project. Three submittals were received. The table below reflects the amount of the total award.

RECOMMENDATION: City of Tacoma, Tacoma Rail, recommends a contract be awarded to second low bidder **Midvale Electric, Inc, Sunnyside, WA**, for on-call signal maintenance on the Tacoma Rail Mountain Division Line. The contract duration will be from July 1, 2010 through June 30, 2012. The contract amount reflects a total award of \$660,930.00, plus sales tax.

EXPLANATION: The contract will provide maintenance, inspection, testing, scheduled and emergency repairs, including, but not limited to: replace fuses, repair broken bonding of wires on tracks, adjust instruments, and replacement of stolen or vandalized batteries for Tacoma Rail Mountain Division railroad signals on a 24 hour, on-call basis.

COMPETITIVE BIDDING: Request for Bids Specification No. TR10-0129F was opened May 11, 2010. Two companies were invited to bid in addition to normal advertising of the project. Two submittals were received. Due to a mathematical error, the low bidder, Coast Rail, withdrew their bid. It is Tacoma Rail's opinion that the second low bid is competitive in comparison to our current contract. The table below reflects the amount of the total award.


The recommended award is 1.68% percent above the pre-bid estimate.

WHEREAS the Puyallup River Bridge ("Bridge"), constructed in 1926 and located on Highway 99, was in need of replacement of a 600-foot segment of the 2,500-foot structure, and

WHEREAS the City obtained a second federal grant to provide funds for engineering and design services for the replacement of an additional 196-foot segment of the Bridge, and

WHEREAS, on August 9, 2005, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 36607, supplementing the agreement, in the amount of \$370,785, for a cumulative amount of \$1,526,367, for engineering services for the replacement of an additional 196-foot segment of the Bridge, and

WHEREAS the original agreement provided for two options with the understanding that if the cable-stayed bridge option was chosen, additional design funds would be needed, and

WHEREAS, to accommodate freight rail movement in the Port of Tacoma, the City has chosen the cable-stayed option, and

WHEREAS a number of issues have impacted the size of this project, including increased size to provide additional sidewalk width, changes to the seismic code, additional effort to meet the adjacent structure, and increased structure length due to a Burlington Northern Santa Fe vault, and

WHEREAS this proposed supplement to the agreement will complete the funding for the Bridge design; Now, Therefore,

RESOLUTION NO. 38047

A RESOLUTION relating to Department of Public Utilities, Light Division (d.b.a. "Tacoma Power") cash reserves; authorizing the defeasance of the outstanding Electric System Revenue and Refunding Bonds, 2001 Series A.

WHEREAS, pursuant to Ordinance No. 26813 and Substitute Resolution No. 35185 (together "Bond Ordinance"), the City of Tacoma issued for the benefit of its Department of Public Utilities, Light Division (d.b.a. "Tacoma Power"), \$191,510,000 principal amount of Electric System Revenue and Refunding Bonds, 2001 Series A ("2001A Bonds"), of which \$36,800,000 is currently outstanding, and

WHEREAS Section 8.1 of Ordinance No. 26813 provides that the City may use money available from any lawful source to pay the principal of and interest on the 2001A Bonds, as the same shall become due and payable, and to defease the 2001A Bonds, and

WHEREAS Tacoma Power has determined that it is in the best interest of the ratepayers of the City to use available cash to defease the outstanding 2001A Bonds, and

WHEREAS the Public Utility Board has authorized the use of available cash for such purposes pursuant to Resolution No. U-10384, passed May 26, 2010; Now, Therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TACOMA:

Section 1. Provision for Defeasance. If it will result in savings to Department of Public Utilities, Light Division (d.b.a. "Tacoma Power") ratepayers, the City shall provide for the payment of the principal of and interest

on the outstanding 2001A Bonds (“Defeased Bonds”) by the application of electric revenues to acquire direct obligations of or obligations of the principal of and interest on which are unconditionally guaranteed by the United States Government (“Government Obligations”) and to pay all costs incurred in establishing and implementing the plan of defeasance provided for by this resolution.

Tacoma Power recommends the City Council hereby irrevocably call the Defeased Bonds in accordance with the provisions of Section 8.1 of Ordinance No. 26813, authorizing the redemption of the Defeased Bonds prior to their maturities.

Section 2. Defeasance Fund and Appropriation of Money. Tacoma Power recommends the City Council create a special fund for the Defeased Bonds to be known as the “Electric System Revenue and Refunding Bonds, 2001 Series A Defeasance Fund” (“Defeasance Fund”). The Defeasance Fund shall be used solely for the purpose of paying the principal of, interest on, and redemption price of the Defeased Bonds. The Government Obligations and the cash deposited with the Defeasance Agent shall be sufficient to provide money to pay the principal of, interest on, and redemption price of the Defeased Bonds as the same shall become due.

The defeasance and call for redemption of the Defeased Bonds shall be irrevocable after the establishment and funding of the Defeasance Fund and delivery of the Government Obligations to the Defeasance Agent, except as provided in the Defeasance Agreement relating to the substitution of securities.

Section 3. Defeasance Agent and Agreement. The Director of Finance is hereby authorized to appoint a bank or trust company to serve as Defeasance Agent for the Defeased Bonds. The Defeasance Agent is hereby authorized and directed to pay to the paying agents for the Defeased Bonds sums sufficient to pay, when due, the principal of, interest on, and redemption price of the Defeased Bonds. All such sums shall be paid from the money and Government Obligations deposited with the Defeasance Agent and the income therefrom and proceeds thereof. All such sums so paid shall be credited to the Defeasance Fund. All money and securities deposited with the Defeasance Agent and any income therefrom shall be held, invested, and applied in accordance with the provisions of this resolution and the laws of the State of Washington for the benefit of the City and owners of the Defeased Bonds.

In accordance with the provisions of the Bond Ordinance, no further payments shall be made into the Bond Fund securing the Defeased Bonds. Such Defeased Bonds shall cease to be entitled to any lien, benefit, or security of the Bond Ordinance, except the right to receive payment from the Defeasance Fund, and such bonds shall no longer be deemed to be outstanding.

The Director of Finance is authorized to enter into an agreement with the Defeasance Agent providing for the irrevocable deposit of Government Obligations and cash for the purposes described in this resolution and setting

forth the duties, obligations, and responsibilities of the Defeasance Agent in connection with the payment of the principal of and interest on the Defeased Bonds as provided herein.

Section 4. Verification Agent. The Director of Finance is hereby authorized to appoint a verification agent in connection with this defeasance.

Overarching Policy Framework

- Support full integration of the Puget Sound Regional Council's VISION 2040 policies into the scheduled 2010 update to the Countywide Planning Policies for Pierce County.
- Advocate for targeting the greatest share of employment growth to designated regional growth centers, and manufacturing/industrial centers, where transportation and infrastructure investments have already been made or are programmed.
- Strengthen Tacoma's role as the Metropolitan City for Pierce County and its designated role as the primary focal point for the allocation of regional population and employment growth.
- Prioritize limited resources for transportation and infrastructure improvements to support growth and redevelopment in existing urban centers and thereby: protect critical areas and natural resource lands from urban encroachment and sprawling low-density development, lessen long commutes, reduce congestion, and improve air quality.
- Advance reductions in vehicle miles travelled by encouraging transit-orientated development, building complete streets, and discouraging further sprawling development in the region.
- Support an emphasis on a regionwide Transferrable Development Rights program.
- Advance public health improvements through local food initiatives and better urban design, such as features that increase walkability.
- Support policies to advance the development of affordable housing countywide.
- Support policies that are consistent with the "Washington State Climate Change Impacts Response Strategy."

Section 3. That Section 1.12.640 of the Tacoma Municipal Code is hereby amended, retroactive to January 4, 2010, to read as follows:

2016 A Construction Inspector (CSC 2016) will receive non-automatic step 6 rate of pay after completion of either (a) 5 years as a City of Tacoma Construction Inspector and 60 applicable education credits after hire with the City; or (b) 15 years as a City of Tacoma Construction Inspector; or (c) upon management discretion. Each employee is responsible for developing his/her training/education plan jointly with the appropriate manager.

2019 An employee in the classification of Engineering Instrumentation Technician, CSC 2019, assigned Lead responsibilities for two or more Instrumentation Technicians, CSC 2018, shall receive an additional 5 percent of top step for all hours so assigned; when assigned to work in Public Works Resource Recovery, employees in the classification of Engineering Instrumentation Technician, CSC 2019, will receive an additional 5 percent application of rate over base wage based on working conditions.

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5006 An employee in the classification of Community Service Work Crew Leader (CSC 5006), when assigned to supervise one or more other Community Service Work Crew Leaders, shall receive an additional 10 percent of the base rate.
