Budgeted from ES Wastewater Fund 4300

Interlocal Agreement with King County, Contract No. 1327-09

RECOMMENDATION: Public Works, Facilities Management, Fleet Services on behalf of Environmental Services Wastewater Division recommends a contract be awarded to **Valley Freightliner**, **Inc.**, **Pacific**, **WA**, in the amount of \$236,128.40, plus sales tax, for the purchase of one Freightliner cab and chassis and swap loader with attachments per King County Contract No. 1327-09.

EXPLANATION: This vehicle will be used to manage debris spoils generated from excavations to repair the collection system, and meet street sweeping waste collection and storm cleaning disposal needs. This versatile swap loader configuration will improve efficiency and provide sustainability by enabling one vehicle to meet resource requirements for multiple crews. The use of one swap loader truck may eventually replace the use of seven dedicated vehicles. The end result is lower fuel, oil, maintenance, insurance and employee expenditures.

COMPETITIVE BIDDING: King County Contract No. 1327-09 is a competitively bid contract in effect from May 1, 2010 to April 30, 2013. All items included in this purchase (new 2012 Freightliner cab and chassis model 114SD, with hook lift swap loader model SL400, 20-foot flatbed, and drop box) are included on the King County contract. Through an interlocal cooperative purchasing agreement the City of Tacoma purchase will be at the same prices, terms and conditions and meets competitive bidding requirements. If these items were bid today the price would be at least five percent higher. This is a good value for the City as we are receiving a 2012 vehicle at 2010 prices.

Purchase Freightliner Cab & Chassis with Hook Lift Swap Loader

The Public Works, Facilities Management, Fleet Services Division, on behalf of the Environmental Services, Wastewater Maintenance Division, requests City Council award a contract to Valley Freightliner, Inc., of Pacific, WA, in the amount of \$236,128.40, plus sales tax, for the purchase of one Freightliner cab and chassis and swap loader with attachments through King County Contract No. 1327-09.

Background

This vehicle configuration will serve multiple functions and will be used to manage debris spoils generated from excavations to repair the collection system, meet street sweeping waste collection and storm cleaning disposal needs. This vehicle will replace an older less efficient dump truck that is no longer cost effective to maintain. The versatile swap loader configuration will improve efficiency and provide sustainability by enabling one vehicle to meet resource requirements for multiple crews with one operator. The environmental impact to the surrounding Tacoma area will benefit by having one truck, resulting in less emissions and a smaller footprint. The use of one swap loader truck could eventually replace the use of seven dedicated public works vehicles. The end result is lower fuel, oil, maintenance, insurance, employee expenditures and the Freightliner truck meets the 2010 EPA standards for exhaust emissions and particulate matter.

Funding

Funds are budgeted in the ES Wastewater Fund 4300 with a partial contribution from Fleet Services Capital Fund 5400. Funds beyond this biennium are subject to future availability of funds.

Purchasing Process

King County awarded Contract No. 1327-09 to Valley Freightliner, Inc., of Pacific, WA as a result of their competitive Invitation to Bid process. The Contractor has agreed to provide a complete cab and chassis and a service body per the terms and conditions of the bid specification document. Contract No. 1327-09 allows for participation by other political subdivisions through an interlocal cooperative purchasing agreement.

RECOMMENDATION: Public Works, Facilities Management, Fleet Services on behalf of Environmental Services, Solid Waste Management Division requests approval to increase Contract No. 4600007955 to Western Peterbilt, Inc., Fife, WA, by \$720,000, plus sales tax, for repair services and related parts for vehicles and equipment on an as-needed basis. This increase will bring the contract to a cumulative amount of \$900,000, plus sales tax.

EXPLANATION: This increase will allow for Solid Waste Management vehicle and equipment repairs and related parts purchases from a factory authorized dealer on an as-needed basis. This increase is requested to supplement the specialty repairs only performed at the authorized dealership and other overflow work to meet the day-to-day fleet requirement.

SUSTAINABITLITY: Current and new garbage trucks and tractors are equipped with sophisticated pollution control systems including particulate filters and engine control systems to reduce emissions and fuel consumption. Western Peterbilt, Inc. is equipped and authorized to make repairs, clean exhaust filters and make computerized adjustments according to the manufacture's specifications to keep vehicles running at their optimum levels meeting exhaust emission management requirements.

COMPETITIVE BIDDING: This contract was originally awarded to Western Peterbilt, Inc. as a result of Request for Bids Specification No. GF11-0539F in March 2012. The contractor has agreed to increase the contract at the same terms and conditions as the original contract.

CONTRACT HISTORY: This contract was awarded in March 2012 for the initial term of 21 months, from March 6, 2012 through November 30, 2014, in the amount of \$180,000, and included the option for two one-year renewals. The established 21 month contract amount was based on the best estimation anticipating new emissions and garbage truck technologies. However, the actual work needed from Western Peterbilt, Inc. was higher than estimated. This increase reflects current service levels and anticipated future needs to cover through November 2016. This will bring the contract to a cumulative amount of \$900,000, plus sales tax, and fund the contract through its final end date.

Contract to Increase for Vehicle/Equipment Parts and Repair Service

DATE:

The Public Works, Facilities Management, Fleet Services Division, on behalf of the Environmental Services, Solid Waste Management Division (SWM), requests City Council approve an increase to Contract No. 4600007955 to Western Peterbilt, Inc., of Fife, WA, by \$720,000, plus sales tax, for repair services and related parts for vehicles and equipment on an as-needed basis. This increase will bring the contract to a cumulative amount of \$900,000, plus sales tax.

Background

This contract was originally awarded in March 2012 for the initial term of 21 months, from March 6, 2012 through November 30, 2014, in the amount of \$180,000, and included the option for two one-year renewals. The established 21 month contract amount was based on the best estimation anticipating new emissions and garbage truck technologies. However, the actual work needed from Western Peterbilt, Inc. is higher than estimated. This increase reflects current service levels and anticipated future needs to cover through the end of November 2016. This will bring the contract to a cumulative amount of \$900,000 and fund the contract through its final end date.

Contract Scope

The contractor provides service, repairs, and parts for various Western Peterbilt, Inc. trucks on an as-needed basis to the City's Environmental Services, SWM fleet. This increase will allow for SWM truck fleet repairs and related parts purchases from a factory authorized dealer on an as-needed basis. This increase is requested to supplement the specialty repairs only performed at the authorized dealership and other overflow work to meet the day-to-day SWM fleet requirement. Current and new garbage trucks and tractors are equipped with sophisticated pollution control systems including particulate filters and engine control systems to reduce emissions and increase fuel efficiency. As a factory authorized repair service dealer, Western Peterbilt, Inc. is equipped and authorized to make repairs, clean exhaust filters and make computerized adjustments according to the manufacturers specifications to keep vehicles running at their optimum levels meeting exhaust emissions management requirements.

Funding

Funds are budgeted from the ES Solid Waste Fund 4200. Funding past the current biennium will be subject to future availability of funds.



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RESOLUTION NO. 38602

BY REQUEST OF MAYOR STRICKLAND, DEPUTY MAYOR CAMPBELL AND COUNCIL MEMBERS BOE AND LONERGAN

A RESOLUTION expressing the City Council's support of Click! Network and encouraging Fisher Communications to re-engage with Click! Network to resolve stalled negotiations for carriage of KOMO and other services to Click! Customers.

WHEREAS the City of Tacoma, Department of Public Utilities, Power

Division, Telecommunications Section (d.b.a. Click! Network), was established as
a competitive cable television provider in the marketplace, and

WHEREAS Click! Network is a non-profit, cost-of-service, municipallyowned entity with a mission to provide high quality, competitively priced cable TV products and services for the benefit of all Tacoma residents, and

WHEREAS the public can view the broadcast signals transmitted by Fisher Communications with an antenna for free, and

WHEREAS some Fisher Communications' broadcast content is also available for free over the Internet, and

WHEREAS, since 1992, federal telecommunications law has allowed broadcast station owners such as Fisher Communications to elect to negotiate broadcast station carriage terms in good faith with cable operators, and

WHEREAS Fisher Communications has elected to negotiate retransmission consent with Click! Network, and

WHEREAS, prior to 2009, Fisher Communications did not demand a cash license fee from Click! Network to deliver their free over-the-air broadcast signals to cable customers, and





WHEREAS, in 2009, Fisher Communications began to charge Click! Network for carriage and has since increased the retransmission consent license fees by over 160% while reporting healthy profits at the expense of cable TV customers, and

WHEREAS Fisher Communications now proposes new retransmission consent license fees that represent a cumulative increase of 300% since 2009 and are significantly higher than rates agreed to by Click! Network with any other major local broadcast station, and

WHEREAS, if the new fees proposed by Fisher Communications are accepted, cable TV rate increases in excess of what has been approved in the 2013-2014 operating budget would be required, placing an undue burden on loyal Click! Network cable customers, and

WHEREAS Click! Network is willing to pay fair compensation for the programming, despite Nielsen TV Ratings Data from December 2012 that places ABC programming behind CBS and NBC, and

WHEREAS Click! Network has not heard from Fisher Communications since December 31, 2012, when Click! Network was ordered to cease carriage of the broadcast signals, and

WHEREAS the lack of ABC programming on Click! Network's channel lineup has harmed cable television competition in the Tacoma market; Now, Therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TACOMA:

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That the City Council calls on Fisher Communications to return to good faith negotiations with Click! Network and quickly arrive at a reasonable retransmission consent license fee agreement so that Tacoma residents can continue to benefit Adopted _____ Mayor



ORDINANCE NO. 28123

AN ORDINANCE relating to the Compensation Plan; amending Section 1.12.355 of the Tacoma Municipal Code; and declaring the effective dates thereof to implement rates of pay and compensation.
