

Legislation Passed February 5, 2013

The Tacoma City Council, at its regular City Council meeting of February 5, 2013, adopted the following resolutions and/or ordinances. Purchase Resolution No. 38616

Awarding a contract to:

Asphalt Equipment & Service Co., in the amount of \$389,713.79, plus sales tax, budgeted from the Solid Waste Fund, for equipment to enable the City's asphalt plant to incorporate recycled asphalt pavement and recycled asphalt shingles into the asphalt mix – Specification No. ES12-0692F.

RECOMMENDATION: The Environmental Services Department recommends a contract be awarded to **Asphalt Equipment & Service Co.**, **Auburn, WA**, for supply of equipment which would enable the City's Asphalt Plant to incorporate recycled asphalt pavement (RAP) and recycled asphalt shingles (RAS) into the asphalt mix. The contract amount reflects a total award of \$389,713.79, including sales tax.

EXPLANATION: The City currently does not have the ability to recycle asphalt pavement or asphalt shingles that are removed and replaced every year by Public Works Street Operations and City property owners and contractors. Significant amounts of this material are either being landfilled or transported longer distances for recycling than would be necessary if the City had the capability of using this material internally. Recycling this material will reduce greenhouse gas emissions and help to create new markets for these materials.

COMPETITIVE SOLICITATION: Request for Proposals Specification No. ES12-0692F was opened January 8, 2013. Ten companies were invited to bid in addition to advertising the project in the Seattle Daily Journal of Commerce and the Tacoma Daily Index. One submittal was received.

SUSTAINABILITY FACTORS: The evaluation criteria included sustainability factors including evaluation of life cycle operation costs and energy usage. The proposer provided estimates for energy usage and operation and maintenance costs to meet this requirement. Recycling asphalt pavement and asphalt shingles with this equipment will save the City money, reduce greenhouse gas emissions, and help to create new markets for these materials.

The Environmental Services Department is requesting the City Council award a contract to Asphalt Equipment & Service Co., of Auburn, WA, for supply of equipment which would enable the City's Asphalt Plant to incorporate recycled asphalt pavement and recycled asphalt shingles into the asphalt mix. The contract amount reflects a total award of \$389,713.79, including sales tax.

Background

The Environmental Services Department has identified an opportunity to recycle asphalt pavement grindings and waste asphalt roofing shingles by purchasing equipment for the Asphalt Plant which will allow for the incorporation of these materials. The reuse of the recycled asphalt pavement (RAP) and recycled asphalt shingles (RAS) will reduce the amount of binder and aggregate purchased for production for the Street Operations Division as well as divert asphalt pavement grinding and asphalt shingle materials from being landfilled, thereby avoiding disposal costs.

The Environmental Services Department's Science and Engineering Division issued a bid for the equipment required to retrofit the Asphalt Plant. A separate contract for the installation of the equipment will be designed around the selected equipment and bid separately.

Prior Council Action

The City Council formally accepted a grant from the Washington State Department of Ecology on November 6, 2012 through Resolution No. 38567. The portion of the grant award that may be applied to this project is \$337,500, with a City match of \$112,500.

Funding

The budget for this project is \$890,000 including \$337,500 which will be provided from the Washington State Department of Ecology grant. The remaining funds are budgeted from the ES Solid Waste Fund 4200. This project is budgeted in this fund because the implementation of the recycling of RAP and RAS materials at the Asphalt Plant will result in the diversion of waste materials from being landfilled.

Reason for Project

The City currently does not have the ability to recycle asphalt pavement or asphalt shingles that are removed and replaced every year by Public Works Street Operations and City property owners and contractors.

Significant amounts of this material are either being landfilled or transported longer distances for recycling than would be necessary if the City had the capability of using this material internally. Recycling this material will save the City money, reduce greenhouse gas emissions and help to create new markets for these materials.

Additionally, the Washington State Department of Transportation (WSDOT) is working on finalizing a General Special Provision for piloting the use of RAS and high RAP, above 20%, in hot mix asphalt pavements on state roads. WSDOT has been working with the Washington Asphalt Pavement Association (WAPA) to develop the special provision; the paving industry is very interested in advancing the use of these recycled materials in the state.

The City, as an operator of its own Asphalt Plant, is in a unique position to test the feasibility of introducing these materials into its asphalt production process.

<u>Public Process</u>
The City applied for this grant in a statewide competitive process.

Bid/Purchase Process

The Asphalt Plant equipment was competitively bid by a Request for Proposal, Specification No. ES12-0692F opened on January 8, 2013. One proposal was received.

WHEREAS the City Council held a public hearing on the HSC recommendations on December 11, 2012, and adopted those recommendations on December 18, 2012, and

WHEREAS the HSC recommends that the \$2,999,065 in available funding for the 2013-2014 biennium be allocated in the following way: (1) Catholic Community Services of Western Washington, in the amount of \$719,574; (2) Northwest Leadership Foundation, in the amount of \$205,100; (3) Peace Community Center, in the amount of \$226,000; (4) Pierce County AIDS Foundation, in the amount of \$262,603; (5) The Rescue Mission, in the amount of \$427,500; (6) Shared Housing Services, in the amount of \$264,664; (7) Tacoma Community House, in the amount of \$392,224; (8) Tacoma Urban League, in the amount of \$296,740; and (9) Washington Women's Employment and Education, in the amount of \$204,660, and

WHEREAS the remainder of the human services programs are less than \$200,000 and will be contracted administratively; Now, Therefore,

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RESOLUTION NO. 38618

A RESOLUTION relating to the prevention of domestic violence; authorizing the execution of an agreement with the Crystal Judson Family Justice Center in the amount of \$335,000, budgeted from the Mental Health Fund, for delivery of domestic violence services for the period of January 1, 2013, through December 31, 2013.

WHEREAS, in 2005, the Crystal Judson Family Justice Center ("FJC") was created as a partnership between Pierce County and the City of Tacoma, dedicated to the prevention of domestic violence, and

WHEREAS the City entered into an interlocal agreement with Pierce County to ensure adequate funding for the FJC essential expenditures and functions, which consist of the lease costs for the facility and the salaries of the executive officers, and

WHEREAS, during the 2013-2014 biennial budget process, the City Council allocated General Fund resources for domestic violence prevention services programs, and

WHEREAS currently funded programs (FJC, Korean Women's Association, and YMCA) would be provided one year non-competitive grants, and

WHEREAS, for 2013, the City's portion of the FJC essential expenditures and functions is \$305,000, with an additional \$30,000 designated to fund additional legal services, and

WHEREAS funding is available from the Mental Health Fund for said services, and



WHEREAS the remaining 2013 non-competitive domestic violence prevention programs with the Korean Women's Association and the YWCA are less than \$200,000 and will be contracted administratively; Now, Therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TACOMA:

That the proper officers of the City are hereby authorized to execute an agreement with the Crystal Judson Family Justice Center in the amount of \$335,000, budgeted from the Mental Health Fund, for delivery of domestic violence services for the period of January 1, 2013, through December 31, 2013, said document to be substantially in the form of the proposed agreement on file in the office of the City Clerk.

BY REQUEST OF MAYOR STRICKLAND, DEPUTY MAYOR CAMPBELL, AND COUNCIL MEMBERS LONERGAN AND WOODARDS

A RESOLUTION expressing support for the passage of Proposition No. 1, submitted by the Tacoma School District No. 10 at the February 12, 2013, Special Election for the purpose of financing capital improvements to its education facilities; and urging Tacoma voters to vote "Approved" on Proposition No. 1 on the February 12, 2013, Special Election ballot.

WHEREAS the Board of Directors ("Board") and staff of Tacoma School District No. 10, Pierce County, Washington ("District"), continue to plan for the capital needs of the District to provide the District's students, teachers, and staff with adequate, proper, and safe facilities that create opportunities for educational excellence for every student, regardless of background, economic circumstances or neighborhood, and

WHEREAS the District's capital needs include capital improvements to existing educational facilities and additional and replacement educational facilities to provide safe learning environments for all students in the District, and

WHEREAS, on November 1, 2012, the Board adopted Resolution No.

1923, concerning a proposition to finance capital improvements to its education facilities, and

WHEREAS, if approved, this proposition would authorize the District to replace or renovate 14 deteriorating neighborhood schools across Tacoma; improve learning environments; implement health, safety, security and technology upgrades; earthquake safety; roof repairs; alarm/sprinkler systems; energy-efficient heating/lighting; electrical/plumbing; and improved



playgrounds, playfields and athletic facilities, by issuing \$500,000,000 of general obligation bonds maturing within a maximum term of 25 years, and to levy annual excess property taxes to repay the bonds as provided in Resolution No. 1923, and

WHEREAS the success of Tacoma's schools is dependent upon its citizens; Now, Therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TACOMA:
