SUMMARY:

Public Works, Facilities Management Division, Fleet Services recommends a contract be awarded to Western Peterbilt, Inc., Fife, WA, in the amount of \$2,596,209, plus applicable sales tax, for service, repairs, and parts for various Peterbilt vehicles and equipment on an as-needed basis, for an initial contract term of three years plus the option for two additional one-year renewal periods, including an estimated 3 percent annual CPI increase, for a projected total contract amount of \$4,596,209, plus applicable sales tax.

STRATEGIC POLICY PRIORITY:

• Foster neighborhood, community, and economic development vitality and sustainability.

Through this contract, the City's garbage truck fleet is well maintained to deliver dependable garbage, yard waste and recycling pickup services to support the City's clean and sustainable environment.

BACKGROUND:

This contract provides service, repairs, and parts for various Peterbilt vehicles and equipment on an asneeded basis for Environmental Services, Solid Waste Management Division.

COMPETITIVE SOLICITATION:

Request for Bids Specification No. GF14-0213F was opened April 22, 2014. Three companies were invited to bid in addition to normal advertising of the project. One submittal was received.

CONTRACT HISTORY:

New contract.

SUSTAINABILITY:

Current and new garbage trucks and tractors are equipped with sophisticated pollution control systems including particulate filters and engine control systems to reduce emissions and fuel consumption. Western Peterbilt, Inc., (WPI) is equipped and authorized to make repairs, clean exhaust filters and make computerized adjustments according to the manufacture's specifications to keep vehicles running at optimum levels, meeting exhaust emission management requirements. They also recycle engine oil,



coolant waste, and soot from their diesel particulate filter cleaning machine. WPI has also purchased smaller delivery vehicles and changed and consolidated delivery routes in order to conserve fuel.

SBE/LEAP COMPLIANCE:

Not applicable.

RECOMMENDATION:

Public Works, Facilities Management Division, Fleet Services recommends a contract be awarded to Western Peterbilt, Inc., for service, repairs and parts for various Solid Waste Management Peterbilt vehicles and equipment. This contract provides authorized dealership repairs and other overflow work to meet the day-to-day fleet requirement of the Solid Waste Management Division.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The fiscal impact for a three year contract term is \$2,596,209, plus applicable sales tax. The full fiscal impact for a five year contract term is \$4,596,209, plus applicable sales tax. The current biennial impact is \$504,818, plus applicable sales tax. The expenditures and revenues are in ES Fund 4200.

SUMMARY:

The Environmental Services Department recommends a contract be awarded to low bidder Northwest Cascade, Inc., Puyallup, WA, in the amount of \$1,398,199.36, plus a 15 percent contingency, for a cumulative total of \$1,607,929.26, excluding sales tax, budgeted from ES Wastewater Fund 4300, ES Surface Water Fund 4301, and Water Fund 4600, to replace approximately 2,000 linear feet of 8-inch diameter wastewater sewer mains, 2,900 linear feet of 4-inch to 8-inch diameter water mains, and 260 linear feet of 8-inch to 15-inch diameter storm sewer mains from North 37th Street to North 39th Street between Tyler and Adams Streets.

STRATEGIC POLICY PRIORITY:

- Foster neighborhood, community, and economic development vitality and sustainability.
- Plan for and improve Public infrastructure that meets the Transportation needs of all Tacoma residents and visitors.

This project will replace underground potable water, storm sewer, and wastewater sewer pipes that have exceeded their design life and are at risk of failure. Failure of these pipes would have negative sustainability related impacts, including untreated wastewater entering Commencement Bay. In addition to replacing water and sewer infrastructure, the existing paved roads and alleys will be repaired in accordance with the City's Right-of-Way Restoration Policy which will have positive traffic impacts.

BACKGROUND:

ISSUE: The underground wastewater sewer pipes in the vicinity of this project were installed over 100 years ago and are at risk of failure. Replacement of these pipes, through this contract, will reduce the risk of failure which could result in the overflow of untreated wastewater into Commencement Bay and potentially into the basements of adjacent buildings. The levels of deterioration in these wastewater sewer pipes require that installation be performed using traditional excavation methods instead of pipe-lining. Since excavation will already be occurring to replace the wastewater sewer pipes, the adjacent aging water pipes and portions of the storm sewer pipes will also be replaced. Combining this work into a single project will lessen the impact to the traveling public.

ALTERNATIVES: Alternatives to the project include lining the existing pipes or taking no action to replace the existing wastewater sewers. The lining alternative is not feasible due to the advanced level of deterioration within these particular wastewater sewer pipes. The alternative of taking no action is unattractive since it would result in an increased risk of untreated wastewater sewer overflows every year this project is postponed.

COMPETITIVE SOLICITATION: Request for Bids Specification No. ES14-0211F was opened May 6, 2014. The project was advertised in the Tacoma Daily Index and the Seattle Daily Journal of Commerce, in addition to being listed on the City's Purchasing website. The City received seven bid proposals. Northwest Cascade, Inc. submitted the lowest responsive bid. The table below reflects the amount of the base award.

CONTRACT HISTORY: New Contract

SUSTAINABILITY: A reduced risk of wastewater sewer overflows from this project represents an improvement to human health and the environment. This project will also provide improvements to ergonomic components of Tacoma's sidewalks through curb ramp reconstruction at certain intersections within the project limits. Preventive rehabilitation of underground pipes in the project vicinity, prior to complete failure, represents the lowest lifecycle cost solution to maintaining these assets.

SBE/LEAP COMPLIANCE: The recommended contractor is in compliance with the Small Business Enterprise (SBE) Regulation general requirements per memorandum dated May 23, 2014. The SBE goal for this project is 14 percent. The SBE participation level of Northwest Cascade, Inc., the recommended contractor with the lowest evaluated bid, is 13.6 percent. The Local Employment and Apprenticeship Training Program (LEAP) goal is 800 hours.

RECOMMENDATION:

The Environmental Services Department recommends a contract be awarded Northwest Cascade, Inc., in the amount of \$1,398,199.36, plus a 15 percent contingency, for a cumulative total of \$1,607,929.26, excluding sales tax, to replace approximately 2,000 linear feet of 8-inch diameter wastewater sewer mains, 2,900 linear feet of 4-inch to 8-inch diameter water mains, and 260 linear feet of 8-inch to 15-inch diameter storm sewer mains from North 37th Street to North 39th Street between Tyler and Adams Streets.

SUMMARY:

The Public Works Department recommends a contract be awarded to low bidder Tucci & Sons, Inc., Tacoma, WA, in the amount of \$1,002,427.00, plus a 20 percent contingency, for a cumulative amount of \$1,202,912.40, sales tax not applicable, for the construction of Phase II the Historic Water Ditch Trail, a multi-modal trail from South Tacoma Way and South 80th Street to South 56th Street and South Clement Street.

STRATEGIC POLICY PRIORITY:

• Foster neighborhood, community, and economic development vitality and sustainability.

• Plan for and improve public infrastructure that meets the transportation needs of all Tacoma residents and visitors.

This project will remedy existing conditions by building/restoring the Historic Water Ditch Trail, enhancing local and regional commute options, and encouraging regular physical activity for health and wellness. In addition, the restoration of the entire Historic Water Ditch Trail is a critical element of Tacoma's non-motorized transportation system and will connect two regional growth centers, regional and countywide trail systems, and regional and local multi-modal transportation facilities. The project will also link neighborhoods, business districts, and several schools and parks.

BACKGROUND:

ISSUE: The Historic Water Ditch Trail is two miles in length with four unimproved trail segments remaining to complete a contiguous and safe trail corridor. There are missing sidewalks, curb ramps, and no transitions to planned bike sharrows in the roadway. Currently, there is no trail link to the new Sounder Train regional passenger rail station or the South Tacoma Business Center/District.

This project will construct the remaining four trail segments, sidewalks, curb ramps, trail lighting, concrete retaining walls, landscaping, fencing, and striping (crosswalks, sharrows, etc.) from South 80th Street and South Tacoma Way to South 56th Street and South Clement Street. It will also provide a link to the new Sounder Train regional passenger rail station.

ALTERNATIVES: The alternative is for pedestrians to use the existing sidewalk and bicyclists to use the road with vehicles. This option could compromise the safety of the public and prevent the City from implementing the goals and policies of the Regional Growth Center and the City's Mobility Master Plan.

COMPETITIVE SOLICITATION: Request for Bids Specification No. PW14-0040F was opened April 29, 2014. Six submittals were received. Five Bid Proposals were reviewed and met the general



formal bid requirements. One proposal by Nordic Construction, Inc., did not acknowledge Addendum #3, and is deemed to be non-responsive. The table below reflects the amount of the base award.

 - A minimum of 16 vertical feet from grade shall be required to access and maintain the existing wastewater main and appurtenances located in the alley.

5. Tacoma Power.

- a. Vacation of the alleyway air rights shall be dependent on the existing overhead power lines being converted to underground. The developer is aware of these requirements and shall be responsible for all associated costs.
- b. If the developer wishes to proceed before it pays for and executes the overhead to underground conversion, then Tacoma Power will need to maintain the air rights over the entire area. If it wishes to proceed, then Tacoma Power will need to make it contingent on the lines being converted or maintaining an easement over the entire area.

6. CenturyLink.

A 12-foot wide easement the length of the vacated area shall be granted for underground and aerial facilities. Any relocation will be done at 28 Proctor's expense.

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7. Public Works Department.

The Petitioner shall pave the alley in question. The Petitioner can meet this condition by construction of the paving or by providing assurance that the paving will be installed by including the requirement as a development condition and/or posting a bond insuring its completion.

5517 A Network Operations Center Technician (CSC 5517) when designated by management as Lead shall receive an additional 10 percent above the current step.

5517 A Network Operations Center Technician (CSC 5517) may advance to non-automatic Step 445, upon the approval of management, when certain criteria are met as outlined in the collective bargaining agreement.

5518 A Telecommunications Technician I - (CSC 5518) must pass a skills test prior to advancing beyond step <u>82</u>. A Telecommunications Technician I, when designated by management as Lead, shall receive an additional 10 percent above the current step.

5518 A Telecommunications Technician I (CSC 5518) assigned to work in a vault or manhole that exceeds 60 inches in depth and contains either (1) exposed energized secondary bus or (2) energized primary wire or equipment, shall be paid a 3 percent application of rate above his or her regular rate of pay for the time actually worked in the vault, with a two-hour minimum.

5540 A Telecommunications Network Construction Technician (CSC 5540) must pass a skills test prior to advancing to step 73 and must pass a skills test prior to advancing to step 105. A Telecommunications Network Construction Technician, when assigned by management as Lead over a group or project, shall receive an additional 10 percent above the current step.

5540 A Telecommunications Network Construction Technician (CSC 5540) assigned to work in a vault or manhole that exceeds 60 inches in depth and contains either (1) exposed energized secondary bus or (2) energized primary wire or equipment, shall be paid a 3 percent application of rate above his or her regular rate of pay for the time actually worked in the vault, with a two-hour minimum.

5543 A Telecommunications Network Technician (CSC 5543) must pass a skills test prior to advancing to step 73 and must pass a skills test prior to advancing to step 405. A Telecommunications Network Technician, when assigned by management as Lead over a group or project, shall receive an additional 10 percent above the current step.

5543 A Telecommunications Network Technician (CSC 5543) assigned to work in a vault or manhole that exceeds 60 inches in depth and contains either (1) exposed energized secondary bus or (2) energized primary wire or equipment, shall be paid a 3 percent application of rate above his or her regular rate of pay for the time actually worked in the vault, with a two-hour minimum.

2125 An Electrical Inspector (CSC 2125), assigned lead duties, shall be paid-at 118 percent of the journey-level rate6.3 percent above the Step 3 rate of pay. Such assignment shall be at the sole discretion of management.

5003 Employees, in the classification of Transmission & Distribution Flagger (CSC 5003), are excluded from the RHS Medical Savings Account plan. The classification of Transmission & Distribution Flagger (CSC 5003) will be comprised of a three-step range and step 2 rate of pay will be reached after working 1,040 hours, and step 3 rate of pay will be reached after working an additional 1,040 hours.

<u>base111.25%</u>; Senior Meter/Relay Technician <u>14.25 percent over base119.25%</u>; Assistant Supervisor Meters & Relays <u>25 percent over base130.25%</u>.

5236 Electrician (CSC 5236) The City will reimburse employees in this classification for the cost of license recertification every three years. The City will pay the full cost of tuition for any required CEU training when approved in advance by management. Training may be taken during a regularly scheduled shift, with prior management approval.

5243 Employees in the classification of Wire Electrician Apprentice (CSC 5243) working (excluding housekeeping) in a vault or manhole that (1) exceeds 60 inches in depth, and



(2) contains energized (exposed) secondary bus or involves working on or within two feet of energized primary equipment shall be compensated at the pay rates which followreceive 3 percent above their base rate of pay for the time actually worked in the vault (with a two-hour minimum), without regard to Article 9.1 of the Collective Bargaining Agreement: Step 1 – 81 percent; Ste 2 – 83 percent; Step 3 – 85.5 percent; Step 4 – 88 percent; Step 5 – 90.5 percent; Step 6 – 93 percent; and Step 7 – 95.5 percent.

5245 Employees in the classification of Wire Electrician (CSC 5245) working (excluding housekeeping) in a vault or manhole that (1) exceeds 60 inches in depth, and (2) contains energized (exposed) secondary bus or involves working on or within two feet of energized primary equipment shall be compensated at 112.5 percent of journey payreceive 3 percent above their base rate of pay for the time actually worked in the vault (with a two-hour minimum), without regard to Article 9.1 of the Collective Bargaining Agreement.

5246 Employees in the classification of Wire Electrician Senior working (excluding housekeeping) in a vault or manhole that (1) exceeds 60 inches in depth, and (2) contains energized (exposed) secondary bus or involves working on or within two feet of energized primary equipment shall be compensated at 125 percent of journey payreceive 3 percent above their base rate of pay for the time actually worked in the vault (with a two-hour minimum), without regard to Article 9.1 of the Collective Bargaining Agreement.

5246 Employees in the classification of Wire Electrician, Senior assigned and working as Coordinators shall receive a 3 percent applied rate for all hours so worked. Employees will be eligible for scheduled and emergency overtime. After six months, the employee is ineligible for scheduled overtime. The applied rate shall not be subject to the provisions of Article 9.1 of the Collective Bargaining Agreement.

5253 Employees in the classification of Line Clearance Tree Trimmer (CSC 5253) inspecting two or more contract line clearance tree crews shall be paid at the Senior Line Clearance Tree Trimmer rate of pay.

5254 Senior Line Clearance Tree Trimmers (CSC 5254) shall be paid <u>108 percent an</u> <u>additional 5 percent</u> when supervising five or more persons.

5254 Employees in the classification of Senior Line Clearance Tree Trimmer (CSC 5254), who acquire and maintain an International Society of Arborist (ISA) Certification, shall receive an additional 3 percent.

5255 Employees in the classification of Line Electrician working (excluding housekeeping) in a vault or manhole that (1) exceeds 60 inches in depth, and (2) contains energized (exposed) secondary bus or involves working on or within two feet of energized primary equipment shall be compensated at 112.5 percent of journey payreceive 3 percent above their base rate of pay for the time actually worked in the vault (with a two-hour minimum), without regard to Article 9.1 of the Collective Bargaining Agreement.

All Line Electrician (CSC 5255) applied rates shall be calculated using the 400 percent journey-level base Line Electrician rate. A journey-level Line Electrician (CSC 5255) shall be paid 8579.9 percent of the journey-level rate in the event he or she shall be required to perform all the duties of a Line Electrician with the exception of normal climbing duties as established in the civil service class specification 5255 Line Electrician. A Line Electrician when assigned as a trouble person shall receive 115.5 percent of the journey-level rate6 percent above the Line Electrician rate.

5257 Employees in the classification of Line Electrician, Senior assigned and working as Coordinators shall receive a 3 percent applied rate for all hours so worked. Employees will be eligible for scheduled and emergency overtime. After six months, the employee is ineligible for scheduled overtime. The applied rate shall not be subject to the provisions of Article 9.1 of the Collective Bargaining Agreement.

5260 Employees in the classification of Electrical Construction & Maintenance Supervisor Assistant working (excluding housekeeping) in a vault or manhole that (1) exceeds 60 inches in depth, and (2) contains energized (exposed) secondary bus or involves working on or within two feet of energized primary equipment shall be compensated at 126 percent of journey pay for the time actually worked in the vault (with a two-hour minimum), without regard to Article 9.1 of the Collective Bargaining Agreement.

5270 When two or more Fire Electrical Maintenance journey-level employees, or one journey-level employee and more than one helper, are assigned to work together as a crew without direct supervision, one employee shall be paid 4 percent above Fire Maintenance Electrician. This shall not apply when two or more Fire Electrical Maintenance journey-level employees or one Fire Electrical Maintenance journey-level employee and more than one helper are assigned for reasons of inspection or testing or when two or more Fire Electrical Maintenance journey-level employees or one journey-level employee and more than one helper performs fire station maintenance of fire alarm battery room. This shall not apply unless a supervisor is absent from the work site for more than two hours.

5273 Signal & Lighting Electrician Apprentice (CSC 5273) employees working (excluding housekeeping) in a vault or manhole that (1) exceeds 60 inches in depth, and (2) contains energized (exposed) secondary bus or involves working on or within two feet of energized primary equipment shall be compensated at the pay rate that follows receive 3 percent above their base rate of pay for the time actually worked in the vault (with a two hour minimum) without regard to Article 9.1 of the Collective Bargaining Agreement: Step 1 – 81 percent; Step 2 – 83 percent; Step 3 – 85.5 percent; Step 4 – 88 percent; Step 5 – 90.5 percent; Step 6 – 93 percent; Step 7 – 95.5 percent; and non-automatic Step 8 – 100 percent. Effective October 1, 2004, the Step 8 rate shall increase to 103 percent of the journey level rate.

5274 Signal and Lighting Electrician Senior (CSC 5274) employees working (excluding housekeeping) in a vault or manhole that (1) exceeds 60 inches in depth; and (2) contains energized (exposed) secondary bus or involves working on or within two feet of energized primary equipment shall be compensated at 121 percent of journey payreceive 3 percent above their base rate of pay for the time actually worked in the vault (with a two hour minimum) without regard to Article 9.1 of the Collective Bargaining Agreement.



5275 Signal and Lighting Electrician (CSC 5275) employees working (excluding housekeeping) in a vault or manhole that (1) exceeds 60 inches in depth; and (2) contains energized (exposed) secondary bus or involves working on or within two feet of energized primary equipment shall be compensated at 103 percent of journey payreceive 3 percent above their base rate of pay for the time actually worked in the vault (with a two hour minimum) without regard to Article 9.1 of the Collective Bargaining Agreement. A journey-level Signal and Lighting Electrician assigned to modify or repair electrical, mechanical or solid-state traffic signal control devices shall be paid 104 percent of the journey-level rate.

5275 When two or more journey-level Signal and Lighting Electricians and/or a Signal and Lighting Electrician and any other Signal and Lighting employee are assigned to work together as a crew without direct supervision, one employee (i.e. the most senior Signal and Lighting Electrician in the case of two or more Signal and Lighting Electricians), shall be paid 4 percent above the Signal and Lighting Electrician104 percent of the journey-level rate. Signal and Lighting Electricians assigned to Swing Crew shall receive 4 percent above their base rate of pay. This shall not apply when two or more Signal and Lighting Electricians are assigned for reasons of inspection or testing. This shall further not apply unless a supervisor is absent from the work site for more than two hours.

5275 The Signal and Lighting Electricians assigned to the Maintenance Crew shall be paid at a rate of 4 percent above Signal and Lighting Electrician. Signal and Lighting Electricians assigned to perform locate duties shall receive 103 percent of the journey-level rate. Signal and Lighting Electricians assigned as construction inspectors responsible for inspecting more than one crew shall receive 116.5 percent of the journey-level rate as Inspector/Locators shall receive 10 percent above their base rate of pay.

5275 Signal and Lighting Electrician (CSC 5275) who are assigned to the controller shop and responsible for duties as outlined in the collective bargaining agreement shall receive 4 percent above their base rate of pay.

5301 When two or more Hydro Project Mechanics (CSC 5301) are assigned to the same task, one shall be designated as the lead worker and shall receive 116.5 percent of the journey-level ratean additional 6.5 percent. When a Hydro Project Mechanic (CSC 5301), working at the Cowlitz, Cushman or Nisqually hydroelectric projects, has two or more City employees assigned to them for the same task, or has been assigned to oversee the work of two or more contract employees, the employee shall receive 116.5 percent of the journey level ratean additional 6.5 percent as the lead worker. The above shall not apply when assigned to do specific workplace skills and/or safety training, or when working as a safety watch at a confined space.

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Section 4. That Sections 1 and 3 of this ordinance shall become effective retroactive to April 1, 2013.
