That the salaries and classifications set forth in the Compensation Plan of the City of Tacoma for permanent employees, or the closest classifications, shall be applied, contingent upon funding, to similar positions of the special project. The Compensation Plan is incorporated herein by reference as if fully set forth.

Section 4. That employees who have been hired or may be hired as special project employees herein shall receive benefits in accordance with and pursuant to the provisions of the Compensation Plan of the City of Tacoma. They shall be given a one-time binding and irrevocable election to participate in the City's Retirement System pursuant to TMC 1.30. Special project employees hired to work on the identified special project shall not be eligible for longevity pay; and further, that should any current regular employee eligible for longevity pay be assigned to the special project, the employee so assigned shall continue to be eligible for longevity pay and shall become or remain a member of the City's Retirement

System pursuant to any applicable provisions of TMC 1.30, and contributions shall be paid therein by the City pursuant to TMC 1.30.360.

Section 5. That, inasmuch as the positions to be filled pursuant to this resolution are of a temporary nature and are unique in that they pertain only to the aforementioned special project, they are deemed unclassified, temporary positions of limited duration and persons so employed in such positions shall have no claim to further or continued employment with the City of Tacoma after cessation of such special project or after cessation of activities funded by said program, except pursuant to obtaining status as regular City of Tacoma employees under the provisions of the TMC or pursuant to further action of the City Council relating to this special project.

Section 6. That all acts by agents or employees of the City consistent herewith are hereby ratified.

Section 7. That the City Manager is hereby authorized to direct the appropriate City officers to proceed with the necessary actions for the completion of this special project.

A RESOLUTION relating to community and economic development and the sale of surplus real property; authorizing the execution of Amendment No. 2 to the Purchase and Sale and Development Agreement with North America Asset Management Group, LLC, to adjust performance dates and development parameters under the agreement in exchange for an additional \$2,400,000 nonrefundable deposit against the purchase of City real property at the proximate location of South 21st to 23rd Streets and Jefferson Avenue to Tacoma Avenue.

WHEREAS, on August 18, 2015, the City entered into a Purchase and Sale and Development agreement ("PSA") with North America Asset Management Group, LLC ("NAAM"), for the sale of City real property, subject to City Council ratification, at the proximate location of South 21st to 23rd Streets and Jefferson Avenue to Tacoma Avenue ("Property"), and

WHEREAS the City acquired the Property parcels from 1998-2002, using approximately \$4.1 million in proceeds from a 1997 sale of tax-exempt bonds (1997B), and the Property secures a \$4.2 million General Fund loan made to the Police Department in 2005 for capital construction, and

WHEREAS approximately \$5.12 million is currently outstanding on the 1997B bonds, which is due to be paid off by 2018, and

WHEREAS there is an outstanding loan from the Open Space Fund of approximately \$175,000, consisting of principal and interest, and

WHEREAS, on June 14, 2016, the City Council ratified the Purchase and Sale and Development Agreement with NAAM, and approved the first amendment to the agreement, which revised the legal description and amended performance deadlines, and



WHEREAS NAAM is requesting an additional revision to the agreement to extend performance dates to allow adequate time for permitting approvals and finalizing financing, and

WHEREAS the amendment will increase the number of residential units built and will increase the number of phases of construction from two to three, and

WHEREAS, with this amendment, the closing date for the purchase of the property is intended to occur no later than August 31, 2017, after obtaining a site development permit, submitting the building permit package, and depositing funds with the City or bonding for offsite improvements required by the City, and

WHEREAS development will include over 800,000 square feet and will be constructed in three phases, as follows:

- Phase 1A will include a minimum of 220 residential units, parking, and a minimum of 20,000 square feet of commercial/professional or retail space;
- Phase 1B will include approximately 200,000 square feet of retail space, a minimum of 130 residential units, and parking. Combined Phase 1A and 1B will include a minimum of 450 parking stalls; and

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**ORDINANCE NO. 28402** 

AN ORDINANCE relating to hotel and home occupation licenses; amending Chapter 6B.130 and Chapter 6B.140 of the Tacoma Municipal Code to clarify that short-term rentals of entire single-family dwellings and residential dwellings with less than three bedrooms for less than 30 days is not subject to hotel or home occupation license requirements; and updating language and license requirements to reflect current enforcement needs.

WHEREAS the City currently requires facilities that offer three or more guest rooms for rent for periods of less than 30 days to obtain a hotel license to operate in the City, and

WHEREAS the City's requirements for hotel licenses has not changed substantively since 1970, and the license fee has not changed since 1980, and

WHEREAS the proposed revisions to TMC 6B.140 include updating the chapter title to "Transient Accommodations" to better describe the business activities that fall under the license requirements; updating definitions, fees, and record requirements; exempting "short-term rental of an entire dwelling" from hotel license requirements; and moving advertising restrictions for all unlicensed businesses to TMC 6B.10, and

WHEREAS TMC Title 13 was recently updated for short-term rentals of single-family homes, and

WHEREAS TMC Title 6 and Title 13 should have consistent regulation of short-term rental activity to ensure that enforcement of the licensing and land use codes is fair and understandable; Now, Therefore,

Section 1. That Chapter 6B.130 of the Tacoma Municipal Code, relating to home occupations, is hereby amended as set forth in the attached Exhibit "A."

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# Chapter 6B.130

## **HOME OCCUPATIONS**

3	Sections:	

6B.130.010 License required – Conditional home occupation agreement.

6B.130.020 License fee.

6B.130.030 Exemptions.

# 6B.130.010 License required - Conditional home occupation agreement.

A. It is unlawful for any person to engage in a "home occupation," as defined in TMC 13.06.700, within a residential building or building accessory thereto without first obtaining a license pursuant to the provisions of this chapter. Prior to issuance of said license, the Director must be satisfied that the applicant will be in conformance with applicable laws, including, but not limited to, the criteria set out in TMC 13.06.100.E, and the applicant must also manifest his or her assent to comply with all applicable laws and regulations by entering into a Conditional Home Occupation Agreement provided by the Director which will contain the code and regulatory requirements most directly applicable to each applicant's situation.

B. Both the license and the Conditional Home Occupation Agreement are personal to the original applicant, and may not be assigned. If there is a change of location of the licensed home occupation, the license holder need not obtain a new license, but is required to enter into a new Conditional Home Occupation Agreement. Should the type of home occupation be changed, the license holder must obtain a new license and enter into a new Conditional Home Occupation Agreement.

C. "Home occupation" means a business, profession, occupation, or trade conducted for gain or support and located entirely within a residential building or a building accessory thereto, which use is accessory, incidental, and secondary to the use of the building for dwelling purposes and does not change the essential residential character or appearance of such building. The intent of this definition is to maintain consistency with Home Occupations as defined in TMC 13.06.700. of the City's Zoning Code.

### **6B.130.030** Exemptions.

The <u>Conditional Home Occupation Agreement and</u> fee assessed by the provisions of this chapter shall not apply to:

- A. Any charitable organization;
- B. Day cares, bed and breakfasts, short term rentals, and boarding homes adult family homes as defined in TMC 13.06.700;
- 20 C. Business of renting or leasing real property; or
  - D. Persons whose gross business income is derived from service activity in or with the City generating annual gross income of less than \$1,000.

6B.140.010 License required.

It shall be unlawful for any person, either as owner, lessor, lessee, manager, or agent, to conduct, keep, manage, or operate or cause to be kept, managed or operated, <u>transient accommodationsestablishments</u> such as hotels, motels, rooming houses, or lodging houses, or bed and breakfast facilities in the City without first obtaining a license pursuant to the provisions of this chapter.

#### 6B.140.020 Definitions.

"Adult hotel" means a transient accommodation that offers a guest room for rent for any period of time less than 10 hours or allows a person to sub-rent the guest room for a period of time that is less than 10 hours.

"Guest" shall-means any person to whom lodging and other services are furnished, and all other persons occupying or registered to occupy a lodging unit at a transient accommodation visiting a room or rooms.

"Guest room" means an individual room or group of interconnected rooms intended for sleeping that is for rent or use by a guest, and is individually designated by number, letter, or other means of identification. A guest room may or may not include areas for cooking and eating.

"Hotel<u>Transient accommodation</u>" shall means and include hotels, motels, rooming houses, lodging houses, or any other building or facility, such as a hotel, motel, condominium, resort, bed and breakfast, short-term rental that meets the definition of TMC 13.06.700, or any other facility or buildings-place offering used for human habitation containing more than three or more guest rooms to persons rooms intended or designed to be used or which may be used for sleeping or living quarters by guests for periods of not moreless than 9030 days, which are rented or hired out for compensation as a business, except transient accommodation shall not include a short-term rental where the entire dwelling is rented.

#### 6B.140.030 License fees.

The license fees for a hotel transient accommodation are hereby fixed at \$75.00. as follows:

Room	\$ .50 each

#### 6B.140.050 Hotel register Record requirements.

Every person operating or conducting any hotel-transient accommodation as defined herein shall at all times keep therein a hotel-register in the form of a permanently bound volume or a permanent card file system which shall be kept in chronological order by date and be inscribed with inkinclude the time the guest checks into and out of the guest room, the name and home mailing address of each and every guest, which shall include the person renting the guest room, and the names of all other persons occupying or visiting athe guest room or rooms therein. The name or names of such guests shall be written upon the register, either by themselves or the person renting such room or rooms, and the proprietor of such hotel shall thereupon write opposite each name so registered the number of the room or rooms assigned to each guest and the time when the same is rented, and until the names and entries are made in the register no guest shall be permitted to occupy privately any room in said hotel. The owner or operator shall also require valid photo identification for all guests, including those paying in cash, money order, traveler check or personal checks, or by voucher, at the time of registration. Such identification shall be in valid and current form issued by a governmental entity, which shall be recorded in the register.

At the time said room or rooms are surrendered, the proprietor shall enter the time thereof opposite the name of the person surrendering said room or rooms. The register shall be open at all times to the inspection of any police officer of the City or the state of Washington or other governmental agency. The operator of any hotel-transient accommodation shall also-keep a permanent record of all reservations made for and on behalf of any guest at any other hotel, and a copy of guest photo identification taken at the time of registration. Registrationsuch records are to be kept in chronological order by date and retained for a period of three years, and shall be open to inspection at all times by the police



departmentany police officer of the City or the state of Washington or other City official conducting official City business.

# 6B.140.060 Manager required on premises.

Every person conducting, keeping, managing, or operating, or causing to be conducted, kept, managed, or operated, any <a href="https://hoteltransient.accommodation">hoteltransient accommodation</a> present on the premises of said <a href="https://hoteltransient.accommodation">hoteltransient accommodation</a> present on the premises of said <a href="https://hoteltransient.accommodation">hoteltransient.accommodation</a> at all times that the same is being conducted, operated, and maintained. Said manager or person in charge shall be screened for civil and criminal background information by a company that is licensed with the City prior to being employed at any <a href="https://hoteltransient.accommodation">hoteltransient.accommodation</a> licensed hereunder.

### 6B.140.070 Prohibited use of hoteltransient accommodation.

No person in charge of any hotel transient accommodation, either as owner, agent, manager, clerk, servant, or employee or in any other capacity, shall use, permit, or suffer to be used the hotel transient accommodation or any portion thereof for the purpose of an adult hotel, prostitution; the illegal manufacture, possession, sale, distribution, or use of narcotics or dangerous drugs as designated or defined by TMC 8.28; or shall permit any fighting, boisterous conduct, or any other disorderly conduct therein.

### 6B.140.080 Guest Rroom numbering identification.

Each sleepingguest room and apartment in a hoteltransient accommodation shall be numberedidentified in a plain and conspicuous manner by placing such numberidentification, such as a number, letter, or other method of identification on the outside door of each guest room, and no two guest rooms shall bear the same numberidentification. In addition to this requirement, hotels and motelstransient accommodations may be subject to TMC 8.45.080, which contains additional site hardening requirements.

### 6B.140.090 Advertising unlicensed premises.

No building shall be advertised as conducting any activity that falls under the definition of a hotel as set forth herein, nor shall any sign, placard, poster, banner, card or other advertising matter using any of the words "hotel," "rooming house," "lodging house," "rooms," "lodging," or words of similar import be placed, erected, displayed, or maintained on the outside or in close proximity to any hotel building, or in the inside in such a manner as it may be seen from the outside thereof, unless the person conducting a hotel therein is licensed pursuant to the provisions of this subtitle, and such license is unexpired and unrevoked.

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# **ORDINANCE NO. 28404**

AN ORDINANCE relating to traffic; amending Chapters 11.05 and 11.55 of the Tacoma Municipal Code, relating to the Model Traffic Ordinance and the Heavy Haul Industrial Corridor, to revise City regulations applicable to street traffic.

WHEREAS the Public Works Department desires to amend sections of Tacoma Municipal Code ("TMC") Chapter 11.05, Model Traffic Ordinance, and Chapter 11.55, Heavy Haul Industrial Corridor, to allow the City to regulate and enforce vehicle laws within alignment of the adopted Transportation Master Plan, as well as provide a means to improve and address traffic conditions, and

WHEREAS TMC 11.05 includes street traffic regulations of the City applicable to street traffic in the City, and

WHEREAS the proposed amendments to TMC 11.05, as set forth in the attached Exhibit "A," will amend the following sections: 11.05.150 One-way streets designated; 11.05.250 City Manager regulates and designates on-street parking restrictions; 11.05.490 Arterial streets designated; 11.05.500 Yield right-of-way intersections designated; 11.05.520 Thirty miles per hour limit - Streets designated; 11.05.530 Thirty-five miles per hour limit - Streets designated; and 11.05.540 Forty miles per hour limit - Streets designated; and will repeal the following sections: 11.05.460 Blind pedestrians - Vehicles to stop; and 11.05.470 Blind pedestrians - Use of white canes, and

WHEREAS TMC 11.55 identifies the designated arterial streets within the Port of Tacoma that may be used to haul overweight freight with a heavy haul permit, and



WHEREAS the proposed amendment to TMC 11.55, as set forth in the attached Exhibit "B," will amend Section 11.55.020, Defined terms, to remove a section of Milwaukee Way as a designated heavy haul corridor, which will facilitate the vacation of that section of the roadway, and

WHEREAS the proposed amendments are a result of internal staff, community residents, and stakeholder group requests, and

WHEREAS City staff reviewed the proposed amendments with the Transportation Commission and the Bicycle Pedestrian Technical Advisory Group in 2015, and presented the proposed amendments to the Infrastructure, Planning and Sustainability Commission on February 10 and July 27, 2016, and

WHEREAS the proposed amendments are consistent with the City's Transportation Master Plan; Now, Therefore,

# BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF TACOMA:

11.05.250 City <u>Traffic Engineer Manager</u> regulates and designates on-street parking restrictions.

The City <u>Traffic Engineer Manager</u>, or <u>his/her</u> designee, has the authority to establish on-street parking restrictions to regulate the flow of traffic and/or parking. Such restrictions include, without limitation, Loading Zones, One-Hour Parking, Two-Hour Parking, No Parking Anytime, Disabled Parking, and similar designations. No such parking restrictions shall apply to law enforcement or other emergency vehicles when in service.

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It shall be the duty of every person operating a motor vehicle or street car on the public streets, on receiving a signal from wholly or partially blind persons crossing the public street intersections, given by lifting and waving a cane or walking stick wholly white in color or white with red end or bottom, in such manner as to be plainly visible to the operator of such motor vehicle or street car, to bring such motor vehicle or street car to a stop and remain stationary so long as may be necessary to prevent accidents to and ensure the safety of such wholly or partially blind persons. Provided, however, that this section shall not apply to drivers of motor vehicles or street cars approaching street intersections controlled by traffic lights.

## 11.05.470 Blind pedestrians Use of white canes.

11.05.460 Blind pedestrians - Vehicles to stop.

In the interests of public safety, it is unlawful for any person other than wholly or partially blind persons to give the signal referred to in Section 11.05.460 hereof.

11.05.490 Arterial streets designated.

Those portions of the following streets are hereby designated as and are declared to be arterial or through protected highways, and are further classified as principal arterial highways, minor arterials, collector arterials, or nonclassified arterials, as hereinafter defined: Principal arterials are protected streets that have a high percentage of long-distance vehicle trips; minor arterials are protected streets that have a near balanced percentage of long-distance vehicle trips, with local access usage; collector arterials are protected streets that have a low percentage of long-distance vehicle trips, and nonclassified arterials are protected streets that are not classified in any of the above categories.

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# 11.55.020 **Defined terms.**

For purposes of this chapter, the below-stated terms and phrases shall have the following meaning:

A. Container Chassis. "Container Chassis" shall mean a semitrailer of skeleton construction limited to a bottom frame, one or more axles, specially built and fitted with locking devices for the transport of cargo containers, so that when the container chassis and container are assembled, the units serve the same function as an over-the-road trailer.

B. Director. "Director" shall mean and refer to the Director of Public Works or successor department or his or her designee.

C. Heavy Haul Industrial Corridor. "Heavy Haul Industrial Corridor" shall mean and refer to such sections of public highways as are included in the following description:

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**ORDINANCE NO. 28405** 

AN ORDINANCE relating to pay and compensation; amending Chapter 1.12 of the Tacoma Municipal Code to implement rates of pay and compensation for non-represented and represented employees, and to implement changes to reflect the organizational structure; and declaring the effective dates thereof.

### BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF TACOMA:

Section 1. That Section 1.12.229 of the Tacoma Municipal Code is hereby amended, effective January 1, 2017, to read as follows:

#### 1.12.229 **VEBA Accounts.**

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D. In addition to VEBA benefits for which an employee may be eligible under subsections A and B above, the City shall deposit \$5100.00 per month into an individual VEBA Account for each employee represented by the Tacoma Police Management Association, Local 26, who is also an LEOFF II pension system member, per the collective bargaining agreement; provided, however, contributions for employees who become represented by said bargaining unit after May 21, 2001, will be made beginning the first full month following an employee's permanent appointment to a classification represented by the bargaining unit.

4205, 4206 An employee in the classification of Police Lieutenant (CSC 4205) or Police Captain (CSC 4206) shall receive an applied rate of 1–2 percent above their base wage in recognition for working toward the being CALEA Accreditation accredited and for the successful maintenance of the accreditation as outlined in the Tacoma Police Management Association, Local 26, collective bargaining agreement.
