Section 3. That the salaries and classifications set forth in the
 Compensation Plan of the City of Tacoma for permanent employees, or the closest
 classifications, shall be applied, contingent upon funding, to similar positions of the
 special projects. The Compensation Plan is incorporated herein by reference as if
 fully set forth.

8 Section 4. That employees who have been hired or may be hired as special 9 project employees herein shall receive benefits in accordance with and pursuant to 10 the provisions of the Compensation Plan of the City of Tacoma. They shall be 11 12 given a one-time binding and irrevocable election to participate in the City's 13 Retirement System pursuant to TMC 1.30 and shall not be eligible for longevity 14 pay; and further, that should any current regular employee eligible for longevity pay 15 be assigned to the special project, the employee so assigned shall continue to be 16 eligible for longevity pay and shall become or remain a member of the City's 17 18 Retirement System pursuant to any applicable provisions of TMC 1.30, and 19 contributions shall be paid therein by the City pursuant to TMC 1.30.360.

3	(1) Safe Routes to School Projects Projects will employ strategies outlined in the Safe Routes to School Implementation Plan
 including various construction projects. Projects include: Infrastructure Assessment Infrastructure Improvements, School Zone Warning Beacons, and Manitou Elen Edison Elementary, Whitman Elementary, Roosevelt Elementary, and Lincoln H improvements. Total Estimated Project Cost: \$2,200,000 	including various construction projects. Projects include: Infrastructure Assessment;
	Edison Elementary, Whitman Elementary, Roosevelt Elementary, and Lincoln High School
	Total Estimated Project Cost: \$2,200,000
7	Designation Duration: Continues until December 31, 2027
8	(2) Streets Initiative, Contracted Maintenance Projects The residents of Tacoma approved the Street Initiatives (Proposition A and Proposition
9	No. 3) in November 2015, approving funding to repair and improve City streets. The 2015 Voted Street Initiative Fund 1085 was created and approved by the City Council under
10	Ordinance No. 28344 on February 9, 2016. This fund provides for arterial street improvements, non-motorized improvements, and residential street repairs. Multiple
11	Streets Initiative contracted maintenance projects will be constructed annually. Total Estimated Project Cost for five years: \$50,000,000
12	Designation Duration: Continues until December 31, 2027
13	(3) Sheridan Avenue 61st to 72nd Arterial Street Improvements
14 15	This project will reconstruct Sheridan Avenue from South 61st Street to South 72nd Street to include roadway reconstruction, curb and gutter installation, ADA compliant curb ramps
15	and sidewalks, re-channelization to widen lanes and add sharrows, a 10-foot wide separated shared use path along the park on the west side, crossing signals upgrades at the South 72nd Street intersection, and stormwater upgrades.
17	Total Estimated Project Cost: \$7,020,006 Designation Duration: Continues until December 31, 2027
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19	(4) Portland Avenue Freight and Access Improvements This project extends along the Portland Avenue corridor from the north leg of Lincoln
20	Avenue to the north leg of East 27th Street, and east along Lincoln Avenue approximately 200 LF to the Lincoln Avenue bridge deck. The project includes the replacement of
21	asphalt with concrete from Lincoln Avenue to East 25th Street, a roadway re-channelization from East 25th to East 27th Street to tie-in to the Portland Avenue
22	interchange portion of WSDOT's I-5 HOV project, addition of a new traffic signal at the State Route 509 off-ramp and upgrades to three existing signals to add interconnects at all
23	four traffic signals, installation of ITS Fiber Optic, replacement of unsafe/unfit and addition of missing link sidewalks (East 25th to Lincoln Avenue), installation of ADA curb ramp
24	improvements and a new mid-block pedestrian crossing with push button activation, and
25	bridge deck repairs/resurfacing including expansion joint repair as conditions warrant. Total Estimated Project Cost: \$4,358,000
26	Designation Duration: Continues until December 31, 2027



(5) South "I" Street Overlay

	(5) South "I" Street Overlay
1	The project will provide an asphalt overlay on South "I" Street at the intersection of 6th Avenue. The overlay will extend in each of the four directions of the intersection for about one block. ADA ramps will be installed or updated where necessary. Bike lanes will
2	be provided on 6th Avenue for the length of the project, both sides of the street. These
3	bike lanes are in coordination with another project that will provide bike lanes to the downtown core. Existing pavement will be ground at the curb lanes to match existing
4	gutter grades. A minor amount of full dig out (less than 10 percent) and full paving will be provided. Traffic signal detection loops will be replaced with new detection as necessary.
5	Total Estimated Project Cost: \$1,016,641 Designation Duration: Continues until December 31, 2027
6	(C) South 21st Street and "C" Street Signal
7	(6) South 21st Street and "C" Street Signal This project will construct a warranted traffic signal at South 21st Street and "C" Street,
8	which is adjacent to the University of Washington Tacoma ("UWT"). The project will provide interconnect for signal coordination with the signal at South 21st Street and
9	Jefferson Avenue, which is 300 feet west. South 21st Street is a principal arterial that serves as the terminus of State Route 509 and provides direct connection to Interstate
10	705 on/off ramps. "C" Street is a collector arterial that provides pedestrian and vehicular access between UWT and Tacoma's revitalizing Brewery District that includes parking for
11	UWT students and historic warehouses converting to residential and commercial uses. Total Estimated Project Cost: \$1,173,735
12	Designation Duration: Continues until December 31, 2027
13	(7) East 64th Street Improvements: McKinley Avenue to East City Limits
14	This project will reconstruct the roadway to complete street standards including adding bicycle facilities, wider sidewalks with ADA compliant ramps, streetlights, and storm water
15	improvements. The first phase of the project from Pacific to McKinley has been completed. The remaining two phases will complete McKinley Avenue to the East City
16	limits. The Streets Initiative Fund provided grant match for Phase I and \$1,300,000 in design funds for the project. Additional Streets Initiative funding will be used for grant
17	match on the remaining phases of work. Total Estimated Project Cost: \$17,800,000
18	Designation Duration: Continues until December 31, 2027
19	(8) Puyallup Avenue: South "C" Street to Portland Avenue
20	The Puyallup Avenue project is 1.2 miles extending from Portland Avenue to South "C" Street, including the Portland Avenue intersection. The project scope includes a complete
21	reconstruction of the roadway with concrete pavement, complete street elements including bike lanes, sidewalks/curb ramps, bulb-outs, crosswalks, signals/APS and other ITS
22	elements, lighting, landscaping, bus stops, parking, other street amenities, improved connections to regional transit services and active transportation facilities, upgraded
23	utilities, and a shared HOV/transit lane.
24	Total Estimated Project Cost: \$25,088,600 Designation Duration: Continues until December 31, 2027
25	(9) East 38th Street (East Portland Avenue to State Route 7)
26	The project will grind the outer lanes of East 38th Street at the gutter line and overlay the street with 2" of HMA. All curb ramps that are not currently compliant with the ADA will



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1 2 3	also be reconstructed as a part of this project and underground utilities will be afforded the opportunity to improve/maintain their assets in advance of paving. It is anticipated that utility work will be minimal at this location. Signal improvements will be likely at the intersection of East 38th Street and East McKinley Avenue and ROW easements may be required for signal work and curb ramp improvements. Total Estimated Project Cost: \$1,361,000 Designation Duration: Continues until December 31, 2027
4	(10) East Portland Avenue (East 56th Street to East 64th Street)
5	The scope for this project will be to grind the outer lanes of East Portland Avenue at the gutter line and overlay the street with 2" of HMA. All curb ramps that are not currently
6	compliant with the ADA will also be reconstructed as a part of this project and underground utilities will be afforded the opportunity to improve/maintain their assets in
7 8	advance of paving. It is anticipated that utility work will be minimal at this location. Signal improvements may be needed at East 56th Street and at East 64th Street if they are not addressed by other projects and ROW easements may be required for any signal work
9	and curb ramp improvements.
10	Total Estimated Project Cost: \$1,130,000 Designation Duration: Continues until December 31, 2027
11	(11) East Portland Avenue (64th Street to 72nd Street) Overlay
12	The project will complete a grind and overlay of this principal arterial from the intersection at East 64th Street to the Intersection at East 72nd Street with channelization potentially
13	extending beyond each intersection as needed. This is necessary maintenance and will extend the pavement life cycle and reserve the roadway, serving general, transit, and
14 15	freight traffic for years to come. Sidewalks currently exist on both sides of Portland Avenue to facilitate non-motorized use and this project will allow the City to improve accessibility and pedestrian crossings to meet ADA. Bike facilities via channelization may
	be included as a part of this project (for its extents). Total Estimated Project Cost: \$1,128,813
16	Designation Duration: Continues until December 31, 2027
17	(12) South Cedar Street Active Transportation Enhancements: South 15th Street to
18	South Center Street This project will install marked crosswalk, pedestrian crossing advance stop bars,
19	rectangular rapid flashing beacons, lane width reduction, road reconfiguration, median channelization/turn restrictions, ADA curb ramp retrofits, audible pedestrian signal, bicycle
20	wayfinding (signs and markings), buffered bike lanes, green pavement markings, one-way
21	or two-way protected bike lane, sidewalk with curb and buffer, pedestrian countdown signal, bike signal detection, bike box, and engineering investigation re: speed limit and bike ramps.
22	Total Estimated Project Cost: \$1,516,630 Designation Duration: Continues until December 31, 2027
23	(13) Tacoma Spur Stadium Northbound and Southbound Ramps
24	The project will provide a modified concrete overlay on the northbound and southbound
25	Tacoma Spur Stadium Ramps. Work includes hydromilling the top deck of the ramps, replacing expansion joints, and replacing the approach slabs on the existing structure.
26	Total Estimated Project Cost: \$5,476,479 Designation Duration: Continues until December 31, 2027
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	(14) Pedestrian Accessibility Improvements
1	This Pedestrian Accessibility Improvement Project will construct up to 400 curb ramps that have been requested by people with disabilities and where there are identified barriers.
2	This project will construct curb ramps at locations where there is no access between streets and sidewalks for people with mobility issues.
3	Total Estimated Project Cost: \$3,000,000 Designation Duration: Continues until December 31, 2027
4	(15) Missing Link and Low-Income Unfit/Unsafe Sidewalks
5	Projects include completing missing link sidewalk with a focus on providing continuous access to schools, parks, community centers, and in historically underserved communities.
6	The projects also includes replacing unfit or unsafe sidewalks in low-income neighborhoods. Total Estimated Project Cost: \$2,500,000
7	Designation Duration: Continues until December 31, 2027
8	(16) Municipal Dock, Sites 10 and 12 Seawall Repairs
9	This project will construct full repairs to shoreline revetments along the Foss Waterway at Sites 10 and 12. The project will also construct repairs to approximately 60 feet of the
10	Municipal Dock shoreline revetment. Total Estimated Project Cost: \$3,319,598
11	Designation Duration: Continues until December 31, 2027
12	(17) Schuster Parkway Trail The project will include transforming the existing sidewalk adjacent to Schuster Parkway
