### Resolution No. 40903

A resolution authorizing the execution of an Interlocal Agreement with the City of University Place and the City of Lakewood for the design of a joint project on South Orchard Street and Lakewood Drive, from South 56th Street to South 74th Street.

## **RESOLUTION NO. 40903**

A RESOLUTION relating to public works; authorizing the execution of an Interlocal Agreement with the City of University Place and the City of Lakewood for the design of a joint project on South Orchard Street and Lakewood Drive, from South 56th Street to South 74th Street.

WHEREAS roadway and pedestrian improvements are needed on Orchard Street and Lakewood Drive, a major arterial providing vital mobility connections between the cities of Tacoma, University Place, and Lakewood, and

WHEREAS the cities of Tacoma, University Place, and Lakewood (the "Parties") plan to complete 30 percent design of roadway and pedestrian improvements to the South Orchard Street and Lakewood Drive corridor, between South 56th Street and South 74th Street, with the intent of identifying a phased approach for the remainder of design and identification of right-of-way needs for this project, and

WHEREAS the Parties plan on submitting future joint grant application(s) for federal or state funding for phased improvements to this corridor, and

WHEREAS the proposed Interlocal Agreement details the roles and responsibilities of each party and the design costs, with each party responsible for the actual design costs in its jurisdiction, and

WHEREAS the City of Tacoma will serve as project lead, coordinating the 30 percent design, including (1) contract initiation and administration for survey of the project limits; (2) completion of project design to the 30 percent level; (3) coordination with the cities of University Place and Lakewood on project design elements; (4) phasing recommendations for the corridor final design and



construction; (5) preparation of cost estimates for completion of the project; (6) identification of right-of-way needs for each jurisdiction; (7) scheduling and coordinating monthly project team meetings; (8) project management and administration; and (9) invoicing the cities of University Place and Lakewood for their portions of the project work, and

WHEREAS the City of Tacoma will be responsible for design costs for the Manitou area of the project currently owned by Pierce County and planned for annexation by the City of Tacoma, and

WHEREAS the cost of 30 percent design is expected to be \$80,567, with the City's estimated cost to be \$62,000, budgeted from the PW Street Capital Projects Fund, and the remainder of the funding to be contributed by partnering agencies; Now, Therefore,

### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TACOMA:

That the proper officers of the City are hereby authorized to enter into an Interlocal Agreement with the City of University Place and the City of Lakewood for the design of a joint project on South Orchard Street and Lakewood Drive, from

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# **RESOLUTION NO. 40904**

A RESOLUTION relating to public works projects; authorizing the acceptance of 30 grants, in the total amount of \$41,522,752; for deposit into various Capital Project funds, to fund various Public Works projects, including pedestrian facilities, trails, bikeways, safe routes to schools, roadway improvements, traffic signal, bridge, and other transportation infrastructure improvements.

WHEREAS the Public Works Department aggressively applied for grants for numerous infrastructure projects from 2018 through 2021, and

WHEREAS 28 Public Works projects ("Projects") were selected to receive approximately \$41.5 million in grant funds, and

WHEREAS these Projects will improve the safety and well-being of citizens by providing for pedestrian facilities; trails; bikeways; safe routes to schools; adding or upgrading facilities to meet the Americans with Disabilities Act; and roadway, traffic signal, bridge, and other transportation infrastructure improvements, and

WHEREAS the Projects identified in the attached Exhibit "A" have been selected to receive grant funds, and

WHEREAS 15 of the Projects will require City matching funds, budgeted from various Capital Project funds, as follows: (1) Links to Opportunity, in the amount of \$6,820,000; (2) Water Flume Line Trail IIIA, in the amount of \$2,370,887; (3) Water Flume Line Trail IIIB, in the amount of \$1,596,782; (4) East Portland Avenue, from East 64th to East 72nd Streets, in the amount of \$55,239; (5) Tacoma Trails to Transit Connector Mildred Street, South 12th to North 9th Streets, in the amount of \$120,000; (6) First Creek School Zone Beacon, East

56th Street and Portland Avenue, in the amount of \$12,600; (7) South 21st Street and "C" Street Signal, in the amount of \$15,100; (8) South Cedar Street Active Transportation Enhancements: South 15th Street to South Center Street, in the amount of \$350,000; (9) Manitou Elementary Safe Routes to School Project, in the amount of \$55,000; (10) Tacoma Spur Stadium Southbound Ramp, in the amount of \$50,355; (11) Tacoma Spur Stadium Northbound Ramp, in the amount of \$50,024; (12) Prairie Line Trail Phase II, in the amount of \$2,100,000; (13) South Sound Freight Priority Modeling and Capital Planning, in the amount of \$90,000; (14) East 64th Street Phase 2: McKinley to Portland Avenue, in the amount of \$4,919,000; and (15) South Yakima Avenue Missing Link Sidewalks: South 67th to South 70th Streets, in the amount of \$78,053, and

WHEREAS, under the grant process guidelines, the City Council must approve acceptance of grant funding; Now, Therefore,

WHEREAS other changes include: (1) effective the first month following the ratification of the CBA, the employee medical insurance premium share will mirror that of other City employees – currently \$50 per month for employee only
