

Legislation Passed March 1, 2022

The Tacoma City Council, at its regular City Council meeting of March 1, 2022, adopted the following resolutions and/or ordinances. Resolution No. 40919

A resolution authorizing the one-time use of Council Contingency Funds, in the amount of \$31,000, to support the full or partial costs to five or more City-based small businesses or non-profits hosting a Seed Internship. [Council Member Walker]

1 2	BY REQUEST OF DEPUTY MAYOR USHKA, AND COUNCIL MEMBERS DANIELS AND WALKER		
3	A RESOLUTION authorizing the one-time use of funds in the amount of \$31,000, budgeted from the Council Contingency Fund, to support the full or partial		
4	costs to five or more City-based small businesses or non-profits hosting a		
5	Seed Internship.		
6	WHEREAS the Degrees of Change Seed Internship program ("Program")		
7	matches exceptional college students and recent graduates from underrepresented		
8	backgrounds with Pierce County-based employers for a 10-week paid summer		
9	internship, and		
10 11	WHEREAS the Program pairs the work experience gained with a robust		
12	curriculum of professional development to provide a tailored path of career		
13	advancement for homegrown talent, and builds a pipeline for organizations seeking		
14	to build more inclusive, diverse workplaces, and		
15 16	WHEREAS this year more than 300 applications were received for		
16 17	approximately 60 internships, and with the current labor shortage, this program		
18	provides an asset to organizations seeking new talent, and		
19	WHEREAS small businesses and non-profits are recovering from a difficult		
20	year due to the pandemic, and this contribution would provide an opportunity to		
21	build capacity within the five or more selected organizations while fostering the		
22 23	professional development of the next generation of local leaders, and		
23 24	WHEREAS internships and professional mentorship play a pivotal role in		
25	career exploration and supports workplace skills by helping young people set		
26	career goals, equips mentors with the skills needed to support the professional		



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growth of young people, and drives positive outcomes for young people and 1 2 businesses, and

3 WHEREAS quality mentoring through structured internships helps promote healthy relationships and communication, positive self-esteem, emotional wellbeing, and builds professional relationships, and

7 WHEREAS the \$31,000 request is the equivalent sum of the full costs 8 (including payroll and enrollment fee) of hosting five Seed Internships, though 9 partial funding for more than five organizations is also welcome, and 10

WHEREAS, at the February 22, 2022, Study Session, Council 11 Member Walker shared a Council Consideration Request to authorize the one-time 12 use of \$31,000 from the Council Contingency Fund to support the full or partial 13 14 costs to five or more City-based small businesses or non-profits hosting a Seed 15 Internship, and

WHEREAS these funds will provide financial support to those organizations 17 who may struggle to pay the \$6,200 cost of hosting a Seed Intern, and 18

19 WHEREAS City staff will negotiate and execute an agreement for services, 20 with terms and deliverables for the City's contribution, as well as a financial report 21 provided to the City which shows the source(s) of the funding prior to receiving the 22 \$31,000 contribution, and 23

WHEREAS RCW 35.34.250 and 35.34.260 authorize a withdrawal from the 24 25 Council Contingency Fund for any municipal expense, the necessity or extent of 26



1	which could not have been foreseen or reasonably evaluated at the time of		
2	adopting the budget, and		
3	WHEREAS Ordinance No. 22569 requires an affirmative vote of not less		
4	than six members of the Council in order to withdraw moneys from this fund; Now,		
5 6	Therefore,		
7	BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TACOMA:		
8	Section 1. That one-time funding in the amount of \$31,000, budgeted from		
9	the Council Contingency Fund, is hereby approved for the purpose of supporting		
10	the full or partial costs to five or more City-based small businesses or non-profits		
11	hosting a Seed Internship.		
12 13	Section 2. That the proper officers of the City are hereby authorized to		
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15	confirm deliverables with the Degrees of Change Seed Internship program for the		
16	purposes hereinabove enumerated, and document as appropriate.

RESOLUTION NO. 40920

1 BY REQUEST OF MAYOR WOODARDS 2 A RESOLUTION expressing support for the City of Tacoma's Sister City in Brovary, and all of Ukraine, and join our brothers and sisters in Ukraine in 3 calling for peace and an end to the conflict in their country. 4 WHEREAS there are thousands of Ukrainian-born immigrants living in 5 Tacoma and its suburbs who are concerned for the safety of their families in 6 7 various cities across Ukraine, and 8 WHEREAS Tacoma is an active participant in the Sister Cities program, 9 where the mission of Sister Cities is "to promote peace through mutual respect, 10 understanding, and cooperation one individual, one community at a time," and 11 WHEREAS the late Pastor Peter Sayenko immigrated to Tacoma from 12 13 Brovary, founded the Slavic Christian Center, and was vital to building and 14 fostering the relationship between Tacoma and Brovary, including leading the 15 work to become sister cities, and 16 WHEREAS, in 2015, Tacoma received a letter of interest from Brovary 17 starting the process of becoming Sister Cities, and on August 8, 2017, Resolution 18 19 No. 39774 was adopted, creating a Sister City bond between the cities of Brovary 20 and Tacoma, and 21 WHEREAS, in 2017, Brovary Mayor Igor Sapozhko visited Tacoma twice to 22 promote this relationship, and in partnership with the Slavic Christian Center and 23 the Brovary-Tacoma Sister City Committee, the cities have had ongoing youth 24 25 and economic exchanges, and 26



WHEREAS, in 2019, the Sister City Committee raised funds to purchase 1 and donate a surplus ambulance from the Tacoma Fire Department, and sent it 2 from the Port of Tacoma to Germany, and 3 WHEREAS, in August 2019, City employee and Chair of the Tacoma-4 Brovary Sister City Committee, Stan Chain, traveled to Germany, drove the 5 6 ambulance to his home country, and was joined by Mayor Victoria Woodards, Fire 7 Chief Tory Green, and Tacoma Firefighters in Brovary to deliver this gift, and 8 WHEREAS Russia has launched an unprovoked and unjustified attack 9 across Ukraine that has killed and injured many Ukrainian citizens, including 10 multiple air strikes on our Sister City of Brovary, and 11 12 WHEREAS our Ukrainian communities here and abroad have the right to 13 live their lives peacefully, and without fear and unnecessary pain, and 14 WHEREAS what affects one community affects us all; Now, Therefore, 15 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TACOMA 16 Section 1. That the City of Tacoma declares its heartfelt support for its 17 18 Sister City in Brovary and the people of Ukraine in this time of hardship, tragedy, 19 and grief, and that we stand with them and wish for the safety for all of Ukraine's 20 communities. 21 Section 2. That the City of Tacoma condemns Russia's unconscionable 22 attacks and invasion of a sovereign nation, putting the people of both countries in 23 24 the way of unnecessary harm. 25 26 -2-

ORDINANCE NO. 28806

1 2	AN ORDINANCE relating to compensation; to allow the City of Tacoma Police Department to provide recruitment incentives for lateral police officers to adapt to current challenges in hiring.		
3	WHEREAS the City of Tacoma Police Department, similar to other		
4 5	jurisdictions nationwide, is experiencing an unprecedented departure of police		
6	officers from employment, and significant challenges recruiting new police		
7	officers, and		
8	WHEREAS the Tacoma Police Department has determined that		
9 10	recruitment incentives for lateral police officers could alleviate some of these		
11	challenges, and		
12	WHEREAS the proposed recruitment incentive structure would provide		
13	lateral police officers: \$10,000 upon commission; \$7,500 upon completion of		
14	probation; and \$7,500 a year after the completion of probation, and		
15	WHEREAS the recruitment incentive is anticipated to be offered through the		
16 17	next biennial budget period, which is December 31, 2024, as recruitment and		
18	budget needs determine; Now, therefore,		
19	BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF TACOMA:		
20	Section 1. That pursuant to Section 1.12.197 of the Tacoma Municipal		
21	Code and the recommendation of the Human Resources Director, the City Council		
22	hereby approves the anticipated police officer recruitment incentive,		
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	effective as provided by law, through December 31, 2024, or as determined by			
1	Tacoma Police Department as rec	ruitment and budget needs determine.
