RESOLUTION NO. 41038

A RESOLUTION relating to the Tideflats Subarea Plan; affirming the future development alternatives to be evaluated within the Tideflats Subarea Plan and Environmental Impact Statement, as recommended by the Tideflats Steering Committee.

WHEREAS, in recognition of the regional significance of Port of Tacoma Manufacturing-Industrial Center ("MIC"), the City of Tacoma, Port of Tacoma, Puyallup Tribe of Indians, City of Fife, and Pierce County have partnered to develop a Tideflats Subarea Plan for adoption by the City as part of the City's Comprehensive Plan, and

WHEREAS, the partner governments approved a Work Plan on February 10, 2019 which memorialized the roles and responsibilities of each partner, and established the Tideflats Steering Committee ("Steering Committee"), comprised of two elected representatives from each government, and

WHEREAS, the Tideflats Subarea Plan ("Subarea Plan") and companion Environmental Impact Statement ("EIS") process is intended to create a shared long-term vision and more coordinated approach to development, environmental review, and strategic capital investments in the Tideflats, and

WHEREAS, completion of the Subarea Plan will support the ongoing eligibility for and prioritization of transportation funding in the regional MIC, and

WHEREAS, on July 9, 2020, the Steering Committee approved a Public Engagement Plan to identify the key notification strategies and engagement methods for ensuring broad and representative community participation in the development of the Subarea Plan and EIS, and to describe the decision-making

process for the Subarea Plan and EIS, the role of the partner governments, and methods for accountability and evaluation of the engagement process, and

WHEREAS a visioning phase was also implemented and lasted from January 2021 through the final public meeting in May 2021, and

WHEREAS the purpose of this phase was to provide an opportunity to think broadly about the desired future in the Tideflats Subarea and develop preliminary future scenarios for further consideration and analysis, and

WHEREAS, the Steering Committee, on March 24, 2022, unanimously recommended a range of preliminary future development alternatives for the Tideflats, and

WHEREAS, following the Steering Committee recommendation the City initiated the public scoping process, and

WHEREAS the expanded scoping process was conducted in accordance with Washington Administrative Code ("WAC") 197-11-410, and

WHEREAS the scoping comment period started on June 21, 2022, and ended on August 5, 2022, and

WHEREAS, at the September 13, 2022, Study Session, staff presented a summary of comments received during the scoping comment period and following, the City Council conducted a public hearing to receive and consider public comment on the proposed EIS alternatives, and

WHEREAS, upon finalization of the EIS future development alternatives, an EIS under Revised Code of Washington 43.21C.030(2)(c) will be prepared, and

WHEREAS this resolution is a procedural step that will establish a reasonable range of future development alternatives to be evaluated within an EIS for the Port of Tacoma MIC, and

WHEREAS the EIS will evaluate impacts to the following Washington State Environmental Policy Act ("SEPA") environmental elements: air quality, stormwater and water quality, plants and animals, land and shoreline use/plans and policies, population, employment, housing, cultural resources, transportation, public utilities, and public services, and

WHEREAS, in addition, there will be an emphasis on health impacts to communities that work within the Tideflats, Tribal communities, and communities surrounding the Port of Tacoma Manufacturing and Industrial Center, and

WHEREAS the proposed future development alternatives have been unanimously recommended by the Steering Committee for inclusion as the basis for the Subarea Plan EIS; Now, Therefore,



RESOLUTION NO. 41043

A RESOLUTION accepting a donation in the amount of \$218,486.04 from a former City of Tacoma Library employee, and depositing said sum into the Library Special Revenue Fund.

WHEREAS a former City of Tacoma Library employee named the City as a beneficiary in their life insurance annuity, and the City is in receipt of the annuity in the amount of \$218,486.04, and

WHEREAS City of Tacoma Policy 2.20, Acceptance and Use of Donations, provides that any cash, check or other financial instrument valued at greater than \$200,000 requires formal acceptance by the City Council, and,

WHEREAS, upon formal acceptance by the City Council, the funds will be deposited into the Library Special Revenue Fund; Now, Therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TACOMA:

A RESOLUTION relating to the multi-family property tax exemption program; authorizing the execution of a Multi-Family Housing 12-Year Limited Property Tax Exemption Agreement with Project S39 LLC, for the development of 184 multi-family market-rate and affordable rental housing units to be located at 2912 South "C" Street in the Downtown Regional Growth Center.

WHEREAS the City has, pursuant to chapter 84.14 of the Revised Code of Washington, designated several Residential Target Areas for the allowance of a limited property tax exemption for new multi-family residential housing, and

WHEREAS the City has, through Ordinance No. 25789, enacted a program whereby property owners in Residential Target Areas may qualify for a Final Certificate of Tax Exemption which certifies to the Pierce County

Assessor-Treasurer that the owner is eligible to receive a limited property tax exemption, and

WHEREAS Project S39 LLC, is proposing to develop 184 new market-rate and affordable rental housing units to consist of:

WHEREAS the affordable units will be rented to households whose income is at or below 70 percent of Pierce County Area Median Income, adjusted for household size, as determined by the Department of Housing and Urban

Development on an annual basis, and rent will be capped at 30 percent of those income levels, adjusted annually, and

WHEREAS the project will also include nine on-site residential parking stalls, and 7,250 square feet of commercial space, and

WHEREAS the Director of Community and Economic Development has reviewed the proposed property tax exemption and recommends that a conditional property tax exemption be awarded for the property located at 2912 South "C" Street in the Downtown Regional Growth Center, as more particularly described in the attached Exhibit "A"; Now, Therefore,

WHEREAS the Mayor's Youth Commission of Tacoma ("Youth Commission") was formally established in December 2019, pursuant to Resolution No. 40502, after a year of outreach and development with youth on what they would want to see in a youth-focused commission, and

WHEREAS, since that time, the Youth Commission has engaged with students and organizations across Tacoma to address topics such as youth mental health, climate change, public safety in schools, and leadership development, and

WHEREAS the Youth Commission has shown national leadership since its inception, having attended a United States Conference of Mayors youth convening, and the National League of Cities conference to join youth leaders from across the country to learn and grow together, and

WHEREAS the opportunity to grow and learn from other cities is a unique opportunity that the City can provide our young leaders so they can continue to engage in conversations here at home, and

WHEREAS, at the October 11, 2022, City Council meeting, Mayor Woodards shared a Council Consideration Request to authorize the one-time use of \$5,000 from the Council Contingency Fund, to sponsor Youth Commission travel to the National League of Cities ("NLC") Conference, and



WHEREAS the funding would allow the City to send student leaders and a chaperone to the annual NLC conference this fall to engage with other youth commissions, and

WHEREAS RCW 35.34.250 and 35.34.260 authorize a withdrawal from the Council Contingency fund for any municipal expense, the necessity or extent of which could not have been foreseen or reasonably evaluated at the time of adopting the budget, and

WHEREAS Ordinance No. 22569 requires an affirmative vote of not less than six members of the Council in order to withdraw moneys from this fund; Now, Therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TACOMA:

That one-time funding in the amount of \$5,000, budgeted from the Council Contingency Fund, is hereby approved for the purpose of sponsoring the Mayor's Youth Commission of Tacoma travel to the National League of Cities Conference.
