On behalf of the petition called: Save Our Tacoma Neighborhoods

Attached find the petition calling for "Mid-scale" to be put on hold so the City can focus on getting correct the major changes to single-family residential city-wide, to become "Low-scale" before embarking on "Mid-scale". Based on the City's own Buildable Lands Report, Tacoma enjoys plenty of capacity to build out our Downtown, Regional and 16 Mixed Use Center, meeting the goal of 60,000 housing units by the year 2050. Per Planning Manager Brian Boudet, "Mid-scale" is not needed to meet the Growth Management Act goals.

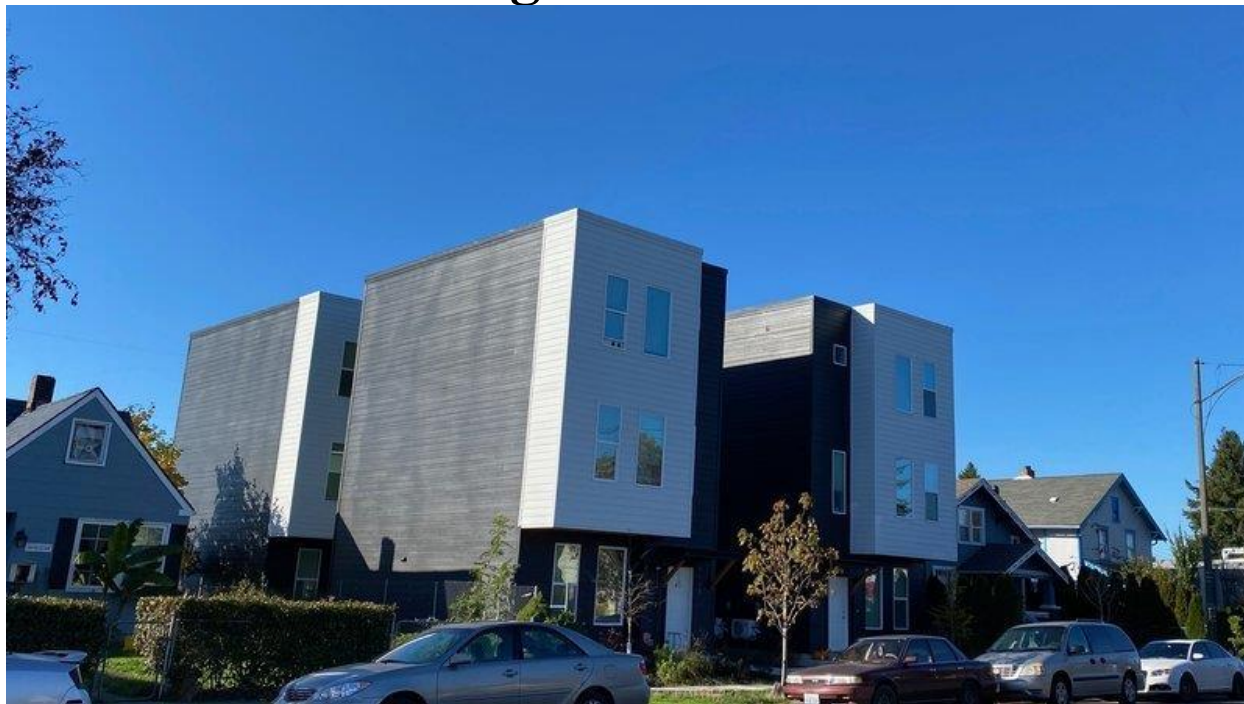
The petition asks the City Council and staff, to collaborate with the public as the Home in Tacoma Phase II process moves forward. And it asks the City to develop and implement all the measures necessary to prevent zoning changes from creating negative unintended consequences. The requests being made have been carefully crafted, to reflect knowledge about the Home in Tacoma ordinance, and what residents are looking to be apart of during this extremely important Phase II process. We have the largest stake in our neighborhoods, whose voices should be sought early and often during this process. And not be overshadow'd by competing interests for their financial gain at our personal and emotional expense.

To date, 2,320 residents have signed on to insist upon this.

Please note that many "addresses" are listed outside of Tacoma, but that really is connected with where someone lived at the time their email accounts were set up. # Don't allow 3 and 4 story apartment buildings in Tacoma's single-family neighborhoods



[Save Our Tacoma Neighborhoods](#) started this petition to Tacoma WA City Council **Save our neighborhoods!** The City Council is voting this month on huge changes to neighborhood zoning. This will impact every Tacoma neighborhood. All single-family neighborhoods will be rezoned to allow “Low-scale” developments, such as duplexes, triplexes, and townhouses.

More significant, **at least 20% of neighborhoods will be rezoned to allow for “Mid-scale” development.** This would mean 3 and 4 story apartment buildings could be built right next to small, modest homes anywhere in a neighborhood zoned Mid-scale.

If enacted, Mid-scale Zoning could transform the affected communities. Larger buildings will shade out yards and homes and eliminate privacy. Neighborhoods will become noisier and more congested. There will be loss of open space and tree canopy. Apartment buildings will gradually replace the existing homes.

Low-scale zoning, *if it's well managed*, could provide needed housing while also preserving the appeal of our neighborhoods. But Mid-scale Zoning is a step too far!

**Ask the City Council to put Mid-scale Zoning on hold and focus staff resources on taking the steps essential to getting Low-scale Zoning right.**

**Specific demands we're making to Council:**

**1. Put Mid-Scale on hold** – The City's own planning report states that Tacoma does not need to build 3 to 4 story apartment buildings in our neighborhoods in order to meet 2050 housing targets. Instead, the City should emphasize developing multi-family complexes downtown and in areas already zoned for larger buildings.

**2. Conduct neighborhood planning** – The City must partner with residents to create neighborhood-specific plans, tailored to the needs of individual neighborhoods.

**3. Create Design Review to ensure high quality building designs**—The Planning Department must create design standards that are sensitive to neighborhood context. And implement a public, citizen-based Design Review process.

**4. Focus staff resources on ensuring that Low-scale is implemented successfully** – The City must develop:

- Initiatives to prevent displacement of current residents
- Regulations to encourage development on vacant and underutilized land
- Actions to ensure urban infrastructure and services are adequate to support growth
- Proactive surveys to identify historically and culturally significant buildings
- Strategies to discourage demolition
- Robust standards for setbacks, building mass, landscaping, and streetscape planting
- Initiatives that will actually address affordability and provide pathways to home ownership.

**5. Focus on creating affordable housing for those who spend more than 30% of their income on housing** – The City should stop incentivizing growth in high-end areas that will only produce high-end, high-priced housing.

**6. Conduct effective outreach** – An issue of this magnitude requires in-person public meetings. Mailings to inform residents about proposals must use clear and specific language that will alert residents to what's actually being proposed in their neighborhoods and for their properties.

*We don't need to lose the character and appeal of any of our neighborhoods to gain improvements in livability, affordability, inclusivity, and sustainability across the city.*

**Our shared goal is to support growth while ensuring that the fabric of Tacoma's neighborhoods and communities remains intact.**

According to the Tacoma News Tribune, over the last decade median home prices in Tacoma have grown by 108%, rents have gone up by 78%, while median income has grown by only 10%. We're spending more and more of our paycheck every year on housing. Housing construction simply hasn't kept up with demand. Compared to other cities of our size, Tacoma builds very little new housing. It's no wonder why; presently 75% of the city is zoned exclusively for the most expensive type of housing. As a result, Tacoma builds fewer homes than most comparable cities.

For years and years the city has been talking about how to fix this. The city has studied this issue. The city has consulted with experts and has solicited participation from the community members. The city has taken comments and done studies. And seven years ago, after all that, our elected officials committed the following:

"Promote access to high-quality affordable housing that accommodates Tacomans' needs, preferences, and financial capabilities in terms of different types, tenures, density, sizes, costs, and locations. Ensure equitable access to housing, making a special effort to remove disparities in housing access for people of color, low-income households, diverse household types, older adults, and households that include people with disabilities. Promote safe, healthy housing that provides convenient access to jobs and to goods and services that meet daily needs. This housing is connected to the rest of the city and region by safe, convenient, affordable multimodal transportation."

Home In Tacoma is the first concrete step in living up to that commitment. It is long overdue. It is time now to implement the original recommendation endorsed by a super majority of the city's planning commission. Working and middle class people can't afford to wait.

Let's build again in Tacoma. Home in Tacoma includes Low Scale Residential and Mid-Scale provisions, with a mix of housing choices and opportunities anchored around a variety of transportation options and brick and mortar services. Just like the way we used to build. The

proposal will provide more and varied ownership options, allowing more Tacomans of all incomes to own homes and find decent housing. The Mid-Scale provisions are restricted to major transit corridors, but are just broad enough to help lower rents in the city.

Tacoma stands at a crossroads as we choose what kind of city we want to be. Do we want to be a city for everyone? The Tacoma City Council should pass Home in Tacoma and abolish the legacy of redlining and exclusionary zoning.

Finally, in light of the new amendments that have emerged, I urge the following action on each of the amendments to Home in Tacoma:

- Support Deputy Mayor Blocker's amendment to expand mid scale zoning on high capacity transit corridors from 1/2 block to 1 block, as it will provide more transit oriented development
- Support Council Member Hines' map changes 1 and 2, as they provide for smarter growth and the area in map change 2 is already height restricted due to views
- Support Council Member Ushka's map changes 1 and 2, as they provide for smarter growth
- Support Council Member Ushka's text changes, as they address resident concerns
- Support Council Member Walker's text changes, as they address resident concerns
- Support Council Member Beale's map change, as it allows for smarter growth along the 84th street corridor
- Oppose Council Member McCarthy's map changes 1, 2, and 3, as they are inconsistent with future growth and the goals of Home in Tacoma
- Oppose Council Member Thoms' map change, as this is not consistent with the broader development of the corridor along I Street
- Oppose Council Member Thoms' text change, as this is inconsistent with the goals of Home in Tacoma

There is a growing number of Tacoma citizens that experience homelessness in ways that diminish their lifestyle, their income, and their safety. What started as a handful of people who militated for change has now become something of a movement. Each day the number of people who want to humanely end the encampments in our city grows as one person tells another of the opportunity to express themselves in a meaningful way on this subject. Contrary to the “poll” conducted last night, the anecdotal evidence is very significantly to the contrary. As the numbers grow, you will be unable to ignore the pleas of Tacoma citizens. Consider this data:

Statistics from reputable and qualified sources can tell a story.

Unfortunately, the Point in Time data, currently on the Pierce County Website does not fit into that category. A poorly designed survey was used to indicate that 70% of the homeless in our area are from Tacoma. This isn't true. Even Pierce County officials now acknowledge this. Sadly, if it WAS true, it is even more damning. Even knowing the percentage is inaccurate, it nonetheless remains on the website.

A well-constructed study on homelessness from UCLA provides startling information.

- 75% of the unsheltered homeless have a substance abuse disorder
- 78% of the unsheltered homeless have a mental illness disorder
- The homeless are more than 100 times more likely to commit crimes

Contrary to the dictums that homelessness is a result of lack of affordable house, systemic racism, high rent, or even COVID 19, these issues do not cause homelessness. They may be part of the story, but the UCLA study – the SCIENCE of STATISTICS - , says otherwise.

Sadly, the City of Seattle that has spent many, many millions annually without adequately

addressing the CORRECT underlying causes has seen their homelessness and all of the associated problems attendant to it, INCREASE by 25%

Whatever the City decides to do, they must recognize that the root causes of homelessness must be addressed. Any course of action that fails to see this, will itself, fail.

# Don't allow 3 and 4 story apartment buildings in Tacoma's single-family neighborhoods



[Save Our Tacoma Neighborhoods](#) started this petition to Tacoma WA City Council **Save our neighborhoods!** The City Council is voting this month on huge changes to neighborhood zoning. This will impact every Tacoma neighborhood. All single-family neighborhoods will be rezoned to allow “Low-scale” developments, such as duplexes, triplexes, and townhouses.

More significant, **at least 20% of neighborhoods will be rezoned to allow for “Mid-scale” development.** This would mean 3 and 4 story apartment buildings could be built right next to small, modest homes anywhere in a neighborhood zoned Mid-scale.

If enacted, Mid-scale Zoning could transform the affected communities. Larger buildings will shade out yards and homes and eliminate privacy. Neighborhoods will become noisier and more congested. There will be loss of open space and tree canopy. Apartment buildings will gradually replace the existing homes.

Low-scale zoning, *if it's well managed*, could provide needed housing while also preserving the appeal of our neighborhoods. But Mid-scale Zoning is a step too far!

**Ask the City Council to put Mid-scale Zoning on hold and focus staff resources on taking the steps essential to getting Low-scale Zoning right.**

**Specific demands we're making to Council:**

**1. Put Mid-Scale on hold** – The City's own planning report states that Tacoma does not need to build 3 to 4 story apartment buildings in our neighborhoods in order to meet 2050 housing targets. Instead, the City should emphasize developing multi-family complexes downtown and in areas already zoned for larger buildings.

**2. Conduct neighborhood planning** – The City must partner with residents to create neighborhood-specific plans, tailored to the needs of individual neighborhoods.

**3. Create Design Review to ensure high quality building designs**—The Planning Department must create design standards that are sensitive to neighborhood context. And implement a public, citizen-based Design Review process.

**4. Focus staff resources on ensuring that Low-scale is implemented successfully** – The City must develop:

- Initiatives to prevent displacement of current residents
- Regulations to encourage development on vacant and underutilized land
- Actions to ensure urban infrastructure and services are adequate to support growth
- Proactive surveys to identify historically and culturally significant buildings
- Strategies to discourage demolition
- Robust standards for setbacks, building mass, landscaping, and streetscape planting
- Initiatives that will actually address affordability and provide pathways to home ownership.

**5. Focus on creating affordable housing for those who spend more than 30% of their income on housing** – The City should stop incentivizing growth in high-end areas that will only produce high-end, high-priced housing.

**6. Conduct effective outreach** – An issue of this magnitude requires in-person public meetings. Mailings to inform residents about proposals must use clear and specific language that will alert residents to what's actually being proposed in their neighborhoods and for their properties.

*We don't need to lose the character and appeal of any of our neighborhoods to gain improvements in livability, affordability, inclusivity, and sustainability across the city.*

**Our shared goal is to support growth while ensuring that the fabric of Tacoma's neighborhoods and communities remains intact.**

We are police officers, firefighters, residents, neighbors, social service providers and business owners located in Tacoma who are seriously concerned about the impact of homelessness on our community. We who have signed this petition applaud the city's efforts to provide services to the unhoused, but we believe the tool that will actually help solve the issue is missing.

It is critical to enact an ordinance immediately that serves as the mechanism to provide a pathway to long-term shelter that is safe with wrap-around services for the unhoused community, including mental health treatment and drug addiction therapy. By making it no longer possible to live in inhumane conditions on public property, you will help provide the unhoused motivation to finally seek out real help for real change, rather than enabling them to continue living among crime, feces, garbage, and rats.

As you know, recently a decaying woman's body was found in an encampment – this is inhumane! These conditions are no way to live, but without the ordinance many will choose to continue living there. It must stop now. It harms not only those living in the encampments, but your fellow citizens, businesses, nonprofits, hospitals, and museums who are forced to deal with the unintended consequences of allowing these encampments.

We have enclosed this petition to voice our concerns and hope that you will take immediate action to address the current public health crisis which will only become exacerbated as our vulnerable population living in the streets in unsanitary, inhumane circumstances will perish throughout this winter season. We hope to work together to achieve the goals of this petition. We are in support of Ordinance 28800 and ask the City of Tacoma to take immediate action to bring much needed assistance and services to the unhoused population. Thank you for your consideration

Dear Mayor Victoria Woodards, City Manager Elizabeth Pauli, and Tacoma City Councilmembers

We are community leaders, residents, neighbors, social service providers, police officers, firefighters, and business owners located in Tacoma who are seriously concerned about the impact of homelessness on our community. We the undersigned ask that services for the homeless be provided immediately, during this winter season, as well as enacting a law immediately that serves as the mechanism to provide a pathway from the encampments to services by making it no longer possible to live in inhumane conditions on public property. Tacoma's streets are lined with human feces, garbage, and rats. Even a decaying woman's body was found. These unsanitary, inhumane health hazards must stop. They harm every person in our city.

We would like you and other stakeholders to address the following:

1. Immediately put into place laws that enable the City to move the homeless off the streets into safe living situations.
2. Prioritize public safety in and around homeless encampments. Our police, fire, residents and business owners, as well as those living in the encampments, are victims of crime on a daily basis. Tools and support need to be provided to police and fire personnel to address the issues in and around these inhumane encampments. Residents and business owners have nowhere to turn to protect themselves because of the limitations placed on police and fire personnel including by the state legislature's enactment of policing reform laws. Those laws must be clarified to provide them the tools to address the volatile situations in and around encampments.
3. Fill the empty beds that currently exist in our homeless shelters.



4. Immediately find and create safe camping/living locations to move the unhoused out of the inhumane encampments.
5. Hold the unhoused accountable for their actions and require that they take steps to address any disorders or other circumstances that are the root causes for why they are homeless whether that be by engaging in job training, or by obtaining treatment for their behavioral health and/or substance abuse disorders.
6. Facilitating people living on the streets fundamentally undermines any effort to provide transformative help to those individuals. Going forward government-sponsored services should be provided at shelters, safe camping sites or like places so as to avoid enabling living in inhumane conditions.
7. All organizations and elected officials must be transparent in the process of locating the unhoused in a community or neighborhood.

In order to achieve these goals we believe the following actions are necessary:

1. Use allocated funds to find immediate solutions for safe shelters.
2. Hold service providers accountable for outcomes. The City of Tacoma spent approximately \$20,000,000 last year on homeless services, yet the problem has only become worse.
3. Provide clear goals and objective performance measures to service providers who are required to track compliance with these goals.
4. Perform audits of these organizations and have their funds reallocated to effective organizations if they do not meet the established performance measures.

If immediate action is not taken, the current public health crisis will only become exacerbated as our vulnerable population living in the streets in unsanitary, inhumane circumstances will perish throughout this winter season.

Designing our homeless housing policy around the premise that a homeless person not only has a right to a home but also the right to a home in the community of their choosing is (1) legally incorrect (you have the right to an attorney in a criminal trial, not an attorney of your choosing...the same principal has to apply to housing per the Martin v Boise decision); and (2) is impractical and unreasonable.</p> <p>Therefore, if it is feasible to secure someone housing outside of Tacoma more speedily than it is to construct new housing here (which in many cases it almost certainly is) then getting people out of town and into those homes, apartments and hotel rooms - even at Tacoma's expense - is the logical thing to do.</p> <p>We should be working with other communities and looking to acquire housing in cheaper real estate markets (such as Eastern Washington) to ensure that they get in homes ASAP. Many if not most of the people in our homeless community aren't even from Tacoma and are only here because of the policy of concentrating services in urban centers and this concentration of help has created a false narrative for those who seem to believe it is more humane to leave someone in a tent in Wright Park than to put them in a house in Goldendale.</p> <p>So it's time to end illegal camping and become pragmatic. 

Dear Tacoma City Council:

While we understand the need for housing in Tacoma we oppose some of the city-wide zoning changes proposed at this time by the Tacoma Planning Commission even as amended.

Our country is still in the grip of a pandemic and, though many adults in the USA have been adequately vaccinated, we are still facing more deadly variants and unvaccinated residents. And break through cases occasionally occur. As a result there has been almost no public meetings for full discussion of what the Planning Commission proposes as a solution. Consequently, there is not as much knowledge among the city's residents of what is being proposed and how this will affect citizens' daily lives, as we were previously able to have. Small maps on an 8.5" by 11" sheet of paper or on one's computer monitor do not adequately inform or fully represent the scope of the project! Zoom discussions are a helpful alternative but definitely not the same.

Therefore we urge you and the city to:

- 1) Allow mid scale development for empty lots and business neighborhoods, especially those that need rejuvenation and want new development.
- 2) Begin construction of affordable housing in areas that are currently available and serviceable.
- 3) Delay making definitive decisions on citywide changes until this pandemic is in the past; it is still not comfortable or wise to be in large group settings, indoors.
- 4) Delay making definitive decisions on citywide changes until the general public is well informed and has had ample opportunity for input and discussion, including a general election on the proposed changes.

We note that Planning staff reported during a recent IPS meeting that there is sufficient buildable land throughout the City to accommodate housing needs for the next 10 years. Tearing down existing structures to build larger scale apartments is unnecessary and costly, and oftentimes unattractive. We often see vacant lots wherever we go in Tacoma. And in areas that have already built up apartments.

The proliferation of apartment houses that replace single family homes throughout the City won't serve our residents who seek single family home ownership. Home in Tacoma will result in reduced inventory of single family homes causing the prices to rise even more. Home In Tacoma reduces the hope of ownership and building equity.

This proposal will drastically change and damage the character of our neighborhood where we have lived for over 47 years, in the City where we were born and have remained. This will be very disruptive. We need to have an opportunity for full, in person presentations with time for question and answer sessions.

City Planning in the past has had thorough and clear presentations regarding any changes that dramatically impact our neighborhoods. All the posters, charts and maps were so helpful. They have done such an excellent job we definitely need the same approach for this impactful, large scale project.

Otherwise residents feel like the process is not transparent, and is being done *to* us not *with* us.

An example in recent years is the high rise development in Proctor. The scale and impact was not truly appreciated until it was under construction and we could see the shape of what was planned. There was considerable dismay at the results. Think about the impact on aesthetics, the loss of views of the sky and light availability, the feeling of a lack of space.

Our neighborhoods and their atmosphere are critical to us feeling at home. The ramifications of planned changes should be fully explored and presented. We realize the Pandemic has interrupted normal conduct of your business. Zoom has considerable limitations though it clearly has been helpful.

PLEASE, allow us all the opportunity for in person meetings and neighborhood presentations. We need to be able to clearly envision what these plans entail and how they will make us feel, living in Tacoma.

Thank you for your kind attention to our serious concerns, and for the hard work that you do.

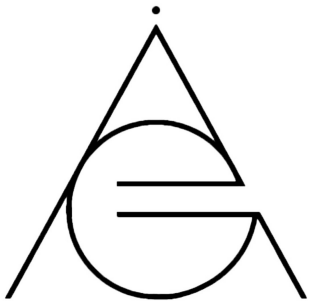

As a resident and business owner in Tacoma, I have the following points I'd like to make and/or be addressed:

With an emphasis on creating or enhancing 'green space' none seems to be indicated nor are any goals stated about how much land will be set aside or become devoted to green space. Why aren't we projecting this type of goal along with buildings?

While the word 'Corridor' is used throughout the proposal there isn't a clear indication of where these corridors exist or will exist as part of this plan.

What are the expected sources for growth - existing residents, military, relocation?  
How much is expected to be permanent versus transient? Do we know what Tacoma's average length of residency is?

How does the growth plan address the aging of our overall population?

Why aren't we designating MAXIMUM capacity when it comes to development and additional housing. That will help spread out growth across all Tacoma communities so that no one area becomes over burdened.

We need to know what a more precise definition of periphery means when it comes to creating buffer zones and scaling up in height. Without identifying the corridors it's anybody's guess where things start and stop.

Living Space should not be an allowed component of any industrially zoned area. This mixture would lead to an inefficient use or demand of resources like police, fire, and medical services. Neighborhood Centers and Crossroad Centers would be more suitable to work/live style of housing.

It seems to me the plan takes a shotgun approach rather being more targeted. Why doesn't the proposed map designate where the different height structures may occur. For example, S 38th could have a complete run of 3 or 4 story buildings or undetermined capacity but how deep does it go into the neighborhood. Does it stop within 2 lots north or south of the street or go further knowing that the area nearest S Thompson already extends into the surrounding neighborhood two blocks.

There needs to be guarantees that any variances of the proposed zoning be communicated to surrounding community with a minimum time frame. For example if a proposed development involves a variance (height or number) then neighbors withing a 2 acre radius must be notified 60 days prior to any plan approval and allow for comment prior to that date.

Why aren't developers mandated to accommodate a percentage of low or moderate income housing as part of any development plan ... think carbon cap trading.

Tacoma needs to retain all of the tree stands we have, and create a lot more of them. Corner-to-corner development with no setbacks in established neighborhoods runs counter to the future need of citizens as impacts of climate change continue to be exacerbated. It will be crucial that Phase 2 design standards require ample vegetated setbacks for all new structures.

In advance of your further deliberation and vote tonight on Home in Tacoma, please consider the following:

### **Say no Mid-Scale**

We continue to object to the midscale proposals; the lowscale proposal for established single family neighborhoods is fine. The City's own planning report states that Tacoma does not need to build 3 to 4 story apartment buildings in our neighborhoods in order to meet 2050 housing targets. Instead, the City should emphasize developing multi-family complexes downtown and in areas already zoned for larger buildings.

### **Conduct neighborhood planning**

The City must partner with actual neighborhood residents to create neighborhood-specific plans, tailored to the needs of individual neighborhoods. Please direct Planning staff to compile thorough but understandable communication materials and deliver them to all city residents – property owners and renters alike. We wonder what people really think about reducing the supply of ownable properties and moving towards a majority rental-based housing supply. How will the city describe the goals and measures for this new policy?

### **Insist on detailed design review for Low-Scale structures; then insist upon oversight for its approval**

The Planning Department must create design standards that are sensitive to neighborhood context and a public, citizen-based Design Review process.

## **Focus staff resources on ensuring that Low-scale is implemented successfully**

The City must develop:

- Initiatives to prevent displacement of current residents
- Regulations to encourage development on vacant and underutilized land especially in downtown and in currently zoned commercial areas.
- Actions to ensure urban infrastructure and services are adequate to support growth
- Proactive surveys to identify historically and culturally significant buildings
- Strategies to discourage demolition
- Robust standards for setbacks, building mass, landscaping, and streetscape planting
- Initiatives that will actually address affordability and provide pathways to home ownership

Before any zoning changes are finalized, the city needs a new, updated general sewer plan. The status quo is not sufficient and the City Planning Department and Environmental Services Division have ignored the facts about this. Require and ensure that adequate infrastructure be available to support any new development, so areas within the service areas of the three plants that serve Tacoma might not be up-zoned at the same time. This new sewer plan should be one of the earliest deliverables of any “Phase II” of HiT, which must acknowledge head-on that the North End plant is hopelessly over capacity, and that Chambers Bay provides the most likely upgraded capacity in the near-term.

## **Focus on creating affordable housing for those who spend more than 30% of their income on housing**

The City should stop incentivizing growth in high-end areas like Proctor that will only produce high-end, high-priced housing as recent development projects have proven.

## **Insist that the Planning Department conduct effective outreach and recognize that this hasn't yet occurred**

An issue of this magnitude requires in-person public meetings. Mailings to inform residents about proposals must use clear and specific language that will alert residents to what's actually being proposed in their neighborhoods and for their properties.

## **Analyze impact of Low-scale zoning before pursuing any further neighborhood zoning changes**

Throughout Tacoma, many areas are already zoned for multi-family apartments and are experiencing population growth. Transition zones have already been established in my neighborhood (Washington Elementary across the street from my property serves as the transition between Proctor commercial district and housing neighborhoods.). Low-scale development will allow for further

increases in density without altering a neighborhoods foundation. The City should monitor how fast neighborhoods are growing before opening them up to Mid-scale development.

**Recognize that current citizens of established neighborhoods also want Tacoma to thrive!**

We should not be required to lose the character and appeal of any of our neighborhoods to gain improvements in livability, affordability, accessibility, and sustainability across the city.

Please embrace that a shared goal can be to support growth while ensuring that the fabric of Tacoma's thriving neighborhoods and communities remain intact.

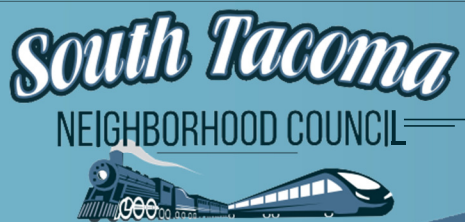

RE: Proposed elimination of Single-Family-Home neighborhoods  
and city-wide "Home in Tacoma" up-zoning

To Mayor Woodards and the Tacoma City Council,

The South Tacoma Neighborhood Council Board supports policies to ensure affordable housing; however, we doubt that eliminating Single-Family-Home zoning will realistically meet such goals. Even during a Planning Commission meeting last summer, it was admitted that simply "more housing" will not necessarily equate to affordable housing, yet this ordinance has continued to be presented as such.

Also, despite claims of adequate community outreach, this board is unaware of the Planning Department ever reaching out to inquire about attending a South Tacoma neighborhood meeting, or any other attempts within our community until for the first time just yesterday, Monday, Dec. 6<sup>th</sup>; therefore, many people from this area still have no understanding regarding the extent of this change nor the effect it will have on them.

Among the residents who are aware, we see no proof of "affordability" (especially for low-income individuals much less families, and certainly not the unhoused). We've previously requested verifiable sources to support assurances of affordability but so far we have received none. Conversely, among the cities which have already tried up-zoning, their housing costs have actually increased.

No other place in the United States has proposed rezoning an entire city to allow for four-plexes city-wide and especially not 3-4 story apartment buildings in currently single-family-home areas, with nearly no consideration for distinctive neighborhoods to preserve the very reasons people may want to move there.

Instead, as currently written, this ordinance seems promoting demolition for density-sake, which offers few benefits to the residents who have invested in and love this city. If density is the goal, there needs to be considerable city-planning involved for careful and smartly-controlled growth, not hasty broad brushstrokes.

Other cities have suffered the folly of even more cautious up-zoning than presented here. Seattle only up-zoned six-percent of single-family neighborhoods (which took many years with full public awareness and input), yet is seeing strains on its infrastructure and first responders, as well as irreversible losses of historic structures, green space and quality of life.

We should also be reviewing lessons learned within our own city, looking no further than the poor results within the Tacoma Mall Subarea. Such designated growth centers should be seen-through and perfected before being pushed city-wide.

Even after achieving success within growth centers, there's no reason to immediately up-zone the entire city. The recent buildable lands report states Tacoma has ample sites to accommodate expected growth without any need to rezone and demolish existing homes. So, there are many better ways to preserve live-able neighborhoods and create affordable housing, not by simply hoping it will be achieved by the for-profit builders while only "discouraging" demolition. We expect more from Tacoma for clear, enforceable policy.



In addition, South Tacoma is currently suffering present-day discrimination in the form of highest illness and highest mortality rates in Pierce County, as well as some of the highest air pollution in the entire United States. It is inappropriate to press for any (low or mid-scale) housing density in an area already struggling with inordinate health and environmental issues. Doing so is known as Environmental Discrimination.

On September 14, 2021, Mayor Woodards spoke of "growing responsibly" in the "correct places" which, ironically, is what "Home In Tacoma" does not do. "Home in Tacoma" is not focusing on neighborhood characteristics, is not requiring building only on vacant lots or primarily using existing buildings first, but is instead a sweeping city-wide massive up-zoning unlike seen anywhere.

"Home in Tacoma" is essentially handing-over our neighborhoods to become an experiment on a massive scale with all control (and subsidies, no less) to for-profit developer/builders, with no guarantee of affordable housing, while possibly damaging the very communities we are striving to improve.

So, as one of the most diverse and low-income neighborhoods in the city, we do not see "Home in Tacoma" as correcting a housing issue for the disenfranchised but, in fact, foresee this proposal as again taking advantage of the most marginalized people by forcing them into congested housing of crowded overpriced rentals, with less green space and more pollution, while reducing and removing opportunities for those of low-income to purchase homes or gain equity.

Instead of affordable housing, "Home in Tacoma" seems poised to enact a new form of elitism where tax-payers will be subsidizing developers' tax-breaks by our shouldering the later costs of increased infrastructure, loss of trees and livability, while also making it likely impossible for even an average person to purchase a home if being outbid by developers' intention to demolish houses for building more profitable multi-plexes - and - limiting options for many to being renters-for-life, with costs not within their control.

Before such a significant change be allowed, there should be detailed policies in place to confirm the claims, prior to approving such a sweeping ordinance. For example, in addition to assurances of affordability, where are the studies and estimates regarding required increases and budgeting of city hiring and other costs due to proportional population growth?

Besides seeing very little benefit to residents from such uncontrolled growth methods, Tacoma must also consider these other very real environmental consequences:

- Loss of trees and green open space results in loss of soil stabilization, heat and water run-off management.
- Loss of mature trees also disrupts the upper canopy for birds and other urban wildlife.
- Loss of historic homes and solid structures replaced with cheap construction, requiring frequent rebuilds.
- Demolition debris is already the largest contributor to our already full and overflowing landfills.
- Paved-over and box-building properties result in more and untreated stormwater runoff.
- Less water infiltration reduces aquifer recharge which is critically important as fresh water becomes more precious due to climate change.

Tacoma is also already out-of-compliance regarding wastewater nutrient levels due to outdated treatment technology. This city has been aware of that issue for years, unacceptably pushing the problem to future councils. That should be a basic baseline which must be corrected before any further housing growth can be considered. To move forward with "Home in Tacoma" without resolving this would be deliberately irresponsible and knowingly creating even more of an environmental disaster for Puget Sound.

Due to such permanent and wide-spread changes, "Home in Tacoma" is much more than just a simple code change. It represents a massive reimagining of the entire city which should require in-depth studies of both short and long-term resource sustainability. Based on the population influx levels being discussed, an Environment Impact Statement should be completed for each area at every stage of growth.

Such a momentous change (not only in building scale, but also city-wide), should require broad agreement; however, most residents are not yet even aware of this proposal and its substantial impacts. The one postcard mailed last spring (appearing as a survey and never mentioning rezoning) is not acceptable notification. The only other mailed communication recently received (a private propaganda postcard, paid for by the Tacoma Pierce County Association of Realtors) displayed a photo of single-family houses among mature trees which wrongly presents precisely what "Home in Tacoma" is planning to eliminate.

*"Don't cling to a mistake just because you spent a long time making it." ~ Unknown*

To quote the mayor again, this is not "getting our arms around" the affordability issue -- this is a for-profit developer free-for-all which residents will unknowingly later be paying the price for in many ways.

We request rejecting "Home in Tacoma" (both mid-scale and city-wide low-scale) until all residents have been fully informed, and we recommend action for actual enforceable affordable housing options. This will not be done through developer tax-breaks and new for-profit construction; it will be done by utilizing currently vacant property, city-purchased buildings, and careful deliberate neighborhood-by-neighborhood considerations which the current and future-residents of Tacoma deserve.

Dear Council Members,

Thank you for offering thoughtful amendments to the midscale maps proposed during the most recent stage of the Home in Tacoma project. The number and extent of the amendments offered should make it clear that this process is far from over, and that more careful thought will be needed before moving ahead with any midscale proposal. Thank you for your continued engagement with neighborhoods.

We particularly appreciated CM Walker's insistence that SF homes not be considered non-conforming land uses, and CM Hines' move to protect the exceptional and rare corridor of mature trees along the boulevard that is N Union Ave. Tacoma needs to retain all of the tree stands we have, and create a lot more of them. Corner-to-corner development has to be a thing of the past. It is hard on people and with climate change will be increasingly harder; it's just too unrelentingly hot in a concrete landscape with a few scrawny street trees to encourage pedestrian activity. It will be crucial that Phase 2 design standards require ample vegetated setbacks for all new structures.

Before any zoning changes are finalized, the city needs a new, updated general sewer plan. The GMA requires that adequate infrastructure be available to support new development, so areas within the service areas of the three plants that serve Tacoma might not be up-zoned at the same time. This new sewer plan should be one of the earliest deliverables of any "Phase II" of HiT, which must acknowledge head-on that the North End plant is hopelessly over capacity, and that Chambers Bay provides the most likely upgraded capacity in the near-term.

Please also direct Planning staff to compile thorough but understandable communication materials and deliver them to all city residents – property owners and renters alike. We wonder what people really think about reducing the supply of ownable properties and moving towards a majority rental-based housing supply. How will the city describe the goals and measures for this new policy?

To be clear, we continue to object to the midscale proposals; the lowscale proposal is fine.

Homelessness is a bigger immediate problem than lack of housing supply in Tacoma. HiT is completely unrelated to addressing the issue of homelessness; none of HiT's policies address that complicated set of problems. The current conditions are completely inhumane, and the numbers of people camping under bridges and out in the elements seems to be increasing week to week, just as the weather is getting brutally cold. Too many of these people suffer from untreated mental health issues and drug addiction, and too many people become victims of crime and abuse in the camp settings. The City must take bold actions to ensure all available temporary shelter is utilized and to create more permanent shelter options. The camping ban wasn't perfect but it was a useful tool. The ultimate solution will require creativity, commitment across several departments, and continuous adaptive management. Take the first steps toward the "pathway to shelter" and keep working to improve the situation.

Tacoma has a housing affordability crisis. According to the Tacoma News Tribune, over the last decade median home prices in Tacoma have grown by 108%, rents have gone up by 78%, while median income has grown by only 10%. We're spending more and more of our paycheck every year on housing. Housing construction simply hasn't kept up with demand. Compared to other cities of our size, Tacoma builds very little new housing. It's no wonder why; presently 75% of the city is zoned exclusively for the most expensive type of housing. As a result, Tacoma builds fewer homes than most comparable cities.

For years and years the city has been talking about how to fix this. The city has studied this issue. The city has consulted with experts and has solicited participation from the community members. The city has taken comments and done studies. And seven years ago, after all that, our elected officials committed the following:

"Promote access to high-quality affordable housing that accommodates Tacomans' needs, preferences, and financial capabilities in terms of different types, tenures, density, sizes, costs, and locations. Ensure equitable access to housing, making a special effort to remove disparities in housing access for people of color, low-income households, diverse household types, older adults, and households that include people with disabilities. Promote safe, healthy housing that provides convenient access to jobs and to goods and services that meet daily needs. This housing is connected to the rest of the city and region by safe, convenient, affordable multimodal transportation."

Home In Tacoma is the first concrete step in living up to that commitment. It is long overdue. It is time now to implement the original recommendation endorsed by a super majority of the city's planning commission. Working and middle class people can't afford to wait.

Let's build again in Tacoma. Home in Tacoma includes Low Scale Residential and Mid-Scale provisions, with a mix of housing choices and opportunities anchored around a variety of transportation options and brick and mortar services. Just like the way we used to build. The

proposal will provide more and varied ownership options, allowing more Tacomans of all incomes to own homes and find decent housing. The Mid-Scale provisions are restricted to major transit corridors, but are just broad enough to help lower rents in the city.

Tacoma stands at a crossroads as we choose what kind of city we want to be. Do we want to be a city for everyone? The Tacoma City Council should pass Home in Tacoma and abolish the legacy of redlining and exclusionary zoning.

Finally, in light of the new amendments that have emerged, I urge the following action on each of the amendments to Home in Tacoma:

- Support Deputy Mayor Blocker's amendment to expand mid scale zoning on high capacity transit corridors from 1/2 block to 1 block, as it will provide more transit oriented development
- Support Council Member Hines' map changes 1 and 2, as they provide for smarter growth and the area in map change 2 is already height restricted due to views
- Support Council Member Ushka's map changes 1 and 2, as they provide for smarter growth
- Support Council Member Ushka's text changes, as they address resident concerns
- Support Council Member Walker's text changes, as they address resident concerns
- Support Council Member Beale's map change, as it allows for smarter growth along the 84th street corridor
- Oppose Council Member McCarthy's map changes 1, 2, and 3, as they are inconsistent with future growth and the goals of Home in Tacoma
- Oppose Council Member Thoms' map change, as this is not consistent with the broader development of the corridor along I Street
- Oppose Council Member Thoms' text change, as this is inconsistent with the goals of Home in Tacoma

Dear City Clerk, Elizabeth Pauli, Victoria Woodards, and members of the Council,

I had prepared some words for last night's discussion regarding the Encampment Ban and hoping that this will be reinstated.

Seattle learned a long time ago that there are three types of homeless folks living in camps:

- Truly homeless who will gladly accept shelter
- Mentally ill individuals who have no place to go and most don't have the mental ability to decide
- Drug addicts and criminals who like the current situation where they can break the law, rob, steal, kill and use drugs as they wish with no consequences.

We need to find shelter for those who truly are homeless and will accept help. While getting ID for these folks is controversial to many, there is a need for them to have ID because my understanding is that some places will not give them shelter if they have no ID.

For the mentally ill and drug addicts and for that matter anyone who is homeless, they all should have IDs provided if they don't have one and if they do, get their info and file it. This next issue is controversial, but we should get a fingerprint from each hand, not necessarily full fingerprints. The reason is that if you find them dead and their bodies decomposing and their ID gone, their fingerprint will help identify who they are and have a name for any family member searching for them to rest in peace that they are no longer suffering.

If they don't want to provide this, they won't be able to get much assistance as I understand that some places require identification and if they look sketchy, they won't get access. That is what I am hearing.

We need to be tough on crime and these drug addicts and criminals need to be held accountable if they continue their nasty habits of threatening business owners and their employees.

Tacoma has lost businesses because of the homeless issues and their constant fires, robbing and breaking into their shops, shooting out windows, breaking windows, auto thefts,

catalytic converter thefts and entering major stores and taking carts full of products that they don't pay for. All this to help keep them in drugs.

As someone who works with a lot of the business folks on Pacific Avenue from S. 56<sup>th</sup> to S. 35, I can tell you, they are frustrated. The owners of the complex of offices located next to the Health Department had a fire that caused extensive damage and caused their clients to move their offices. Another businessman told me that these building owners could not get money from their insurance because the fire department found that the fire was started with an incendiary and as such was ruled ARSON. So, these property owners not only lost their building, and have no insurance to rebuild, but they also lost their tenants and the rents they were paying for their space.

You need to understand that Tacoma is going to lose more businesses. We have high sales taxes:

Washington state sales tax	6.50%
Tacoma tax	3.80%
Combined Sales Tax:	10.30%

Now couple this with higher cost for convincing workers to come to work, high cost of product to sell – especially for restaurants who are paying more in rents and food costs just to have product on hand, and staff costs and TOP that with lack of foot traffic – some of it is impacted because of homeless people pandering in front of business places or harassing staff or customers. Picture a shop owner having a homeless person pulling a machete on them because they would not leave their restaurant. This has happened.

Others are being frequently broken into and the cost to repair/replace glass and other items is very expensive.

Walk in the shoes of the people that are helping to pay heavy taxes, rent or mortgages for their businesses, and then have to suffer damages to their windows and doors and warming fires at their doorsteps and under eaves.

We are losing businesses and the exodus will grow unless YOU get your acts together and take steps to enforce encampments, use the money you are getting from the Federal and State government to help with this issue and get the work done. Bring the folks that have power to make change – judges, police, and whomever needs to be at the table to come to some direction that can affect REAL CHANGE. Don't bother meeting individually. Collective thinking is what it takes – everyone hears what is said and makes comments that might change some direction to the better.

If you don't do something REALLY CONSTRUCTIVE – bringing the powers to the table, then

Tacoma is doomed to become a homeless encampment and shelter for criminals.

Here is what I have heard these folks get. You check it out and confirm it:

If it is true that they get a free cell phone, a SNAP card for food, a credit card for incidentals and free food and clothes at the Rescue Missions and other places – there is no incentive for these individuals who do not want authorities telling them what to do. Things will not change.

This effort also has to include other neighboring cities to determine how you will remove someone who does not want to go to a camp you designate they need to go. We don't want to be sending these folks to the city or county line and foist them on some other county – which is probably how they got here.

Save Tacoma. Reinstate all rights to our police so that they can do their jobs. Get these people away from our communities and put them in a place big enough for them to move to and thereby minimize the search for locations to find folks. Then you can do a real checkup of those folks to see what their issues are besides being homeless.

Tacoma has a housing affordability crisis. According to the Tacoma News Tribune, over the last decade median home prices in Tacoma have grown by 108%, rents have gone up by 78%, while median income has grown by only 10%. We're spending more and more of our paycheck every year on housing. Housing construction simply hasn't kept up with demand. Compared to other cities of our size, Tacoma builds very little new housing. It's no wonder why; presently 75% of the city is zoned exclusively for the most expensive type of housing. As a result, Tacoma builds fewer homes than most comparable cities.

For years and years the city has been talking about how to fix this. The city has studied this issue. The city has consulted with experts and has solicited participation from the community members. The city has taken comments and done studies. And seven years ago, after all that, our elected officials committed the following:

"Promote access to high-quality affordable housing that accommodates Tacomans' needs, preferences, and financial capabilities in terms of different types, tenures, density, sizes, costs, and locations. Ensure equitable access to housing, making a special effort to remove disparities in housing access for people of color, low-income households, diverse household types, older adults, and households that include people with disabilities. Promote safe, healthy housing that provides convenient access to jobs and to goods and services that meet daily needs. This housing is connected to the rest of the city and region by safe, convenient, affordable multimodal transportation."

Home In Tacoma is the first concrete step in living up to that commitment. It is long overdue. It is time now to implement the original recommendation endorsed by a super majority of the city's planning commission. Working and middle class people can't afford to wait.

Let's build again in Tacoma. Home in Tacoma includes Low Scale Residential and Mid-Scale provisions, with a mix of housing choices and opportunities anchored around a variety of transportation options and brick and mortar services. Just like the way we used to build. The

proposal will provide more and varied ownership options, allowing more Tacomans of all incomes to own homes and find decent housing. The Mid-Scale provisions are restricted to major transit corridors, but are just broad enough to help lower rents in the city.

Tacoma stands at a crossroads as we choose what kind of city we want to be. Do we want to be a city for everyone? The Tacoma City Council should pass Home in Tacoma and abolish the legacy of redlining and exclusionary zoning.

Finally, in light of the new amendments that have emerged, I urge the following action on each of the amendments to Home in Tacoma:

- Support Deputy Mayor Blocker's amendment to expand mid scale zoning on high capacity transit corridors from 1/2 block to 1 block, as it will provide more transit oriented development
- Support Council Member Hines' map changes 1 and 2, as they provide for smarter growth and the area in map change 2 is already height restricted due to views
- Support Council Member Ushka's map changes 1 and 2, as they provide for smarter growth
- Support Council Member Ushka's text changes, as they address resident concerns
- Support Council Member Walker's text changes, as they address resident concerns
- Support Council Member Beale's map change, as it allows for smarter growth along the 84th street corridor
- Oppose Council Member McCarthy's map changes 1, 2, and 3, as they are inconsistent with future growth and the goals of Home in Tacoma
- Oppose Council Member Thoms' map change, as this is not consistent with the broader development of the corridor along I Street
- Oppose Council Member Thoms' text change, as this is inconsistent with the goals of Home in Tacoma

Hello Mayor and Councilmembers,

I support the ordinance popularly known as the "camping ban." As someone who greatly enjoys our public parks, I want them to continue to be clean and safe for all.

Regarding the broader issue of homelessness, I have two comments. First, I don't understand why we continue to funnel vast sums of money to third-party providers under contracts which demand no measurable results in actually reducing the rate of homelessness in our city. These many providers do not share information with one another, and there is therefore no guarantee that their efforts aren't being duplicated. While this video may be biased, it does make the point that it's possible and even likely that individuals could be benefiting from several services at once: [#19 - The Homeless Industrial Complex - YouTube](#) For example, what's to keep somebody from getting a room at the Comfort Inn, once that's up and running, and also having a tiny house in one of the TEMS locations, and finally having a space at the Stability Site, all for various purposes that they might have? The sheer number of various groups and agencies that are working to address this issue make it almost impossible to ensure that resources are distributed as evenly and efficiently as possible.

I propose that the city create an actual city department which would own the facilities, hire the staff, and manage the programs that we may choose to put in place. This would increase transparency and accountability, put all services under one umbrella, and not bind us to long-term contracts that may not deliver as promised. It would also create good jobs for those staffing that department.

Second, I propose that building dormitory or barracks-style facilities would enable us to house many more people in the same space as we might now use for tiny homes or other models. Essentially what the Comfort Inn will eventually be, but even more compact, with communal shower, restroom, and dining areas. Also, enrichment activities need to be provided. You can't just expect people to sit in a room all day with nothing to do. They will leave and go put up a tent somewhere just to avoid being alone! The video I linked above also addresses this aspect.

I think having that type of shelter available would better utilize the available land we have, and lead to better outcomes. People could be given medical, mental health, or drug abuse treatment, participate in various kinds of training and recreation, maybe even support groups. Partnerships could be created with businesses to allow people to build up their résumés and references. Having shelter available would also enable us to use even stronger encouragements, since we would not be in violation of any court orders.

I thank you for reading this and apologize for its length. I'll look forward to hearing discussion on this issue at tonight's meeting.

Letter To City Leaders and Supporting staff,

I am writing to you today to express concerns about the Home in Tacoma Project in general and specifically about the impacts development is having and will have in the South End.

Our neighborhoods are not the place to start when it comes to adding different types of housing to the community, with the exception of ADUs/DADUs and low scale. Why not build in the areas that are expected to be dense, like downtown and business districts? If walkability is a goal. Reinvigorate downtown.

Developers are not held to policy and there is no enforcement of policy. Examples of this would be the Grand Pacific, 7015 S. D St. and the townhomes located in between 232 S. 70th and 240 S. 70th. Despite repeated failures to comply by the developers minimal to no action was taken.

The Grand Pacific recently sold for \$33million. The developers had enough equity to complete the job to a higher standard, but were not required to do so. The standards for development in the South End are not that of North End developments. The proof is in the final product. Look at the Grand Pacific Development's surrounding area versus a Proctor development.

It is concerning because the planning department, code, and inspectors are not staffed well enough to be able to monitor developers or hold them to a standard. Inspector's do not have the authority to issue penalties despite seeing infractions and quality control is left to the neighborhood.

There is not enough green area planned and dog parks/waste stations should be required for larger development. The West End Neighborhood Council has previously discussed this with the city. With developers slated to make sales like that of the \$33 million the Grand Pacific made, these developers can afford to provide this space. It would also show the community that these developers are being responsible neighbors who care about their community. The City of Tacoma needs to make this common practice to keep our ROWs clean and our storm drains healthy.



Having adequate, protected green spaces planned ahead of time is key to maintaining a healthy living space for all. The HiT Project at this time does not offer enough green space.

A good neighbor policy needs to be enacted to qualify developers for tax cuts and current policies need to be changed/updated concurrently or before development is approved.

Where are the planned infrastructure upgrades? Will developers be footing the bill for the upgrades?

Will Affordable Housing be renamed Mid Market housing? Affordable is a word that should not be used for Mid Market housing. Please change this wording so that it rings true.

Specific to the South End:

The proposed HiT amendment brought forth by CM Beale to upscale along S. 84th to McKinley isn't a good fit for the Larchmont area. The neighborhood East of Pacific has its own unique characteristics that would be lost with mid scale development. This amendment should be changed to halt mid/upscale development on s.84th, at Pacific Avenue and allow the neighborhood that falls between Pacific and McKinley to retain its charm.

The South End is the new hot spot in Tacoma. Currently, SENCo is working on the South End Neighborhood Action Plan. We are involved with community stakeholders in creating a vision and enacting a plan for what we would like to see in the South End. The Neighborhood Council is eager to work with the City and community members to achieve community improvements and tailor growth to the needs of our area. One need in particular is services. We need more retail, food options, laundromats, and more. When and where will these services arrive. We must plan on holding space for these businesses.

We would be undoing work already done by pushing homeless people further out and away from services. As proven in the past with failed camping bans, this simply does not work. We need safe camp options and safe park options, even more so for RVs. I currently know two families living out of their RVs. They asked me where they could park. I could find nowhere. These families are people with school aged children, who live locally, and are just trying to hold it together.

A gentleman named EJ told me how a homeless friend tore up his stuff, knocked his carts over to intentionally make a mess so EJ would be given a hard time. EJ generally cleans up his mess as he travels up and down Pacific. Today EJ and Kevin helped me clean up the mess. I was also given a hug, blessed and thanked for my kindness.\*Pics below of before and after.

Some of our homeless neighbors are willing to help live in a better environment. We just need to physically reach out to them, build trust, and keep offering services. I know we can whittle away at the homeless population by doing just this. They need to be seen as people. They need a stable environment to take pride in, be it a temporary safe camp or a tiny home.

Not everyone is at the same starting point to receive services. Some are not ready, but will when they no longer have to worry about basic needs.

I feel for homeowners and business owners who have dealt with blight and/or blocking of their businesses. I have owned a small business in Tacoma before and found people sleeping in the entrance. I completely understand, however most people I've encountered were humans and were agreeable when it came time to leave because I spoke to them like they were people.

We need more outreach staff, safe camps, and safe park areas, better access to services, and patience. Please do not vote in favor of a camping ban and do support more services, shelter, and stabilization.

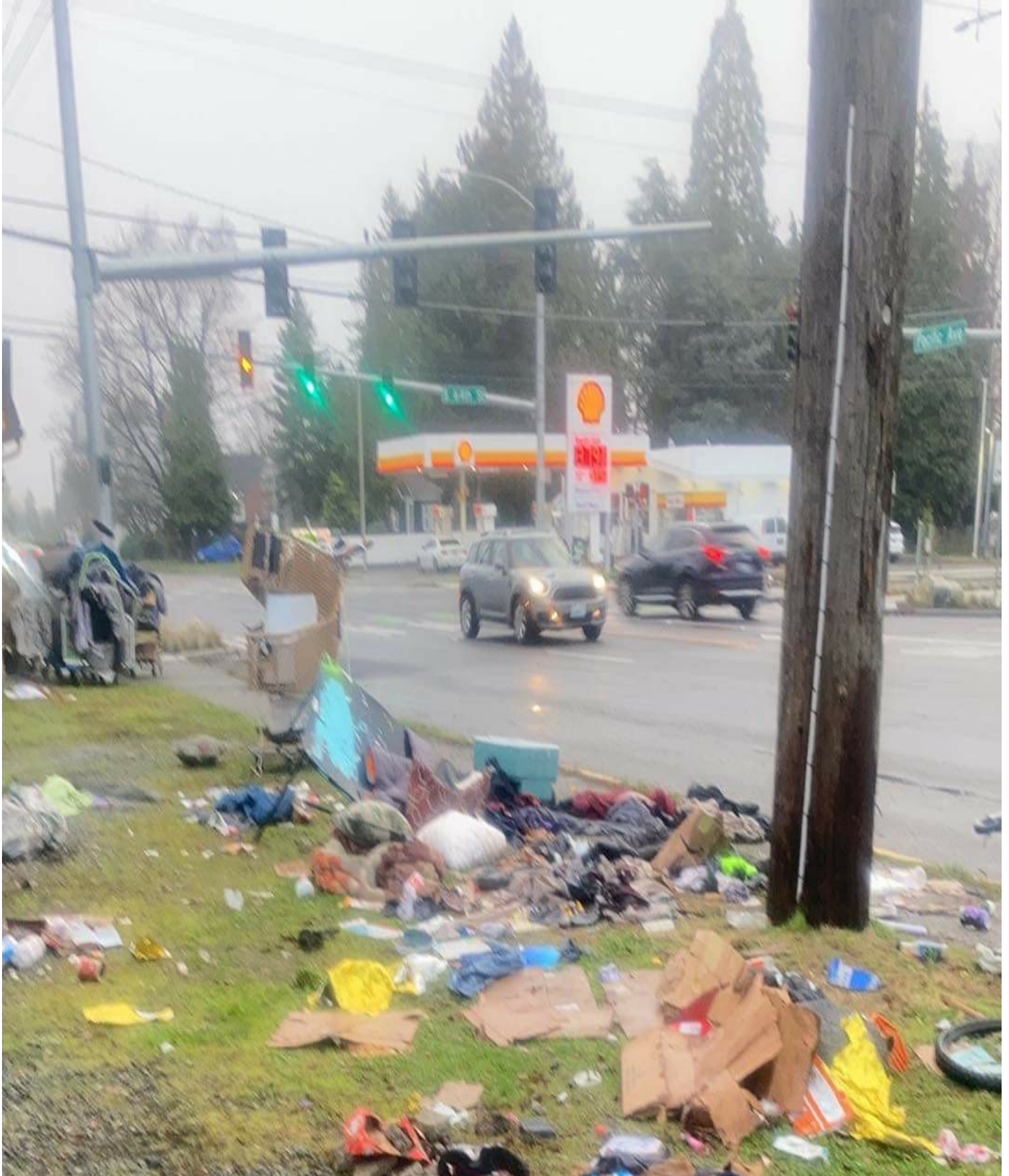

Dear Mayor Woodards & Members of the Tacoma City Council,

As the City considers acting on the Home in Tacoma Project, the Tacoma Housing Authority (THA) would like to convey its strong and urgent support of the project's recommendations. As an affordable housing provider serving the lowest income and most marginalized households, we are keenly aware of the urgent housing crisis our community is facing. A housing shortage, in-migration of higher wage earners, and gentrification and displacement have created an untenable situation for people with low incomes. Between 2016 and 2019, the median rent in Tacoma increased by 21% while median renter income increased by just 12%.<sup>1</sup> There is simply not enough housing, let alone affordable housing, to keep pace with the need. We all witness the outcomes of this crisis on our streets, in shelters, and on our years-long waiting list.

Tacoma needs to employ every available strategy to address this crisis and to do so with urgency.

The City Council recognized this need, directing the Planning Commission to investigate ways to increase housing supply, choice, and affordability in Tacoma. This important directive resulted in the Home in Tacoma Project, which outlines policies and approaches that further equitable housing outcomes now and over the long-term.

Currently, nearly 75% of Tacoma's residential land supply is zoned for single-family housing. This relic of racially restrictive zoning policy of the mid-20<sup>th</sup> century not only stifles the creation of new housing but also continues the legacy of neighborhood segregation by race and class. Home in Tacoma seeks to undo this harmful policy by instituting a new land use framework that advances equity and access to opportunity. By making modest updates to local land use code that preserves the value of existing properties, the proposal enables new and more affordable housing options to be developed in previously inaccessible neighborhoods for people with lower incomes.

Removing barriers to housing development is one strategy to keep pace with growth and could result in naturally occurring affordable housing in the future. However, the private market is not likely to create affordable housing in the near-term. The Planning Commission addresses this concern by proposing to expand affordable housing incentives and requirements, like the multifamily property tax exemption (MFTE), and establish anti-displacement strategies to help residents remain in their rapidly changing neighborhoods. This is also where THA comes in as an affordable housing provider with more than 1,400

owned units dedicated to the lowest income households. In addition, THA is actively engaged in anti-displacement work in the Hilltop Neighborhood with the eventual development of 200 units of affordable housing. We would welcome the opportunity to double down on these efforts in partnership with the City.

Where the private market fails to provide affordable housing options, THA and other nonprofit affordable housing developers step in. Over the past several years, THA has been successful in securing new allocations of federal housing subsidies. These subsidies (Housing Choice Vouchers) buy down private market rents to an affordable level for the low-income households we serve, furthering the community's goals of housing choice and equity. THA assists more than 5,000 low-income renters this way. However, the program only works if households can locate units to rent, which is becoming increasingly more difficult in this highly competitive market. Most recently, THA was awarded 135 Emergency Housing Vouchers (EHVs). As a pandemic response and recovery strategy, EHV's were created through the American Rescue Plan Act and intended to meet the immediate needs of households experiencing homelessness and at risk of housing instability. Yet Tacoma has a finite number of housing units and a rapidly growing population. We are concerned that, unless we take immediate action, these and future voucher holders will not be able to find and secure a place to live in Tacoma.

Individuals and families of all backgrounds and income levels should have access to affordable and safe housing in the neighborhood of their choice. They should also be able to live in the community that they work in. THA works towards this vision every day. But we can't do it alone. Real, systemic barriers are in the way of our community realizing this vision. The Home in Tacoma Project addresses these outdated, harmful housing policies and provides a new, responsive, and equitable framework that envisions a Tacoma where all can live and prosper. For this reason and others expressed in this letter, THA recommends that the City Council adopt the Home in Tacoma Project framework and to do so with expediency.

We are seriously concerned about the impact of homelessness on our community and the ambivalence of current city policies that allow encampments to proliferate on public spaces.

Sometimes compassion means saying “no” to personal actions that enable self and public harm.

Please support the “pathway to shelter and stability” and immediately put into place laws that enable the City to move the homeless off the streets into safe living situations. *Provide a pathway from the encampments to services by making it no longer acceptable to live in inhumane conditions on public property and prioritize public safety in and around homeless encampments.*

Tacoma’s streets are becoming more and more lined with human feces, garbage, drugs, and rats. Even a decaying woman’s body was found. Alarming, these unsanitary, inhumane health hazards are becoming more and more prevalent on Tacoma’s public spaces, neighborhood right of ways, public easements abutting private homes and business properties, and on other public easements....this must stop. Allowing these encampments to exist and proliferate indicates an abhorring ambivalence and lack of compassion from city and county leadership. These encampments not only harm the homeless long term, but harm every person in our city as well.

We hope that you will take immediate action to address the current public health crisis which will only become further exacerbated as vulnerable populations continue living in the streets in unsanitary, inhumane circumstances; some who will likely perish throughout this winter season. We hope you will work together to eliminate the legal basis that allows these inhumane camps to flourish, empower city agencies to address the root causes of these encampments, authorize first responders, including our police, to enforce civic order and reinforce basic human rights for all of Tacoma’s citizens, and work to put policies in place in concert with the county and state that will reduce homelessness regionally and address mental health illnesses.

The current conditions are completely inhumane, and the numbers of people camping under bridges and out in the elements seem to be increasing. Too many suffer from untreated mental health issues and drug addiction, and too many people become victims of crime and abuse in the camp settings. Homelessness is a bigger more immediate problem than a lack of housing supply in Tacoma. Please recognize that Home in Tacoma (HiT), as currently structured and developed, is completely unrelated to addressing the issue of homelessness in Tacoma. Hold accountable those who opine otherwise, including the City’s own Planning Department, by making them justify such irresponsible claims. The reality is that none of HiT’s policies address these complicated set of homelessness problems and none of HiT’s policies as currently structured encourage developers to build “affordable” housing that will be made accessible to the current homeless populous.



The City must take bold actions to ensure all available temporary shelter is utilized and to create more permanent, safe, and controlled shelter options. The ultimate solution will require creativity, commitment across several departments, and continuous adaptive management. Take the first steps toward the “pathway to shelter” by setting a legal standard that enables positive actions and provides a foundational framework for further compassionate and complementary city policies.

I am troubled. Pierce County has more than 3,000 people who are currently homeless, and just 1,000 shelter spaces to help them. A number of members of the Tacoma City Council and some prominent members of our community are hell-bent on imposing penalties on those who cannot get into shelter with a revised version of a “camping” ban, now renamed in very dystopian public relations terms as a “Pathway to Shelter and Stability.”

The city should be focusing its energy on creating safe and appropriate shelter options that people are willing to use. Too often I hear the false narrative that people, “Didn’t accept services” or worse yet, “Didn’t accept housing.” These stories we tell ourselves and each other are harmful.

I think it is safe to say that no one wants to have people living along streets and sidewalks in Tacoma. But we need to offer shelter options that people will choose to use. City staff said last night that 25 shelter beds were unused at the most recent count. There are clearly more than 25 people living outside right now. More than 100 people currently live under one downtown overpass. So, where should they go? And do we really think that imposing fines on people with nowhere to go will actually solve anything?

Please vote no on a revised camping ban. And please redouble efforts to create safe and appropriate shelter options for everyone.

Lack of housing is one of the largest issues facing our region today. The Puget Sound Regional Council has estimated that 2 million new residents will move into the area in the next 30 years. This on top of already being ten years behind where our housing stock should be to account for the residents who have already moved here. Home in Tacoma should be a vision for the next thirty years of growth. I am in full support of the Home in Tacoma project and urge all of you to vote your approval. I only wish that the original plan that was put forth by the Tacoma Planning Commission would have been adhered to more closely, and that we could somehow institute the plan ten years earlier. We still have a chance to leap ahead of our neighboring cities to absorb the tsunami of growth that we all know is coming our way. I've often described our fair town as "a small city with big city bones". We have the land available; we just need to have the determination to make big changes to our zoning laws to create more missing-middle housing, transforming Tacoma into a truly urban center of Puget Sound. Vibrant, walkable neighborhoods are desperately needed to move away from suburban sprawl, and with your guidance, Tacoma can make it happen. To call itself a welcoming city, Tacoma should want new neighbors, Tacoma should want more tax revenue, Tacoma should want more regional political power. I live in Tacoma's Hilltop near 15<sup>th</sup> S. and S. G Street. I experience every day the reality of competing rights to the use of public space. People living homeless on our block should have a right to basic human needs for shelter, sanitation, and safety. Housed residents should have a right to enjoy intended uses of public space—for access to clear sidewalks, and businesses, and parks. Given these competing rights, I can understand the logic of a proposed ordinance on the use of public space that includes a camping ban on unsanctioned sleeping or storage of belongings on public property. However, to title such an ordinance ***Pathways to Shelter***, with no pathways indicated, is beyond comprehension. Stating that city policy is that “all individuals residing in the city have adequate shelter” seems to promise that adequate shelter options will be available when enforcing the ban.

However, this promise cannot be fulfilled under current available shelter offerings. I applaud what the city has done to respond to the continuing crisis. However, an ordinance that includes criminal or civil penalties for unsanctioned camping will only cause more human suffering, expose homeless people to the possibility of adding a criminal record to their trauma, and force people, with no real options, to seek shelter in more hidden places.

Therefore, I write in opposition to any camping ban at this time. Instead, the city should act-- with real emergency focus--to establish more sanctioned sites—including low-barrier

tent sites, safe parking, RV parks-- that include hygiene stations and access to water.

Current efforts by social service organizations such as Comprehensive Life Resources for greater coordination of services to those living unhoused, should be encouraged. I am optimistic, as well, about the current work and models being considered at the county level. But until there are actual shelter options that meet the needs of actual people living homeless, there should be no consideration of an ordinance that criminalizes people for being homeless in our public spaces.

Mayor Woodards and Council Members,

Please support the IPS Hybrid 2 plan for mid-scale zoning and not the Planning Commission's proposal. I have been trying to understand the HiT plan and its ramifications and here is what I have come to understand.

**The Good News:**

City planning staff understand the nature of change better than the Planning Commission volunteers. Change has to be paced at a rate that people can consume. The IPS Hybrid 2 plan introduces changes at a pace that will help citizens understand the impact and benefits of planned growth. The Commission's proposal is too much, too fast and is, as a result, resisted by many.

Here is what I hear from my neighbors in the north end of the City. Council Members Hunter and Thoms are seen as legislators who listen and do what makes government work best, find compromises. Your efforts are appreciated by many. You will be missed.

Council Member Hines in my own experience is an exceptional public servant. I know how hard it is to respond to constituent's concerns. I expected at best a form letter response to my inquiries and hopefully have my concerns be noted. Never did I anticipate thorough, individually crafted responses to my inquiries. You Sir may should take the rest of the year off. You must be exhausted. Thank you for your valuing my input and those of others.

**The bad news:**

Somehow this process got framed in a way that is creating a racial divide. North end residents feel if they criticize anything about HiT they are considered racist. Many residents feel hurt and angry. They are equally frustrated by the appellation of NIMBY. And the behavior of some Planning Commission members has fostered this animus. Posting KKK photos and proclaiming older residents are living in the 20<sup>th</sup> century has created hard feelings.

**Moving Forward:**

Without question past zoning practices that negatively impacted BIPOC community members must be eliminated. The City should of course review all policies and practices with an equity lens that ensures equal access and availability for all citizens. However, even if we do this, the lack of affordable housing, the problem HiT is supposed to address, will not be solved.

The lack of affordable housing today is an artifact of the deregulation of government that while started by former President Reagan and pushed by Republicans ever since not to mention the support of democrats in past years, has created the largest class divide in our nation since the 1920's. The softening of the walls between commercial and investment banking is at the root of the housing challenge. Housing is now viewed as investment strategy and not as shelter and a way for people to build intergenerational wealth.

If we want to solve the housing affordability issue, the algorithm the banks use to determine if a plan for affordable housing is viable must be changed. The City's efforts to incent developers while admirable have failed. They are not enough to allow developers to make the profit they need to risk building. Non-profits will build good affordable housing but cannot do it on a scale or pace to address the critical needs of today. We need private development that is profitable and regulated. Development that meets the profit needs of developers and the community's desire to keep the unique characteristics of neighborhoods across the City must both be addressed. The former by the City collaborating with banks to take on some potential liability and the latter by involving citizens in the development of design standards and regulations.

While there is no silver bullet and multiple approaches are needed to solve this problem. One thing is clear. We need to steer clear of the play book of Donald Trump; keep the people divided on social issues and you can fleece them economically. None of us want this. It is incumbent on the City leaders to turn this conversation from blame and shame into one of unity to do the right thing.

We need good planning and the City's efforts are to be commended. We need to tone down the divisive rhetoric and create a more inclusive and transparent process moving forward.

We frequently observe open drug deals, filth in the streets, needles, open fires, people breaking into cars and public urination and defecation. A waiter from El Gaucho said that their staff is fearful going to work and their cars are broken into regularly.



- **705 Bridge Encampment Taking Overflow Parking Spaces:** Not only is 705 is also taking up the overflow Tacoma Dome parking spaces, pushing cars up into our neighborhoods, creating huge traffic jams and parking congestion. This is creating chaos for police personnel and local residents. The blatant disregard for traffic laws and pedestrian safety during these events continue to jeopardize the safety of east side Dome Top neighborhood; including children, the elderly and the disabled in wheelchairs who regularly cross the McKinley and Wright cross walk.
- **Pacific Ave and 911 Call Center Encampment:** Businesses and area residents are robbed daily by the Pacific Ave encampment across from 911 Call



Center. Garbage, rats and debris are mounting daily.

- **Portland and 25<sup>th</sup> Street Encampment:** Open drugs deals, rats, garbage, spread for blocks. This is the first thing people see when heading to a Tacoma Dome Event.

> Dear Council Members,

> Thank you for offering thoughtful amendments to the midscale maps proposed during the most recent stage of the Home in Tacoma project. The number and extent of the amendments offered should make it clear that this process is far from over, and that more careful thought will be needed before moving ahead with any midscale proposal. Thank you for your continued engagement with neighborhoods.

>

> We particularly appreciated CM Walker's insistence that SF homes not be considered non-conforming land uses, and CM Hines' move to protect the exceptional and rare corridor of mature trees along the boulevard that is N Union Ave. Tacoma needs to retain all of the tree stands we have, and create a lot more of them. Corner-to-corner development has to be a thing of the past. It is hard on people and with climate change will be increasingly harder; it's just too unrelentingly hot in a concrete landscape with a few scrawny street trees to encourage pedestrian activity. It will be crucial that Phase 2 design standards require ample vegetated setbacks for all new structures.

>

> Before any zoning changes are finalized, the city needs a new, updated general sewer plan. The GMA requires that adequate infrastructure be available to support new development, so areas within the service areas of the three plants that serve Tacoma might not be up-zoned at the same time. This new sewer plan should be one of the earliest deliverables of any "Phase II" of HiT, which must acknowledge head-on that the North End plant is hopelessly over capacity, and that Chambers Bay provides the most likely upgraded capacity in the near-term.

>

> Please also direct Planning staff to compile thorough but understandable communication materials and deliver them to all city residents – property owners and renters alike. We wonder what people really think about reducing the supply of ownable properties and moving towards a majority rental-based housing supply. How will the city describe the goals and measures for this new policy?

>

> To be clear, we continue to object to the midscale proposals; the lowscale proposal is fine.

>

> Homelessness is a bigger immediate problem than lack of housing supply in Tacoma. HiT is completely unrelated to addressing the issue of homelessness; none of HiT's policies address that complicated set of problems. The current conditions are completely inhumane, and the numbers of people camping under bridges and out in the elements seems to be increasing week to week, just as the weather is getting brutally cold. Too many of these people suffer from untreated mental health issues and drug addiction, and too many people become victims of crime and abuse in the camp settings. The City must take bold actions to ensure all available temporary shelter is utilized and to create more permanent shelter options. The camping ban wasn't perfect but it was a useful tool. The ultimate solution will require creativity, commitment across several departments, and continuous adaptive management. Take the first steps toward the "pathway to shelter" and keep working to improve the situation.

> P.S. Last week we sent an open comment letter asking you to give policy guidance to the Environmental Services Division to

constructively address the sewage treatment issue rather than kicking the can down the road:

>

> The Washington Department of Ecology has issued the Puget Sound Nutrient General Permit that will require Tacoma to start evaluating advanced sewage treatment technologies and other innovative solutions to reduce nutrient inputs to Puget Sound. We asked you to direct the Environmental Services Division to stop wasting ratepayer money on lawsuits and attempting to delay this regulation. Tacoma needs to focus instead on solving the longer-term problem. Rather than fighting this new permit, Tacoma should be working diligently on selecting the best overall plan to serve its ratepayers and protect Puget Sound.

>

> Tacoma Environmental Services staff, along with other large treatment plant operators, have been aware since the early 2000s that human sources of nutrients are harming Puget Sound. The science is complicated and it's easy to cherry pick indicators that tell a simple, but incorrect, story. Ecology's scientists have been openly discussing this information for the past fifteen-plus years.

>

> Pierce County decided to take early action with the design of its Chambers Bay plant that serves Tacoma's west side. The citizens served by LOTT, in Olympia, addressed this issue many years ago and their rates are about the same as ours here in Tacoma.

>

> Puget Sound's nutrient balance is out of whack. We are seeing alarmingly frequent and large harmful algal bloom events, the proliferation of jellyfish, and the number of area beaches covered in stinky algae during peak summer use ... because Tacoma and King County don't currently treat our sewage like every community located on a river already must. Requirements for treatment plant technology were last meaningfully addressed in the 1980s – and sewage treatment plant operators objected to those. We don't need to wait for Puget Sound to be in as bad shape as Chesapeake Bay to take action on this problem.

> Remember that Puget Sound is suffering effects from other chemicals from pharmaceuticals and personal care products in our treatment plants' discharges. Advanced treatment technologies for nutrients will provide co-benefits in removing many of these chemicals.

Dear Mayor, Deputy Mayor and Councilmembers,

My experience with the Seattle City Council upzoning my neighborhood in the 1990's is very different from the messaging coming from the Tacoma City Council and very similar to current events in the Proctor and Stadium MUCs. When the Seattle City Council initiated the discussion to upzone a portion of the Capitol Hill neighborhood, it was my experience that the cost of housing rose sharply. Not only did the market-value of single-family houses increase, residential and commercial landlords raised the rent. Although tenants wanted to remain in the most densely-populated neighborhood in the city, many residents who earned less than the average middle-class income, and many small business owners, were forced to find places to live and conduct business in less expensive parts of the city, nearby towns, and out in the county.

Pierce County estimates that the value of my Tacoma residential property increased by approx. \$100,000 in 2020. In the past, the value of the house had been increasing at a faster rate than the value of the land. However, since the Tacoma City Council initiated the Home in Tacoma Project, the County says that 70% of the increase in the value of my property is in the value of the land. This rapid increase in the value of my land in contrast with the slower increase in the value of my house is consistent with my experience in Seattle after the Council began discussing upzoning my neighborhood. After Seattle City Council upzoned the neighborhood, residential and commercial landlords started giving notice to tenants that they were not going to renew leases, so the tenants started looking for another place to live and do business in the neighborhood. However, the vacancies were soon filled, and another wave of residents and businesses were forced out of the neighborhood.

When the economy was good, real estate investors were demolishing buildings at a rate of one or two a week, continuing to displace residents and business owners.

When real estate investors started marketing the new apartments and commercial spaces, most of the remaining residents and small businesses owners were surprised to learn that they could not afford the rent in these new buildings. Many of the single-family homeowners expressed disbelief that the monthly market-rate rent in new buildings was higher than their monthly mortgage payment for a fraction of the living space and realized that they would not be able to afford to rent an apartment in their own neighborhood. Sadly, this appears to be occurring in the Proctor and Stadium MUCs too.

Upzoning a portion of Capitol Hill effectively displaced nearly everyone who did not already own a single-family home or did not earn a solidly middle-class income, and those earning only a middle-class income were experiencing financial distress.

Real estate investors kept demolishing buildings and replacing them with market-rate apartments as long as they could earn a satisfactory profit on the sale of the building or earn a 6% return in rental income. As the economy slowed, real estate investors continued to build apartment buildings but with smaller and smaller units, eventually building "micro-apartments" that were approximately the size of a single-car garage and were rented at an extremely high rate per square foot. Sadly, this appears to be occurring in Proctor where I understand that Proctor #3 is planning to market a 273 sq. ft. apartment for \$1,300.

When the economy slowed further, the real estate investors stopped funding new projects to avoid over-saturating the neighborhood with housing units and being forced to lower the rent to compete with other real estate investors (and sometimes themselves) to fill vacant apartments.

Yes, the future is unknowable. However, when I hear Mayor Woodards state, as she did at the Council meeting on December 1st "We're kind of at a point right now where we are in the midst of an affordability crisis," I think to myself that she does not understand that - by voting in favor of the Home in Tacoma Project - she is helping stage a real estate boom that will accelerate the affordability crisis.

When I hear Mayor Woodard state, as she did at the same Council meeting "If we don't get our arms around adding more housing to our city, then a lot of people who decide to work in our city won't be able to afford to live in our city," I think to myself that she does not understand that - by voting in favor of the Home in Tacoma Project - she likely to accelerate the displacement of a large percentage of Tacomans because they will no longer be able to afford to live in the city where they work.

I anticipate there are at least five Councilmembers who have decided to vote in favor of the Home in Tacoma Project. While I expect your vote to increase the value of my Tacoma real estate, I anticipate your vote will also tear-apart communities because the less-wealthy members will no longer be able to afford to live here. And, I literally expect your vote to tear-apart neighborhoods as you welcome real estate investors to build more housing units. While your wealthier constituents will likely be able to survive the upzone, and perhaps become wealthier, a vote in favor of the Home in Tacoma Project will likely displace many of your less-wealthy constituents who want to live in the city. Single-family zoning is a useful tool for suppressing the cost of housing. Please vote against the Home in Tacoma Project.

Re: 'Home in Tacoma' Zoning Changes

We respectfully ask the City to put the zoning changes for low and mid scale in front of voters versus the Council deciding for us. The residents of Tacoma should have input to this proposed significant change that will impact our individual properties, neighborhoods, and communities. We were alarmed to learn of your plans to change zoning to allow not only mid-scale developments without obtaining input from neighbors, but also plans to allow up to fourplexes in the low scale proposed zones.

We love the city of Tacome and have lived in our home for 23 years after growing up in neighboring Puyallup and University Place. We were shocked to learn of your efforts through other homeowners versus directly from the city. We have always been impressed with the city's communication in terms of what an activity will mean to us. Your communication has normally been transparent, timely, and written in plain language for us to easily understand. We feel blindsided by your efforts which erode trust.

We have many questions and concerns:

- The city has multiple existing lots and underutilized locations to infill near downtown as well as the vacant Kmart lot on 6th Ave, to highlight just a couple of examples. Why not pursue development here first?
- There is not adequate infrastructure to support more people and cars. This should be built first, not as an afterthought when it will become even harder. While we understand there is demand to move to our community, it must be done correctly. The city, nor the County or state have built the infrastructure for mass transit. As travelers to Europe, we appreciate the ease and accessibility of trains and not needing a car. What we see the city proposing is a densification of neighborhoods similar to what was done in Seattle, but no change in behavior in terms of walking and not driving. We believe our concerns are shared across the community that the same will happen here in our city should you pursue this zoning change.
- Tacoma is a beautiful city with rich architecture based on ease and flow given the original planners' vision. This plan already has multi family housing zones. More traffic will become aggravating for all.
- We also have concern for the risk this poses to homes that make this area so unique. Allowing developers and investors to significantly change the look and feel of houses, not honoring their distinctive qualities, will permanently alter what makes Tacoma beautiful.
- What is the plan for affordable housing? Creating units in low and mid scale zones will likely be too costly in rent for our existing residents to afford, pricing them out of the area as well.
- Where in the process is the voice of those of us directly impacted by this suggested change? We personally have followed

your variance process for a foot and a half change to setback on our property for a modification to our back porch. The variance allowed all of our neighbors to have an opportunity to provide input. We value this process. Your zoning proposal means when homeowners sell, the new owners may want to create as many units as possible to make money. This approach will forever alter what makes Tacoma such an amazing place to live.

We know our neighbors from multiple generations, we spend time together, those of us with kids have seen them grow up together, we help one another out as a community. After the City Council's July 13<sup>th</sup> Public Hearing, the Council's Infrastructure, Planning and Sustainability (IPS) Committee worked to address issues raised at the hearing through changes to the proposals. The Committee's recommendations, which reduced the amount of Mid-scale and strengthened design, affordability and infrastructure policies, were included in the package initially considered by the City Council on November 16<sup>th</sup>. The package has now been further modified by the City Council at its December 1<sup>st</sup> Special Meeting.

Hello City Council,

I fully appreciate the need for Tacoma to increase housing density, and support many of the plans in the Low Scale proposal, including ADUs, Small Lot Houses, and Cottage Housing. There are also many places where more dense housing makes sense (the abandoned Kmart and Safeway on 6th ave come to mind).

I strongly object, however, to the plans to allow Medium Scale multi-family along Union Ave, as well as extending into the existing single family neighborhoods on either side of 6th Ave. These are tree-lined streets with classic, older homes in a variety of architectural styles. My family moved to Tacoma specifically because of the character of these neighborhoods, and we're walking these streets daily with our dog. If the homes on these quiet streets were converted to 4-story apartments, the nature and character of our community would be devastated, destroying the very thing that makes Tacoma so amazing.

While the Home In Tacoma Project describes standards that would emphasize consistency in style and scale, there are too many existing examples around us where those types of standards are not being applied, and large modern houses are literally over-shadowing existing craftsmen homes. Should these zoning changes take place, I'm afraid that developers with deep pockets wouldn't be far behind, and our neighborhoods would be lost.

I urge the Council to focus resources on implementing the changes for Low Scale housing, but to put the Medium Scale changes on hold until more careful plans can be made.

Dear Council Members,

Thank you for offering thoughtful amendments to the midscale maps proposed during the most recent stage of the Home in Tacoma project. The number and extent of the amendments offered should make it clear that this process is far from over, and that more careful thought will be needed before moving ahead with any midscale proposal. Thank you for your continued engagement with neighborhoods.

We particularly appreciated CM Walker's insistence that SF homes not be considered non-conforming land uses, and CM Hines' move to protect the exceptional and rare corridor of mature trees along the boulevard that is N Union Ave. Tacoma needs to retain all of the tree stands we have, and create a lot more of them. Corner-to-corner development has to be a thing of the past. It is hard on people and with climate change will be increasingly harder; it's just too unrelentingly hot in a concrete landscape with a few scrawny street trees to encourage pedestrian activity. It will be crucial that Phase 2 design standards require ample vegetated setbacks for all new structures.

Before any zoning changes are finalized, the city needs a new, updated general sewer plan. The GMA requires that adequate infrastructure be available to support new development, so areas within the service areas of the three plants that serve Tacoma might not be up-zoned at the same time. This new sewer plan should be one of the earliest deliverables of any "Phase II" of HiT, which must acknowledge head-on that the North End plant is hopelessly over capacity, and that Chambers Bay provides the most likely upgraded capacity in the near-term.

Please also direct Planning staff to compile thorough but understandable communication materials and deliver them to all city residents – property owners and renters alike. We wonder what people really think about reducing the supply of ownable properties and moving towards a majority rental-based housing supply. How will the city describe the goals and measures for this new policy?

To be clear, we continue to object to the midscale proposals; the lowscale proposal is fine.

Homelessness is a bigger immediate problem than lack of housing supply in Tacoma. HiT is completely unrelated to addressing the issue of homelessness; none of HiT's policies address that complicated set of problems. The current conditions are completely inhumane, and the numbers of people camping under bridges and out in the elements seems to be increasing week to week, just as the weather is getting brutally cold. Too many of these people suffer from untreated mental health issues and drug addiction, and too many people become victims of crime and abuse in the camp settings. The City must take bold actions to ensure all available temporary shelter is utilized and to create more permanent shelter options. The camping ban wasn't perfect but it was a useful tool. The ultimate solution will require creativity, commitment across several departments, and continuous adaptive management. Take

the first steps toward the “pathway to shelter” and keep working to improve the situation.

P.S. Last week we sent an open comment letter asking you to give policy guidance to the Environmental Services Division to constructively address the sewage treatment issue rather than kicking the can down the road:

The Washington Department of Ecology has issued the Puget Sound Nutrient General Permit that will require Tacoma to start evaluating advanced sewage treatment technologies and other innovative solutions to reduce nutrient inputs to Puget Sound. We asked you to direct the Environmental Services Division to stop wasting ratepayer money on lawsuits and attempting to delay this regulation. Tacoma needs to focus instead on solving the longer-term problem. Rather than fighting this new permit, Tacoma should be working diligently on selecting the best overall plan to serve its ratepayers and protect Puget Sound.

Tacoma Environmental Services staff, along with other large treatment plant operators, have been aware since the early 2000s that human sources of nutrients are harming Puget Sound. The science is complicated and it's easy to cherry pick indicators that tell a simple, but incorrect, story. Ecology's scientists have been openly discussing this information for the past fifteen-plus years.

Pierce County decided to take early action with the design of its Chambers Bay plant that serves Tacoma's west side. The citizens served by LOTT, in Olympia, addressed this issue many years ago and their rates are about the same as ours here in Tacoma.

Puget Sound's nutrient balance is out of whack. We are seeing alarmingly frequent and large harmful algal bloom events, the proliferation of jellyfish, and the number of area beaches covered in stinky algae during peak summer use ... because Tacoma and King County don't currently treat our sewage like every community located on a river already must. Requirements for treatment plant technology were last meaningfully addressed in the 1980s – and sewage treatment plant operators objected to those. We don't need to wait for Puget Sound to be in as bad shape as Chesapeake Bay to take action on this problem.

Remember that Puget Sound is suffering effects from other chemicals from pharmaceuticals and personal care products in our treatment plants' discharges. Advanced treatment technologies for nutrients will provide co-benefits in removing many of these chemicals.

Dear city council,

Please take the time to thoroughly examine the potential impact the proposed mid-scale zoning could have on the future of our beautiful city of Tacoma and choose to put mid-scale on hold.

It is important to consider what affects similar zoning changes have had on cities in the past as well as what can support a walkable, equitable, beautiful community of the future

Lets support our downtown and neighborhood centers. Concentrating growth in neighborhood centers and a revitalized downtown, while prioritizing walkability and greenspace, supports livability and access to services. Our downtown has such potential, but is deserted with vacant buildings, empty lots and lack of greenspace. Investments made in the UW Tacoma campus, Brewery district, Elks Temple ect. are wonderful assets to our city and need local residents and community to survive. Let's support a vibrant, safe downtown that can be enjoyed by all.

Proposals for linear 3-4 story mid-rise zoning height increases along east-west running roads (i.e. N. 21<sup>st</sup> and N. 26<sup>th</sup> ) should consider their potential to shade out entire stretches of adjacent 1.5 story properties to the north for the majority of the year. Half block mid-scale would only leave an alley width buffer for sun to penetrate. Entire properties could end up in perpetual shade. Lack of sunlight could affect not only the adjacent property values but also the mental health of the residents. Linear up-zoning could additionally be detrimental to the physical health of residents by increasing car/bus dependency as it spreads populations away from urban centers and services. A decrease in walkability with increased car/ bus use has the potential to decrease local air quality.

Low scale zoning can increase housing choice while keeping the city more equitable, as it would not perpetuate the disparity between view protected districts and areas of proposed midscale. If anyone can afford it, they are not going to want to buy the bungalow next to the 4-story apartment building. Let's support home ownership that can increase generational wealth for our residents. Let's incentivize development which permits residential ownership over simply an increase in rentals. Low scale zoning could permit cottage housing and the splitting of properties could increase home ownership opportunities.

Its important to examine building and neighborhood design review now and not wait until phase two. We are investing in the future of our city. What we decide now will have ramifications for generations to come. I hope you will consider the thousands who have signed the Don't Seattle My Tacoma Petition and the thoughtful recommendations proposed.

Dear City Council,

I oppose the public camping ban. I worry that this ban is an overly simplistic solution to a much more complicated problem. I fear that the ban will only exacerbate existing problems and make this unhoused community even more vulnerable.

Like many Tacomans, I am concerned with people camping in public spaces: from large encampments to single tents. People sleeping outside are more vulnerable to severe weather, theft, and violence. I live near a park in the city and regularly see individual tents in secluded parts of the park. These people aren't bothering anyone, and they're transient. I worry about them and what forced them onto the street, and I hope that they can find shelter within the city that puts them on a path toward permanent and stable housing.

I know, though, that we don't have the resources people need, and until we do, banning camping on public property is wrong. Such a ban would only move unhoused people to other parts of the county, typically to poorer and more racially diverse neighborhoods. It also doesn't address the sources of homelessness, it only criminalizes people who are already among the most vulnerable in our community.

This ban also isn't necessary. The city has tools and resources to respond to encampments that pose a public health and safety threat. If the city feels like more tools are needed, they should explore making requirements for camp cleanliness instead of banning camps altogether. Providing resources like the purple bags along with "clean camp" requirements may help with compliance.

I also do not support making public camping a criminal offense. I don't trust the Tacoma Police Department to respond effectively or efficiently to calls about encampments or unhoused people. The police who murdered Manny Ellis are still on payroll, thus emphasizing the TPD does not prioritize mental health interventions when recruiting, training, or retaining its officers. The city



should consider reducing the police force and hiring a new homelessness outreach staff person for every officer eliminated from the police force. This reallocation of resources can help the city hire staff who are better trained to respond with compassion and professionalism.

Additionally, criminalizing camping will only move unhoused people into prison, which will further exacerbate mental health and safety issues. And once unhoused people have a criminal record (all for camping) they will face barriers trying to re-enter society by finding a job and housing. Criminalizing public camping just perpetuates the cycle of homelessness. All of this is also a huge financial drain and only increases the city's financial dependence on an already bloated police force.

A camping ban is inappropriate for all of the reasons above. Most concerning, though, is that it detracts from conversations and debates about other solutions and policy ideas. For instance, can the city provide resources and staffing support to the faith community and businesses with large parking lots on how to set up and manage a safe parking camp? This can include lights, porta potties, gates, and other resources.

I also think the city should explore ways to convert abandoned and derelict property into housing. The house adjacent to mine has been abandoned for all three years I've lived here. It is boarded up and condemned by the city. I've seen the owner once in that time. There are properties like that all over Tacoma. The city should declare these properties a nuisance and use eminent domain to seize these properties and convert them into housing.

Homelessness is a complex challenge, and while the city can certainly do much more, I am proud of the progress made and the direction we are headed. I fear that this policy would only complicate other programs, exacerbating the housing crisis, and result in further injustices and inequities.

I urge council to reject this camping ban and explore other policy solutions to address homelessness.

I sent an email to our Mayor, my second district representative, and the three at-large council members. The email argues that we do need to ban camping on public lands, but it is a nuanced policy.

Briefly, it is a good idea to ban camping on public property, but fining and jailing the unhoused is a bad idea. Requiring people to leave, by a crew backed by police protection, is quite different from putting people in jail and fining people who have no money.

As I said in the email referenced above, the current approach is not working, despite unprecedented resources organized by the City to provide new safe places for the unhoused. The couple of thousand new beds barely meet the recent increase in the number of the unhoused. We are treading water. This will not get better.

A new approach can include a ban on public camping, but also puts the city on notice that all of us need to step up. There are private individuals and organizations who just need to step up. There are a couple of churches in Tacoma I am familiar with that have stepped up to provide housing for about 75 people. That is a small example of what is possible. That needs to be multiplied by about 40 times. When looking at the size and diversity of Tacoma, that is actually a small number.

The notion that we can plan this from the top is ludicrous, as one can see by a drive down several streets, like Tacoma Avenue, and etc.

Dear City Council and Mayor:

I am writing this letter to express my complete and utter dissatisfaction with the

Home-in-Tacoma proposal.

I have followed the Home-in-Tacoma machinations closely since the Planning Commission meetings last spring. I wrote two extensive letters to the Planning Commission. I will not repeat the severe reservations that I expressed last spring. Nothing of substance has changed in the intervening months. This entire project was viewed as an effort to create more buildable land to ameliorate the housing affordability problem. Unfortunately, no effort was made to demonstrate how this proposal would achieve this goal.

A thoughtful process would have carefully examined how other cities have addressed the question of housing affordability. In all of the meetings that I listened to, no such examination took place. Moreover, there was no discussion as to why Tacoma needed to ditch its existing zoning rules and substitute design standards (which have yet to be articulated). Have any other cities implemented such a radical departure from common zoning practice? Alas, this question was never addressed. If Tacoma is a trailblazer in this area, I would like to know why we need a complete switch to a methodology that is untested? Also, zoning rules driven by design

standards perversely will benefit the rich. People with money inevitably will be better able to find loopholes in whatever design standards are finally adopted.

I realize that 85 percent of Tacoma is currently zoned single-family residential. The question that was never answered is why Tacoma feels the need to go from 85 percent to zero percent. Nowhere in this entire process did anyone discuss shrinking the confines of the single-family residential zone. From the beginning, everyone just assumed (without evidence) that the single-family residential zone needed to be eliminated. This assumption is all the more dubious since a buildable lands analysis

has shown that Tacoma currently has sufficient land available to meet the requirements of the State Growth Management Act.

In addition, I take umbrage with the way that this proposal has been "sold." No empirical evidence has been presented which would support the contention that this proposal will make a significant dent in improving housing affordability. Since increasing housing prices seem to be driven primarily by increasing land values, the belief which underlies this proposal seems tendentious. However, my real beef is that no one bothered to examine the relevant empirical science that addresses this

question. Certainly, there are numerous urban planners with Ph.D.'s who have researched this question. Why was an extensive literature review never discussed in the any meetings that I listened to? I can only conclude that no one wanted the facts to get in the way of a train that had already left the station.

Lastly, I want to emphasize what I said more than six months ago about SEPA. The SEPA process has been nothing less than a total embarrassment. You have obliterated the entire reason for, and spirit of, SEPA. The purpose of SEPA is to make sure that decision-makers know the environmental consequences of a proposal before that

proposal is enacted into law. The current SEPA determination only contains precatory mitigation measures, which, in fact, do not constitute enforceable conditions at all. The requirement to talk about environmental consequences in no way guarantees that the environment will be protected. You should be ashamed of yourselves.

I could write more (especially concerning “mid-scale” zoning), but I fully understand that "the fix is in." I penned this letter because I wanted you to know that there is at least one resident of Tacoma who is mad as hell about the direction you are taking. As I look to the future, I fear that you are setting up a regulatory scheme that

will lead to the gentrification of Tacoma (not a good thing). It's no wonder that these days people have little respect for politicians--including yourselves. But I guess that it would be a rare politician who would have the gumption to question the bogus assumptions that undergird this "pig in a poke."

Lastly, I sat next to a young man from the fossil fuel industry promoting LNG at a public hearing back in about 2015-16. He actually said how much he liked seeing all the gentrification taking place in Tacoma, my mouth dropped a bit. He lived in the suburbs and thought it was great for us.

Come on Council Members do you want to wipe out Tacoma so suburbanites can feel like home or do you want to conserve, enhance and sustain the city in a more respectful way. This report shared with me last week on Preservation is a good tool for all older cities not just designated Historic Districts and Buildings. Capitalize on what these suburbs don’t have and go bold in a new and different direction from the rest. Tourism benefits may reap more then you could imagine.

Preservation and conservation does not mean stuck in time with nothing new. Specifically solicit developers, contractors, preservation architects, residents and business owners that are committed to this vision not just highest market return. Providing

more enhanced tax incentives is a good way to start. Let's try some out of the box thinking and not the status quo the city has been embracing the past 12 years. Being a part of a new cutting edge more sustainable movement to economic development with committed City leaders and partners I believe is worth exploring.

The faux old restaurants and industrial spaces seen in the suburbs and down at Pt Ruston for example sort of indicates an attraction to something with style and authenticity that a city the age of Tacoma should build upon. Preservation doesn't just mean an 1890's gilded era it's also mid-century modern and so much more.

Tacoma has made some good efforts but broadening this is where I encourage you to have open minds and reverse your HIT approach of demolishing our city for speculators. Alternative approaches to housing and growth have not been given the same level of attention, support and incentives in my view.

Once you vote to approve there is no reversal or meaningful fine tuning. We have experienced this before.

Homelessness is on the rise, we see it every day. Episcopal Retirement Communities' future plans include building new low income/affordable housing for the elderly. ERC is very much in support of the Home in Tacoma Project.

In 2018, Episcopal Retirement Communities was successful in obtaining a rezone for All Saints' Episcopal Church at 205 96th St E, Tacoma, WA 98445 (parcels 0320334183, 0320334031). The new zone is R4-L where we had hoped to build low income/affordable property on the church property. Currently, this is being considered for the Mid-Scale Residential in the Home in Tacoma Project ordinance.

Meanwhile, the property next door at 9501 East B Street, Tacoma (parcel 0320334027) – a very nice two acre parcel – became available and we purchased it in 2020. ERC would prefer to build on our new property instead of on the church parcel as it will allow for more parking spaces, more outdoor area and feel less cramped. I believe our B Street parcel at this time is designated to be Low-Scale Residential.

We respectfully request consideration of our parcel (0320334027) to be considered Mid-Scale Residential. Reason:

1. The lots are owned by ERC (0320334027) and All Saints' Episcopal Church (parcels 0320334183, 0320334031) who are both under the umbrella of The Diocese of Olympia, the Episcopal Church of Western Washington.
  2. Each of the lots is still larger than a traditional residential-scale
  3. The lots are located at the corner of an intersection offering a more gradual transition/shield lower density residential lots farther back in the block
  4. The corner is directly adjacent to a proposed Mid-Scale Residential designation (Korean Women's Association) that would allow for a more "harmonious scale and residential pattern"
  5. This designation would formalize the intersection as a neighborhood Center with a "strong pedestrian orientation"
  6. The corner lot is within a quarter-mile walking distance of Route 1 (Pierce Transit PTBA)

Dear City Clerk, Elizabeth Pauli, Victoria Woodards, and members of the Council,

Tacoma, like many other cities across the country have been inundated with homeless people. Many of these people are NOT from Tacoma. They are arriving here from other parts of the country. Case in point, my daughter and son-in-law were at the airport in Houston when some homeless folks were being placed on a plane heading to Seattle. The same flight my daughter and son-in-law were on. Those folks, would arrive here at Sea Tac and have nowhere to go.

This is happening a lot. Like the folks that were shipped here from Baltimore and Colorado with \$50 bucks in their pockets. The story they told was that they were being sent here because our cold weather is not as severe as in the respective areas they were being shipped here from. These stories were provided by folks that were going into the Freighthouse Square to eat and yep, they had 2 \$20s and 1-\$10 to pay for their food.

We can continue to dump a lot of money into moving these folks around and hope that they get housing. The simple fact is, as Seattle learned, those who are really homeless will accept housing to get off the street. The issue is the mentally ill and substance abuse folks who are the hardest to place.

The old saying "If we build it, they will come." We need to find a large enough piece of land that the encampments can be moved to and have a way to provide a way for those that have mental health or substance abuse issues get help. It is important to note that there will be some that will not want to relocate. It is IMPORTANT that a process be put in place to ensure that those folks do not stay in Tacoma.

It would be better to find a way to ensure that those people were sent out of state to where they belong – rather than foisting them on other cities in Washington State (unless they can provide proof that they came from another WA City). Without this process being in place, we will be repeating this over and over.

If Seattle or any town in our State is doing likewise, we need to be sure that we are not getting those who refuse relocating and getting help.

Also, it is important that organizations that provide low, low income housing for these folks – like the Comfort Inn that will be or is being managed by LIHI – that they not be critical about who they take in. Tacoma is paying A LOT of money for this Hotel and their being selective of who enters a building is problematic unless the clear acceptance protocols are in place and someone is not going to be denied housing because they look funny or don't have ID. You see, I've been told this has been a process that some places have and if this is the case, and if people running places that WE the Taxpayers are paying dearly to make available for the people we try to place there, then we are fighting a losing battle and this is WHY we are getting nowhere.

So, we need to make sure we expel from Tacoma/State anyone who refuses to move to the camps we create to help them - if anything that we do is going to work. Tacoma and quite frankly, the country cannot afford to keep feeding the bottomless pit and not REALLY helping those who want our help and those who don't know any better (mental health folks), but will be helped to get care.

Furthermore, businesses in our city are suffering daily issues that are impacting their businesses and staff. You need to take action NOW.

Tacoma Safe is working hard on this issue. We sent the following information to the County Council and the same holds true for Tacoma.

1. There is one issue that nearly all agree must be the focus of local government, the persistent and growing number of homeless, living on the streets and under overpasses, and suffering from mental illness and addiction.
2. We urge the Council to devote the maximum amount of resources at its disposal for shelter, housing and behavioral health services.
3. We urge you to spend the \$81M the Executive has prioritized for the homeless and affordable housing, and once and for all address this crisis that is degrading our neighborhoods and right of ways, and give the homeless what they so clearly need--a warm place to live and the mental health and addiction recovery services they deserve.
4. It is imperative that these funds be laser-focused on this one issue rather than spread too thinly across competing priorities.

The final thing is making sure that we send folks who won't move or accept help OUT of our state. We cannot foist them on other towns in Washington State. So, we need a clear process to ensure that this happens. There are no checks and balances to ensure that those folks are not going back and forth and back again.

Mayor Woodards and Councilmembers,

Please consider the following revisions to the Home in Tacoma project:

### 1. Housing Units and Housing Affordability

Tacoma has been a city for over 150 years. It is a wonderful city that, luckily, still functions as one city. I am encouraged that so many people have participated in the Home in Tacoma discussion. Time and the value of citizen voices in our government decisions are incredibly important - and in fact, is what makes us a democracy. It is odd to hear Council consistently make two opposing statements: 1. we need to make changes now because we have a housing stock/housing affordability crisis; and, 2. nothing is going to happen for 30 years.

To address the need for more housing and affordable housing now, I encourage Council to consider including two actions into the current proposal:

- a. One path to address the housing crisis is to speed up growth in the Centers that have been in place for 30 years. Why is it that some centers are experiencing a lot of growth while other centers do not? I encourage Council to ask staff for a report on infrastructure or zoning changes that are necessary to further incentivize growth in the centers that are not experiencing growth. Further decisions can be made when we learn why more units are not coming online in all centers and potentially open the opportunity to bring on more housing units in these areas quickly.
- b. The impact of AirBNB and VRBO cannot be understated. These companies are changing the very fabric of our cities and taking a significant number of housing units off line in exchange for high priced short term nightly rentals. The city must look at how many of these units are allowed, how they are regulated and how regulations are enforced. This is contributing to the homeless problems as long term rental units are reduced. Please ask staff to research how many units are in place and how we could best address the loss of housing for citizens via these programs.

### 2. Low Scale/Mid-Scale Lack of Clarity in Current Proposal

The definitions of Low Scale Residential and Mid-Scale Residential are very similar and somewhat ambiguous (see definitions pages 2-8, 2-9 of Ordinance link – Low allows small scale multi-family while Mid allows ‘multifamily at 3-4 stories. ?? ). Given the fact that so many Councilmembers have stated they do not believe anything will happen for many years, it is not clear why the Centers, Corridors and Neighborhood Commercial are expanding the designations when it may be in our best interest to first focus on the codes for low-scale residential thereby building trust with citizens and neighborhoods by demonstrating density is good. If done right, we would learn how best to do the mid-scale and know the density target needed at that time. I encourage all Councilmembers to take a deep breath and recognize how important the discussion, sharing of ideas, and building trust with citizens is to our city and democracy. I honestly think citizens would be ok with any density if design and impacts could be addressed but we won't know until the zoning and codes are updated and development actually occurs.

A gentle reminder to Council that Planning Commission provided a minority report from dissenting members who believe that “This matter (mid-scale) is much too important for us to get wrong” and that Low Scale proposals will satisfy our density needs while the mid-scale can be figured out and appropriately located. Ironically, holding back mid-scale now may well mean more mid-scale in the future yet many council members seem to believe these areas must be designated now or never.

### 3. Expansion of Neighborhood Commercial

I strongly suggest Council reconsider CM McCarthy’s amendment regarding the expansion of Neighborhood Commercial nodes. As discussed at the study session, these are very small existing neighborhood commercial areas that are not supported with infrastructure for higher densities (see letters from city department earlier this year) and are located throughout existing neighborhoods. It is difficult to know what impact the Low Scale will have on Tacoma, and does not make sense to add the mid-scale densities AND expand these nodes at this time. I request Council to reconsider the Neighborhood Commercial amendment to remove the expansion areas from these nodes. (Again, I refer to the Planning Commission Minority Report.) Mid-scale would remain in the Neighborhood Commercial but please remove the expansion areas.

At a minimum, I would ask Council to remove expansion of the Neighborhood Commercial located on North Cheyenne. Unlike all the other Neighborhood Centers in Tacoma, North Cheyenne Street is an unclassified arterial, the lowest classification of street in the City with speed limits of 25mph. This does not meet the definition of mid-scale defined as ‘moderate activity and noise levels’ and ‘located on complete streets with alleys’, ‘near centers and corridors’. North Cheyenne dead ends at 31st Street, and typically has enough cars parked in the evening that either the bus or one car can get through but not both. North Gove and North Verde are absolutely not locations for this kind of development and it simply does not make sense to include additional mid-scale in this area at this time.

Mayor Woodards and City Council Members,

Thank you for all that you do to make our city of Tacoma a wonderful place to live! We appreciate all of the hard work that you have been doing over many, many months on the Home in Tacoma proposal. Like you, we understand that Tacoma's population is growing as is the demand for affordable housing. Also, we understand that the goal of the Home in Tacoma proposal is to create more affordable housing throughout our city.

Thank you also for listening to citizen input and then creating the 16 HIT amendments that were presented at the December 1, 2021 City Council meeting. We fully support all of the amendments that were passed. Yet, we were **very disappointed** that 2 of CM Connor McCarthy's amendments (F. Map Change and G. Map Change) that would remove Mid-scale transitions around Mixed-Use Centers and Neighborhood Commercial Nodes **did not pass**. We believe that both of those amendments were a step in the right direction to limit Mid-scale development within our established residential neighborhoods. Along with over 2,000 other residents, my husband and I signed the "**Save Our Neighborhoods**" petition to limit Mid-scale development. Our hope is that the City Council will revisit and pass CM McCarthy's 2 amendments in Phase 2 of Home in Tacoma.

In addition, we were disappointed that CM Robert Thoms' amendments did not pass: H. Map Change, I. Text Change and J. Text Change. We believe that if Tacoma truly values it's historic homes and neighborhoods, then stronger language needs to be written into the Phase 2 of Home in Tacoma to preserve and protect the historical uniqueness of our City. Certainly, it makes much more sense to build additional multi-family housing on vacant land (refer to the Buildable Lands Report) and repurpose existing buildings



rather than demolishing well built older homes within our neighborhoods. **The process of demolition and rebuilding not only acts to destroy the fabric of our unique neighborhoods but it is also very damaging to our environment.**

**Finally, we hope that you will increase your communication with the public as you develop Phase 2.** At this time last year, we were in the throes of a worldwide pandemic and, currently, there is no end in sight. In Pierce County, to date there have been 99,755 cases of Covid and sadly we have lost 977 of our citizens. Our state began receiving the first shipments of the life saving vaccine a year ago this month and following the adult and teenager vaccinations, only recently have children ages 5-12 been able to be vaccinated. As we all know, it's been a challenging 2 years for all of us dealing with this pandemic. Many businesses were closed for months and some permanently, many people lost their jobs and others transitioned to working from home and parents were forced to homeschool their children for many months.

So it should come as no surprise that during the constant disruptions in our daily lives during the past two pandemic years, the **2 postcards** that the City mailed out to all of its residents last spring (entitled "Help shape the future of housing in Tacoma") might have been overlooked by many of our citizens. And if it weren't for 2 of our neighbors sending out their own letter to our neighborhood (describing the Home in Tacoma rezoning proposals,) we never would have known about the implications of the Home in Tacoma city-wide rezoning. It was only through their efforts and encouragement that my husband and I attempted to learn how to join a zoom meeting (zoom being in its infancy at that time) so that we could watch the City Council zoom meetings and explore the City's website for more information about HIT. Since then, we have tried to do our best to inform other friends and neighbors about the rezoning proposals. And we've found that most of the people we talk to haven't even heard of HIT. So now that so much time has passed since the City sent out the 2 postcards, we think that it's an appropriate time for the City's graphics department to design and send out another Home in Tacoma mailer to each resident in Tacoma.

During the development of the HIT proposal, we can all admit that the **absence of in-person meetings** hasn't helped our communication with one another. Meeting virtually just isn't the same as talking face to face with one another. Citizens such as myself have been allowed to speak for 90 seconds at some City Council meetings, but we are **never allowed to ask questions that we may have about HIT**. The only way that we are able to ask questions is to take the time to email or call our Council members - which can be a very time consuming form of communication.

Here is a suggestion that I've emailed to you several times during the last few months and I believe that it's very important to the success of Home in Tacoma to mention it again: **Please send out a mailer to every Tacoma resident with information about Home in Tacoma Phase 1 and explaining the steps that will be dealt with in Phase 2. Also, (and this is critical), please include a detailed HIT rezoning MAP so that each resident will be able to see how the rezoning will affect his/her own home and neighborhood.** An informed public is important to the success of Home in Tacoma.

In your Ordinance No. 28793, it was stated that "Phase 2 beginning in early 2022 to implement the adopted policies through development of zoning, standards, infrastructure actions and other steps, informed by **broad community engagement** as well as the urgency of action to address housing needs." Broad community engagement with our City Council sounds like a good way to ensure the success of Home in Tacoma.

Thank you again for all of your hard work to create a bright future for the City we call home.

While I respect the difficult job that you do for the city of Tacoma, I am highly disappointed with how you have handled Home in Tacoma. The city has failed to properly notify the public about Home in Tacoma. A majority of my neighbors knew nothing about it until the end of once it was too late. When you are looking to rezone an entire city and are working so hard to hide it from the residents of the very city you are going to rezone one can only believe that you knew this was your only option to get away with it. I urge you to do the right thing and extend this vote to next year until the community can be actively involved. **Don't do as Council Member Hunter suggested at the special session on Wednesday, December 1<sup>st</sup>, 2021 of basically inserting verbiage to SILENCE the public.** My jaw dropped listening to her speak in this open forum. **Same with Deputy Mayor Blocker saying how he doesn't understand why we are so upset because of how far out it's going to be that it's not going to affect us. So basically we should shut up, not care, and let the council do what they want with the city.** Maybe we personally won't still be around and be affected but maybe we will as there has been no timeline given to us, however our future generations who don't have a voice right now will be here and will be affected. THIS is why we care. THIS is why we won't be silenced.

You say that this is not happening tomorrow, then why is there such a rush to cram this through this year instead of taking the proper steps and doing it right the first time? You are planning for 45,000 more families to move here and for housing for them in the future supposedly, but it has to be done urgently this month? You are not planning on the services or jobs for them. Where will they shop? Who will pick up their trash? Where will all that trash go? We don't have close to the amount of mental health services needed now, how much more will be needed with 45,000 more families here & how are you going to get that here? We will need more hospital service and hospital workers, have you planned for that? Are we just going to build the housing and fail in all the rest?

Many of the developers in this city do not currently follow the city codes and the city is doing nothing to enforce them despite many complaints. How can you ensure that with the passage of Home in Tacoma that developers will be held to the standards that are required per city code? There are not enough inspectors now, what is your plan for moving forward? You give these developers massive tax breaks to build and then they stay 1 year and sell and make a lot of profits and leave. When they sell, the property tax breaks should end. They have no investment in our neighborhoods or being good neighbors and know that the city will do nothing despite the number of codes the breaks or how many times. They will continue to be given tax breaks.

Why are we not looking at downtown? I hear of no one going downtown as it is not a vibrant, fun place to go. Build density there with retail on bottom, office space above that, & residential on top. The views you will give those families will be amazing. The access to all sorts of things will be right there and you can do it all in a small footprint. You will then bring others into the downtown area to spend money. I used to love going to downtown Seattle when I lived in Seattle. I have been in Tacoma almost three years and I think I have been downtown maybe four times and that was for specific places that just happened to be there and I didn't know until I got there that I was going downtown. I've never gone downtown for fun. Build up along the main roads like Pacific to make it look cohesive and not somewhere to avoid. Have retail in the bottom and residential above. Put in small gathering spaces like pocket parks every so far to encourage people to be out which would in turn deter crime.

Tacoma's tree canopy is the lowest in the Puget Sound region. In 2019, the City Council adopted the Urban Forest Management Plan (UFMP) for stewardship of Tacoma's trees. This plan includes increasing the tree canopy cover from approximately 20 percent by 30 percent in 2030. How will you increase the tree canopy while rezoning the entire city and taking down a good percentage of our large mature trees? Planting new trees cannot replace it. Did you even consider this? Will you commit to not cutting down trees with the Home in Tacoma project? Are you going to remove all the grass in the city and all the will be concrete driveways everywhere? If you are going to bring in 45,000 more families with cars then we will need a lot more tree canopy to help with the increase in the CO2 that will come with the increase in all those cars, especially since those cars will be gridlocked everywhere. Who is going to fix all the broken concrete from the tree roots because there is no open ground anymore?

You call this Home in Tacoma and I own a home here in Tacoma and thought it would be my forever home. For my birthday in November 2022 I will be paying it off. Sadly because of the proposals in Home in Tacoma this can't be my forever home. I can't and won't live next to what you want, mid-scale zoning next to my single family home. I purchased in a single family neighborhood because that is where I want to live. Dear City Council Members,

Thank you for a chance to share my thoughts about the latest Home in Tacoma redistricting plan.

I am pleased to see that the areas of mid-scale zoning appear to be a bit more equitably distributed between Districts 1, 2, and 3, although District 1 is obviously still receiving less mid-scale zoning than the other two districts. The change to limit the mid-scale housing to the half-block next to major arterials is a good one. My preference would be to keep all mid-scale zoning along the arterials without extending it into the neighborhoods around commercial areas. If you're not going to do it in District 1, don't do it in Districts 2 or 3 either.

I urge you to require off-street parking provision for every zone. Your vision for Tacoma sounds a lot like what Chicago looks like now. Multi-unit dwellings are common, almost ubiquitous, there, but so are the parked cars lining the streets, bumper to bumper, wherever you go. Green space is rare. This would be a very sad change for Tacoma.

I am relieved to see that my block was rezoned to low-scale. (At least it was as of Nov. 24th.) I have seen the form letters urging the council to expand the mid-scale zones from 1/2 block to a full block. Please take the time to check if each sender would be impacted by the change. How easy it is to throw someone else under the bus.

In taking time to tour the North Slope neighborhood, I noted that many of the homes there are much bigger (three stories) than they are in other neighborhoods and what is allowed in the North Slope neighborhood many not fit well with the housing elsewhere. Please take this into account.

Your desire to increase and diversify Tacoma's housing is admirable and has merit. These things are so easy to get wrong, though and there is value in a slower approach.

Thank you for your continuing work to amend the proposal to better reflect community desires. I agree with Amendment 1 and suggest the following additional changes so that the City is not overly boxed in as you move to Phase 2.

1. Strike the sentence on page 2-8 under Low Scale, second paragraph: "Secondary housing types including fourplexes and small-scale multifamily may be permitted, subject to appropriate design, locational and other standards, where they can fit harmoniously with the overall scale of the neighborhood such as corner lots, large sites or at transitions to more intensive designations. " There is no need to add this level of density to existing single-family areas and it just adds to an over-complicated zoning code. It increases the fear and objections of single-family homeowners. Please stick to a level of certainty by allowing the housing types up to triplex but not fourplex and an undefined multifamily. Those types can easily go in the mid-scale.
2. Please reconsider CM McCarthy's amendment regarding Neighborhood Commercial nodes. These are small nodes with relatively low scale development. It does not make sense to add mid-scale around them. That mid-scale is not necessary as a transition, the way it will serve well as a transition around the Mixed Use Centers.

I know that our Pacific Avenue folks have been really having a lot of issues with fires, burglaries, fire bombing, window breakage, store front doors shot out, the Wells Fargo bank had a dumpster blown up and window shot out, the business next to them had windows shot out, the dentist next to that had windows shot out. This is the tip of the iceberg of stuff happening to our businesses on Pacific Avenue from S. 56 to S. 34<sup>th</sup>. The Catering company next to Anita's Interiors closed down because of the problems with the encampment. Al has had homeless men in his own shop – one watching at the door and the other casing the building and Al told me that it looked like he was looking for a cash register. Fortunately, he does not keep one in his building.

Your business has had the windows broken many times. Our physical therapists office next to the Health Dept had to move because a fire was started in back of the building – just like you had under the eaves of one of your buildings, Big John's Trophy had a fire bomb (it's what I call it) thrown through their back store window. Had a renter nearby not heard the breakage, they would have lost their business. The tavern at the corner of Pacific and 56 has had windows broken – so much so that they have plywood on three of their windows at this time and the list goes on, and on.

THIS HAS TO STOP OR SOMEONE WILL BE SERIOUSLY HURT OR KILLED – THAT IS A MAJOR CONCERN.

Home Depot lost over 4 million last year from homeless people going in and hauling carts full of product and they don't stop them. Lowes, has had the same thing and many other stores too. And now, people are asking why prices are going up? Why stores are closing?

Dear Councilmembers:

I have been a homeowner in the North Slope Historic District for 26 years. I was prepared to ask the council to support the proposed amendments to Home in Tacoma, until I found out this evening that the amendments requested by this neighborhood were rejected, while all those from other neighborhoods were accepted. So I strongly oppose this measure in its entirety. My neighborhood is the so-called and much vaunted “missing middle;” yet, Home in Tacoma would designate about a quarter of this neighborhood as “midscale” and fair game for demolition and redevelopment. The rejected amendment would have made all the North Slope neighborhood lowscale. I am furious about this. Which developers got to you? I’m tired of this very dense neighborhood having to bear the brunt of further development and increased density while other neighborhoods are “protected” or otherwise carved out of the midscale designation.

There is no good reason to have rejected Councilmember Thoms’ proposed amendment to take 119 parcels around the perimeter of the North Slope neighborhood out of the midscale designation, unless the City wants to preserve the opportunity to upzone that part of the neighborhood. My understanding is that there was an issue with there being several commercial properties currently zoned C-1 that some councilmembers want to see become another Mixed Use Center. While we want those properties to continue to be neighborhood commercial rather than Mixed Use Center with seven or eight story apartment buildings on each corner, there was no reason not to carve those commercial parcels out of the requested amendment. The only reason is to preserve the ability to upzone a significant part of this historic neighborhood.

We have been led to believe that “we shouldn’t worry,” “none of this will really happen,” etc., etc. I don’t believe you. I feel like we have been lied to by the planning department, the Planning Commission, and much of the Council. In a conversation on the NSHD’s Facebook page, Planning Commission chair Anna Peterson (who I don’t believe lives in this neighborhood – she wouldn’t tell me where she lives when I asked) finally said the following to me in response to my contention that “midscale” would allow up to four story apartment buildings in areas that currently have single family homes or smaller multifamily:

Deborah Cade —get over the 4-stories. That is the max allowed only under special review. Most of midscale will end up with a zoning designation that will allow a max of 3 stories, if that. **Once again I will try to explain- any infill development would need to be consistent with the size and scale of the existing neighborhood. If you live in an area with single story homes then even 3 stories would not be an option under this proposal.** Midscale is not the zoning designation it is the comp plan designation. As you know, the comp plan designation for a location is much more broad than the zoning. Zoning recommendations will be made in the next phase and will go under a more detailed review and the area designated midscale will include multiple zoning designations and overlays. This is in addition to the proposed design review process and the measures to promote reuse of existing structures.

(North Slope Historic District facebook page, November 8, 2021)(emphasis added).

So who is actually telling us the truth? If what Ms. Peterson says is true, then why designate any of the North Slope neighborhood as midscale? We're being asked to "trust" when we have absolutely no reason to do so. We can look at Proctor, Sixth and Alder, and the proposed Wahlgren floral shop development and see that a single family home next door will not stop a developer from getting permits to build what ever they want next to that single family home, duplex, or other smaller building. If they want four stories, they'll get four stories.

When I moved to this neighborhood, it was zoned R4L and the city was encouraging developers to buy the homes, demolish them, and build apartment buildings in their place. There were a lot of halfway houses, DOC houses, and group homes in the neighborhood. Many of the old homes had been badly broken up into apartments. After the City listed the neighborhood as a historic district, we worked with the City planning department to develop a zoning category that was consistent with preservation of the remaining homes and the historic apartment buildings, but that would prohibit further demolition of historic buildings. Several times we have had to work with the planning department, Planning Commission, and Council to preserve this zoning designation in the face of various updates to zoning codes and the comprehensive plan.

Now the neighborhood is touted as "desirable" when homes or condos are listed for sale. And now the City is going to force at least part of this neighborhood back to a higher density zoning, which is clearly what developers want. Yes, I understand that the current proposal is the comprehensive plan. I politely did not point out to Ms. Peterson that I practiced environmental and land use law for 31 years. I happen to understand that zoning follows the comp plan and is expected to be consistent with it. Splitting our neighborhood into lowscale and midscale will result in our not being able to retain our HMR-SRD zoning that we have relied on to protect our historic buildings from demolition.

Please vote NO on Home in Tacoma.
