Reusable sandwich bags

It can be hard to pack a lunch without using disposable food storage bags, especially when you have items such as sandwiches, crackers or cut-up fruits and vegetables. But not anymore! Several retailers sell reusable snack and sandwich bags. These bags are made from food-grade fabric that can be washed and air dried and used over and over. Check with your local health food store or online retailer for availability.

A WASTE-FREE LUNCH IS



Did you know that the average lunch packed with prepackaged foods and disposable utensils costs approximately \$1.35 more per day than a lunch packed with non prepackaged foods and reusable utensils? That's a savings of \$350 every school year just for packing a waste-free lunch. Doesn't that seem like an easy way to save money?

Save your hard-earned money instead of throwing it in the garbage (literally) by following these simple money-saving tips for a waste-free lunch:

- ▶ **Use a lunchbox or reusable lunch bag.** Instead of buying something new, try using a small reusable grocery bag, a cloth gift bag or the free bag you got at the last fair or community event.
- Use a reusable ice pack instead of buying an insulated lunch bag or putting your lunch in the refrigerator.
- ▶ **Use reusable containers** (available in every shape, size and color) instead of buying items such as raisins, yogurt, carrot sticks or crackers in single-serve packages.
- ▶ **Use refillable drink bottles** instead of juice boxes/pouches or onetime use plastic bottles. Some drink bottles come with a core that you can freeze to keep beverages cold.

Reep leaves out of the street


Leaves and debris left on streets or walkways can clog storm drains and cause streets and homes to flood. City street sweeper crews do their best to target areas with the most leaves during the fall and winter, but they can't be everywhere at once, so it's up to everyone to dispose of leaves and yard waste properly and promptly.

Wondering what to do with fallen leaves?

- Use leaves as compost in your garden.
- Place leaves in your brown yard waste container for pickup.
- Take leaves and yard waste to the Tacoma Landfill (no additional fee for City of Tacoma residential customers). Please keep those loads covered!

City of Tacoma residents are responsible for collecting and disposing of leaves and other debris from their property, including the right-of-way between their sidewalk and the street.

Refresh your lawn with tagro mix

Vehicles are one of the biggest contributors to stormwater pollution that ends up in local lakes, streams and Puget Sound. Motor oil, brake dust, tire wear, tailpipe emissions and car wash residue - it all adds up.

Help reduce water pollution by regularly maintaining your car and being on the lookout for leaks.

TIP: If you spot drips coming from your vehicle, use a piece of cardboard to catch the drips until you can get them fixed. (Make sure to dispose of stained cardboard in the trash, not the recycling!)

Dishes that sparkle, naturally

Follow this simple (and inexpensive) recipe for making your own dishwasher detergent.

- 1 cup washing soda (found near baking soda at the grocery store)
- 1 cup Borax (in the laundry aisle at the grocery store)
- 1/2 cup salt
- 1/2 cup Fruit Fresh (found with food preservation products at the grocery store)
- Distilled white vinegar

Mix the first four ingredients together and store in a tightly covered glass jar or plastic container. Use 1 tablespoon per load. Add vinegar to the rinse dispenser for the best results.

Q: How do I properly dispose of leftover paint?

A: It depends on the type of paint:

Latex: If you have more than 1 inch of leftover latex paint, solidify it by stirring in an equal amount of cat litter and allow it to harden.

Then place the can in the garbage with the lid off.

Oil-based: Take leftover oil-based paint to the Household Hazardous Waste Facility (Tacoma Landfill, 3510 S. Mullen St.) for no additional charge.

Street Sweeping Schedule Wondering when the street sweepers are coming by? New reminder postcards now contain your scheduled sweeping day (printed just below the return address).

Street sweepers help keep Tacoma clean and prevent debris and pollutants from entering local waterways through storm drains.

Please do your part on your street sweeping day:

- Keep your vehicles off the street between 7 a.m. and 3 p.m.
- Remove garbage, recycling and yard waste containers from the street.
- Cut back bushes and trim branches 12-14 feet from the ground.
