Paper us proud, Tacoma

Results from a recent study revealed 1,500 tons of recyclable paper in Tacoma's residential garbage stream. Help reduce that by regularly recycling your clean paper products. Here's a review of what is and isn't allowed in your blue recycling container.

Ever wonder what's in Tacoma's garbage? You might be surprised to learn what was found during Solid Waste Management's first-ever waste composition study. Almost 25% of residential garbage was recyclable through curbside service, including paper (11%), plastic (7%), glass (3%), aluminum/tin (2%) and vard waste (1%).

What does this mean?

- **Good, with room to improve:** Most of the empty jars, jugs, boxes, cans and paper you generate on a daily basis are accepted in Tacoma's curbside recycling service. Please recycle or reuse as much as possible. www.cityoftacoma.org/recyclingreview
- Let's get to 0%: The study revealed a mere 1% each of household hazardous waste (HHW) and electronic waste (also hazardous) in the garbage stream. While these are low percentages, hazardous materials should never be put in the garbage.


Dispose HHW (medical waste, chemicals, fluorescent lights, oil-based paint, etc.) free of charge at the City's HHW Facility (Tacoma Landfill, 3510 S. Mullen St.). www.cityoftacoma.org/ hazwaste

Recycle computers and TVs free at local charities and retailers participating in E-Cycle Washington. www.ecyclewa.org

How do we compare?

Tacoma plans to repeat the waste composition study to compare improvement against current baseline stats. Pierce County conducted a similar study with similar results last year. The graph below shows how we compare.

Container gardening with TAGRO

Did you know ...

The containers (pots, trays, baskets and hangers) that your seedlings and plants come in from the nursery are not recyclable.

- Reuse them to grow your own seedlings
- Decorate and use them for smaller plants
- Check with your nursery and ask if they'll take back containers for reuse
- Throw them in the garbage



Make it fish friendly

Parking lot car wash fundraisers can send a lot of dirty soap and grime down the storm drain and into lakes, streams, rivers and Puget Sound.

Keep dirty water out of Puget Sound:

Check out a Clean Bay Car Wash Kit to direct dirty wash water into the wastewater system where it is treated, or nearby landscaping where it is filtered by the soil. For fundraisers only, not for personal use. www.cityoftacoma.org/carwashkits, (253) 502-2220

Sell car wash coupons to a commercial car wash, where dirty wash water is sent to the wastewater treatment plant. Ask your local car wash about opportunities, or contact the Puget Sound Car Wash Association.

Reduce mosquito breeding habitat

- **&** Eliminate standing water around vour house
- Change water frequently in wading pools, fountains, bird baths and pet dishes
- Make sure gutters drain properly

Prevent mosquito bites

- Make sure windows and doors are "bug tight"

Pizza boxes

Q: Can pizza boxes go in the recycling and yard waste bins?

A: No. Pizza boxes must go in the garbage. Why? It's the buttered crust, savory toppings and cheesy goodness that contaminates the box with grease and stuck-on food. All recyclables need to be clean of food residue.

Air and upholstery freshener

Ingredients:

- Clean, empty spray bottle
- Water
- Essential oil

Directions:

- Fill spray bottle a couple inches from the top with water.
- 2. Add a few drops of essential oil until the desired scent is achieved.
- 3. Mix well.
- 4. Spray on couches, mattresses, throw pillows and other upholstered items.*
- *We recommend testing this on a hidden portion of the upholstered item first.

Mark a storm drain, SAVE a FISH

What goes down storm drains isn't just rain. It's runoff from construction sites, chemicals people dump, and pollution rainwater picks up as it flows across roofs, lawns, driveways and roads.

Storm drain markers offer a reminder that what goes down Tacoma's storm drains flows directly – untreated – into Tacoma's waterways and eventually Puget Sound.

From downtown Tacoma, you can see the brick-red building that is the Center for Urban Waters along the east side of the Thea Foss Waterway. But if you take a walk along the esplanade in front of the building at 326 E. D St., you can get a close-up look that includes much more:

Views of the downtown skyline, Mount Rainier, Commencement Bay, and the Murray Morgan and state Route 509 bridges. Plus waterway activity, such as tugs and pleasure boats.

Watch for wildlife along the shoreline and in the snags. Osprey and seal pups have been spotted in the area.

Learn what makes the Center for Urban Waters a shining example of green building. New signage highlights many of the features – including the green

roof and rain garden – designed to earn a LEED Platinum rating.

Explore the Tidal Resonance Chamber, a unique rammed-earth public art project you can step into and experience the tides of the Foss Waterway.

5 ways to reuse plastic bags

1. Paintbrush preserver: To keep brushes and rollers from drying out, place them in bags,

and tie them or wrap them with rubber bands to keep out air. They will stay moist for a day or so.


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- 2. **Knee pads:** Layer a couple bags and tie them around your knees before you work in the garden; the bags act as knee pads and keep your pants clean.
- 3. **Pet waste cleanup:** Use bags as gloves to pick up pet waste and then turn the bag inside out, tie closed and dispose of the entire bag in your garbage can.
- 4. Wet umbrella protector: To avoid soaking anything important or making a wet mess, keep a plastic bag in your purse or tote to wrap around your wet umbrella.
- 5. Filler: To cut down on the amount of potting soil needed to fill large planters, crumple some bags to fill the bottom (be sure not to cover the drainage hole).

Remember to take your own reusable bags to the grocery store. That's the best way to reduce waste in the first place.

Make your own plastic bag holder by stuffing your bags into an empty cardboard tissue box. Place the holders under the sink, in the pantry or in a drawer for handy retrieval.



... the pipes that connect your home's plumbing to the City's sanitary sewer main are your responsibility to repair and maintain?

Homes constructed before 1980 are likely to have side sewers made of clay or concrete pipes. These pipes can crack, shift out of place, and/or be invaded by roots,

causing leaks or blocked pipes.

The City of Tacoma recommends hiring an inspector to check the condition of your home's side sewer if it is more than 25 years old and/or does

not have PVC pipe running from your home to the City sewer main.
