

About the Proposed Budget



Every two years, the City of Tacoma develops its budget. The two-year budget proposed for 2019-2020 is \$3.5 Billion. This includes accounts for services, such as Water, Electricity, and Solid Waste - as well as the General Fund.

The General Fund makes up only 15% or \$515 Million of the City's total proposed budget and supports most services traditionally provided by cities, like police and fire services, libraries, and street maintenance.
