TACOMA CREATES PROGRAM YEAR 2022-23

There are compelling statistics about the impact of Tacoma Creates funding in our city. In the 2022-23 program year, we allocated over 4 million dollars in contracts to more than 50 cultural organizations; they provided over 1,000 public programs and events for residents of and visitors to Tacoma.

There are also deeper and broader impacts of this public funding, such as the economic impact of cultural events, the educational benefits for both youth and adults, and the connections between a thriving cultural sector and overall community health. Tacoma Creates funding helps our local cultural organizations address barriers to participation, making more cultural programming more accessible to more people. This work plays an important role in bringing community members together, and creating positive outlets for self-expression, especially for youth.

Across the country, non-profit arts and culture organizations are facing significant structural and financial challenges. Here in Tacoma, our organizations aren't immune to these challenges, but our public investment through Tacoma Creates provides a layer of stability that is rare. This funding supports smaller and newer grassroots organizations, while also sustaining organizations that have been providing strong work in our community for decades. We are so fortunate to live in a city that values and supports our cultural sector; we do not take for granted the abundant opportunities we have to engage with arts, culture, heritage, and science programs throughout the vibrant city of Tacoma.

We are proud to share the impact of our collective investment in the cultural sector through the statistics and the stories in this report.

FUNDING PROGRAMS

Tacoma Creates funds eligible arts, culture, heritage, and science non-profit organizations in Tacoma to support their public programming work, with a focus on equity, access, and public benefit. There are two funding categories – Impact Funding and Comprehensive Organizational Support – both of which support a wide variety of public presentations, workshops, exhibitions, events, festivals, youth education programs, and lifelong learning programs for all ages.





PRIMARY FUNDING GOALS

- Support public programs in arts, culture, heritage, and/or science that engage community members in Tacoma.
- Increase access to these programs, and reduce barriers to participation, especially for historically underserved populations, and within neighborhoods across Tacoma.
- Support programming by and for culturally or ethnically specific communities, and/or other underrepresented groups.
- Expand access to youth education programs in arts, culture, heritage, and science.
- Support the sustainability of cultural sector organizations in Tacoma.



YOUTH EDUCATION PROGRAMS

CLASSES, CAMPS, OR WORKSHOPS FOR YOUTH UNDER AGE 18

Of the more than 1,000 programs offered by Tacoma Creates organizations during the 2022-23 program year, over 400 of them were Youth Education Programs. Tacoma Creates funding helped expand and grow existing programs for learning and creativity in visual and performing arts, in natural and computer sciences, and in explorations of culture and heritage.

"Our Youth Education programs were greatly helped by Tacoma Creates funding this year. We were able to grow our Saturday Academy and Homeschool Academy back to the size they were pre-pandemic and produce successful programs for approximately 320 youth during the 2022-2023 season. 90% of our Winter, Spring and Summer Camp programs sold out at 30-40 youth per production." – Tacoma Musical Playhouse

"This year, we piloted new evaluation tools to better learn from our students what they gain from our programs and to give clearer information to our staff about where we can strengthen offerings. We had break-out groups for each program so staff could discuss the survey results and identify areas for improvement together. Students report that participating in glass arts encourages them to build new skills, recognize their efforts, and practice things that are difficult. They feel it is a safe space to share ideas and opinions, that student ideas matter, that they are respected, connected, and have a sense of belonging, and that they will be successful." - Hilltop Artists



PARTNERSHIP WITH TACOMA PUBLIC SCHOOLS (TPS)

A provision in the Tacoma Creates <u>legislation</u> — the Public School Cultural Access Program — supports a commitment to working in collaboration with Tacoma Public Schools.

Tacoma Creates-supported organizations partnered with TPS in a variety of ways: programming connected to classroom curriculum during the regular school day, after school programming on site at TPS campuses, professional development opportunities for educators, and more.

CAPACITY BUILDING FOR EDUCATORS

As part of our commitment to youth education programming, Tacoma Creates supported scholarships to professional learning opportunities for educators who work with Tacoma Creates-funded organizations. Four educators received 50% scholarships to participate in the Washington State Teaching Artist Training Lab, and 19 educators received 80% scholarships to participate in the School's Out Washington Bridge Conference. These professional learning opportunities are expanding organizations' capacity to create strong, youth-centered and equity-informed programs for young people in Tacoma.





PARTNERSHIP WITH TPS (CONTINUED)

BEYOND THE BELL

Working in partnership with Tacoma Public Schools, Metro Parks Tacoma, and Greentrike, Tacoma Creates helped support after school classes through Beyond the Bell (elementary schools) and Club Beyond (middle schools). To support access for all families, these classes were offered with a "pay what you will" approach to registration.



To increase access to cultural programs, Tacoma Creates partners with TPS to cover the cost of bus transportation for school-day field trips to Tacoma Creates-supported programming. This support is open to all TPS schools, with priority given to Title 1 schools. Thousands of students from pre-school through high school attended museums, films, and live professional performances.

PARTNERSHIP WITH TACOMA PUBLIC LIBRARY (TPL)

Tacoma Creates partners with Tacoma Public Library as part of our commitment to support cultural programming in different parts of the city.

Programming included story times for young children and families, interactive workshops for teens, and presentations about arts, history, and culture for all ages.

EQUITY-FOCUSED CAPACITY BUILDING WORK

Tacoma Creates invests in equity-focused capacity building work to support individuals' knowledge and understanding, and organizations' ability and will to take action steps. We partnered with Tacoma firm Colemon and Associates to support skill-building and peer learning in <u>Justice</u>, <u>Equity</u>, <u>Diversity</u>, <u>and Inclusion</u> (<u>JEDI</u>) through a series of topic-specific JEDI workshops, a film series, and organization-specific consulting time.

31 individuals from 17 organizations attended the JEDI film series, exploring colonialism throughout history 11 hours of organizational coaching was provided on topics including leadership development and courageous conversations

Funding from Tacoma Creates supports both current programs and long-term sustainability, giving organizations the opportunity to build capacity for the future. From professional learning opportunities for staff and board members, to acquiring or upgrading equipment, and supporting new partnerships – increased organizational stability leads to stronger community programming.

COLLABORATION

Collaboration is an important aspect of sustainability and growth – co-producing events gives organizations the opportunity to learn from one another, share resources, expand networks, and ultimately create richer experiences for the community. For example, when Communities for a Healthy Bay partners with Hilltop Artists for "Fused Together" workshops at Tacoma Public Library, learning about the history and needs of Commencement Bay is enhanced by the opportunity to make glass art informed by this environmental awareness. When Tacoma Opera produces an important new work such as "Tacoma Method" and Symphony Tacoma and the Chinese Reconciliation Project Foundation produce collaborative and connected events, the impact is multiplied.
