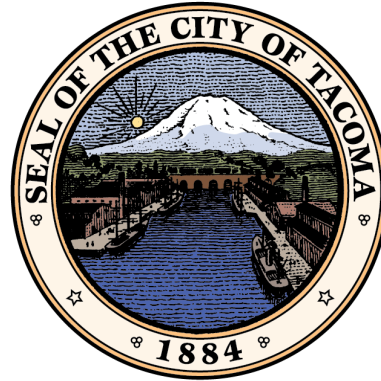


- Implementation of a 'TEMs-like' Model
 - Background checks
 - Curfew
 - Pets allowed
 - Clean and sober expectation
 - Case management services with required engagement
- Model considers
 - Community feedback
 - Compatibility with nearby affordable housing development
 - Relocation of existing units from E. 60th and McKinley
 - Possible expansion of micro-shelters (20-25 additional units)

- Implementation of S. 69th and Proctor
 - Mailers to area neighbors
 - Virtual meeting for community discussion
 - Ongoing discussions with possible providers
- Continued analysis of mitigation/stabilization sites
 - Re-evaluation of City-owned properties
 - Continued discussion with Safe Sites for All
