# **RESOLUTION NO. 40657**

A RESOLUTION relating to Economic Development; accepting a grant, in the amount of \$1,287,000, from the U.S. Economic Development Administration Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act supplemental fund, for the City's existing Revolving Loan Fund to address impacts of COVID-19 on small businesses.

WHEREAS on March 27, 2020, the United States Congress passed the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act ("CARES Act") in response to the outbreak of the novel coronavirus disease 2019 ("COVID-19"), and its resulting impact on the economy and public health across the nation, and

WHEREAS in May of 2020, City staff were contacted regarding the Economic Development Administration Supplemental Revolving Loan Fund ("RLF") funds that would be made available to assist existing RLF jurisdictions in addressing COVID-19 impacts to the business community, and

WHEREAS the RLF funds must be disbursed within a 24-month period, and jurisdictions will be able to keep loan re-payments as part of their overall RLF fund program for future uses, which will not need to be tied to COVID-19 impacts, and the administration of these funds will be performed by the Tacoma Community Redevelopment Authority, and

WHEREAS Community and Economic Development ("CED") staff surveyed applicants from the first round of COVID-19 RLF funds, including those who inquired about the loans or applied for the loans, regardless of whether they received funding or not, and

WHEREAS the survey information, along with review of a survey conducted by the Pierce County Economic Development Department, input from the Minority



Business Development Agency office, and regular participation in the Pierce County Economic Development Board weekly online discussions concerning the impacts of COVID-19 on the business community, have all informed CED staff in the preparation of the next round of RLF funding, and

WHEREAS using the non-competitive \$1,287,000 in CARES Act RLF supplemental funds, CED staff will deploy small loans of up to \$25,000 to Tacoma businesses beginning in late-September to early-October, with \$1,170,000 being distributed as micro-loans, and \$117,000 allocated toward administration and management of the program, and

WHEREAS portions of the administrative funds will be used to contract with "Community Navigators" that have a track record of assisting underrepresented businesses in accessing resources during the COVID-19 pandemic, and to build business capacity and provide technical assistance, and

WHEREAS the "Community Navigators" will work with CED staff to increase awareness of the loan funds to underrepresented businesses, assist those businesses in overcoming systemic and other barriers to applying, and direct businesses to technical assistance services to address broader issues in their ability to access capital in order to sustain or grow their business; Now, Therefore,

# **RESOLUTION NO. 40658**

### BY REQUEST OF COUNCIL MEMBERS HINES AND HUNTER

A RESOLUTION supporting responsible drone ownership through safe operation, and directing the City Manager to develop an education strategy to help connect residents to information on drone regulation and policies in Tacoma.

WHEREAS drones, or more formally, Unmanned Aerial Vehicles ("UAV"), or when they are under 55 pounds, Unmanned Aircraft Systems ("UAS"), have many regulations to ensure safe operation and ownership, and

WHEREAS regulation of UAVs falls under the authority of the Federal Aviation Administration ("FAA"), which regulates U.S. airspace and prohibits states and localities from regulating drones, in most cases, and

WHEREAS the FAA has recently adopted rules that require the registration of drones, restrict their size, and limit how high and fast they can fly, and make it easier to become a commercial drone operator, and

WHEREAS, on October 1, 2019, the City Council passed Amended
Ordinance No. 28615, updating the Park Code to add drones, "sky lanterns,"
unmanned aircraft systems, and motorized models as prohibited equipment use in
parks, except as specifically authorized by permit or the Metro Parks Director, and

WHEREAS methods of getting authorization to fly in parks and general understanding of FAA rules is lacking, and a resource to help educate and inform drone owners and residents of the FAA rules would be beneficial, and

WHEREAS the basic regulations that drone owners should be aware of, and the City can help to educate residents about, are as follows:

- Register your drone, mark it on the outside with the registration number and carry proof of registration with you;
- 2. Fly only for recreational purposes;
- 3. Fly your drone at or below 400 feet above the ground when in uncontrolled (Class G) airspace;
- 4. Obtain authorization before flying in controlled airspace (Class B, C, D, and E);
- 5. Keep your drone within your visual line-of-sight, or within the visual line-of-sight of a visual observer who is co-located (physically next to) and in direct communication with you;
- 6. Do not fly at night unless your drone has lighting that allows you to know its location and orientation at all times;
- 7. Give way to and do not interfere with manned aircraft;
- 8. Never fly over any person or moving vehicle;
- Never interfere with emergency response activities such as disaster relief, any type of accident response, law enforcement activities, firefighting, or hurricane recovery efforts;
- Never fly under the influence of drugs or alcohol. Many over-the-counter medications have side effects that could impact your ability to safely operate your drone; and
- 11. Do not operate your drone in a careless or reckless manner, and

WHEREAS developing an educational campaign and establishing a website or similar resource to provide information and links from the FAA website locally can help businesses that sell drones to be aware of the regulations, so they can inform their customers, and

WHEREAS this educational campaign comes from hearing from residents who have witnessed unsafe usage of drones, and from residents who have drones but were surprised to learn of the many regulations of drone usage, even recreationally, and



WHEREAS all residents will potentially be affected by this policy, but it is directed at those who regularly use drones for photos or business purposes or recreationally, such as families or younger residents flying for fun; Now, Therefore,

### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TACOMA:

That the City Council supports responsible drone ownership through safe operation, and hereby directs the City Manager to develop an education strategy to help connect residents to information on drone regulation and policies in Tacoma.
