2 continuing the Downtown Tacoma Business Improvement Area ("BIA") for
3 the 36th year, providing for levy assessments and other income, in the
4 amount of \$1,688,340; and approving the renewed BIA annual work plan
and budget, and assessment of rates from May 1, 2023, through April 30,
2024.

5 WHEREAS the Downtown Tacoma Business Improvement Area ("BIA"), at
6 their annual meeting on February 23, 2023, approved their annual budget, work
7 program, and assessment rates, and

8 WHEREAS this resolution will authorize the levy of the 36th year of the
9 renewed BIA annual assessment upon buildings and other real estate within the
10 BIA boundaries for the period of May 1, 2023, through April 30, 2024, and

11 WHEREAS the BIA assesses each ratepayer for two categories, a Use Rate
12 and a Land Rate, with the Use Rate split into High Intensity Use Rate and Low
13 Intensity Use Rate, and

14 WHEREAS the High Intensity Use Rate is assessed to improved property,
15 and the Low Intensity Use Rate to undeveloped and surface area parking lots, with
16 the Land Rate applying to all parcels, and

17 WHEREAS the assessment rates for the 36th year of the BIA will be \$0.14
18 per square foot for the High Intensity Use Rate, \$0.07 for the Low Intensity Use
19 Rate, and \$0.06 for the Land Rate, and

20 WHEREAS the income collected is projected to be 4 percent higher than the
21 previous year due to the increase in rates as well as new developments within the
22 BIA boundary, and

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WHEREAS total expenditures are projected to increase by 1 percent, to \$1,683,600; the difference between expenses and income will be funded through the BIA Reserve Fund held at the City; Now, Therefore,

4 WHEREAS the McKinley Hill neighborhood rates "very low" in the City's
5 Equity Index, which means that the neighborhood generally has quality-of-life
6 disparities due to barriers and obstacles to opportunity within the area, and

7 WHEREAS the McKinley Hill Neighborhood Plan ("Plan") is a guiding
8 document outlining community-identified projects, ideas, and actions to enhance
9 and strengthen the neighborhood, and

10 WHEREAS the Plan reflects a multi-year and multi-faceted program
11 focused on "on-the-ground" implementation of City policies and community
12 priorities, and

13 WHEREAS the primary goals of the Plan fall into four categories:
14 (1) business district vitality – a strong business district with a unique sense of
15 place, (2) transportation – safe, accessible connections for all modes, (3) open
16 space – active spaces that contribute to neighborhood identity, and
17 (4) development – growth that adds options for food, housing, and services, and

18 WHEREAS the Plan includes specific actions that support each of these
19 goals, a summary of how these recommendations support and/or implement
20 other key City policy documents, a summary of community engagement, and a
21 detailed plan for implementation and action matrix, and
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WHEREAS on February 22, 2023, the Infrastructure, Planning, and Sustainability Committee voted to recommend the Plan to the full City Council; the Planning Commission was also engaged in the development and review of the Plan, and recommended its approval on February 1, 2023; Now, Therefore,

3 A RESOLUTION authorizing the one-time use of funds in the amount of \$10,000,

6 WHEREAS the Asian Pacific Cultural Center (“Center”) is planning their first
7 Khmer New Year celebration, which will showcase Cambodian arts, crafts, history,
8 food and drinks, clothing, storytelling, cooking, language, and more at the Center on
9 April 1, 2023, and

10 WHEREAS Cambodian people from all over the state will be participating in
11 the event at which their proud heritage will be showcased, and at the same time,
12 the general public will learn about Cambodian history and culture, and will have the
13 opportunity to join in craft making, game playing, and Cambodian food and drinks,

16 WHEREAS the Center is subsidizing the event by providing staffing, the

22 City’s standard event grant application timeline, and this request is intended to
23 provide a one-time opportunity for contingency funds to support this annual event in

3 A RESOLUTION authorizing the one-time use of funds in the amount of \$12,500,
4 budgeted from the Council Contingency Fund, to install wheelstops along
5 the east side of South "D" Street, from South 72nd Street to South 74th
6 Street.

7 WHEREAS, until recently, the area between South 72nd Street and South
8 74th Street, on the east side of the street, was a gravel-covered right-of-way with a
9 history of encampments, litter and dumping, and graffiti along a retaining wall, and

10 WHEREAS for years, neighbors around South "D" Street, between South
11 72nd Street and South 74th Street have requested that the City make infrastructure
12 investments in the area to deter negative behavior and enhance the sense of space
13 and community, and

14 WHEREAS the South End Neighborhood Council ("SENCO") has long
15 advocated for investment along this street, and in recent months has taken a
16 leadership role in finding funding and community partners to create positive change,
17 which has included applying for and receiving grants for planting trees and for a
18 40 foot mural along the retaining wall, and

19 WHEREAS through a partnership with the City's Environmental Services
20 depave program, select gravel areas have been removed and replaced with Tagro
21 where trees will be planted, and

22 WHEREAS this request would fund wheelstops to act as semi-permanent
23 curbing to protect the newly planted trees, and maintain this area as a positive
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1 space for the community, which is especially important as the new trees establish
2 themselves, and

3 WHEREAS SENCO volunteers have organized the planting of over 30 street
4 trees, and are asking the City to partner by providing a semi-permanent curbing
5 option that would help preserve this investment and improve health outcomes for
6 the community, and

8 WHEREAS this location is in an area that ranks “very low” on the City’s
9 Equity Index, and this score mirrors known data on the reduced tree canopy cover
10 in the South End of the City, and acknowledges the health impacts and increased
11 temperatures of neighborhoods with fewer trees, and

13 WHEREAS SENCO also received a grant to host a block party this summer
14 to celebrate this space and bring the community together, and

15 WHEREAS, at the March 14, 2023, Study Session, Council
16 Member Bushnell shared a Council Consideration Request to authorize the one-
17 time use of \$12,500 from the Council Contingency Fund to install wheelstops along
18 South “D” Street, from South 72nd Street to South 74th Street on the east side of
19 the street, and

21 WHEREAS City staff will negotiate and execute an agreement for services,
22 with terms and deliverables for the City’s contribution, and

24 WHEREAS RCW 35.34.250 and 35.34.260 authorize a withdrawal from the
25 Council Contingency fund for any municipal expense, the necessity or extent of

3 A RESOLUTION authorizing the one-time use of funds in the amount of \$10,000,
4 budgeted from the Council Contingency Fund, to support the creation and
5 distribution of 500 care bags with essential hygiene items to youth and
6 young adults in the City.

7 WHEREAS the Raising Girls non-profit organization (“Raising Girls”), as a
8 trusted community resource, partners with schools and local organizations to
9 address hygiene insecurity and period poverty by providing and distributing care
10 bags with essential products to elementary, middle, and high school students and
11 young adults in need, in the Puget Sound area, and

12 WHEREAS Raising Girls believes that timely and reliable access to hygiene
13 and period supplies is vital for the health and well-being of young people, and along
14 with having access to essential hygiene products, aims to ensure that every youth
15 they serve feels pride in who they are and understands the power they have to be
16 unique individuals who can make a difference, and

17 WHEREAS, in 2022 alone, Raising Girls delivered 4,700 care bags, serviced
18 nine school districts, supported 74 schools, and had over 250 volunteers, and

19 WHEREAS as a City-based non-profit, Raising Girls fulfills requests for care
20 bags of hygiene products for girls and boys across 34 elementary, middle, and high
21 schools in the City of Tacoma, with a focus on those that have the highest census
22 of homeless and transitional students, as well as distributing care bags through a
23 number of City non-profits, community networks, and after school programs, and
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1 WHEREAS the care bags contain essential full-sized hygiene items, such as
2 sanitary pads, tampons, body wash, lotion, combs, shampoo, conditioner,
3 toothbrushes, toothpaste, washcloths, deodorant, scarves, hair brushes, nail polish,
4 lip balm/gloss, socks, and more, and

5 WHEREAS the bags are customized to meet the needs of students who may
6 or may not be menstruating, and each bag includes a handwritten inspiration card
7 from a caring adult, reinforcing their aim for each recipient to feel personal power
8 and pride in themselves, and

9 WHEREAS the requested funding would support the purchase of materials
10 for 500 individual care bags that can be made available to youth in the City, and by
11 supporting the purchase of items for Raising Girls to distribute, it becomes possible
12 to eliminate humiliation, promote pride, and share love to thousands of youth in the
13 community, and

14 WHEREAS providing essential items by way of care packages to
15 underserved and vulnerable populations helps to achieve equity of access to
16 essential hygiene products and messages of adult caring, advancing the City's goal
17 to be a city where everyone is able to reach their full potential, and

18 WHEREAS, at the March 14, 2023, Study Session, Deputy Mayor Walker
19 shared a Council Consideration Request to authorize the one-time use of \$10,000
20 from the Council Contingency Fund to support the creation and distribution of 500
21 care bags with essential hygiene items to youth and young adults in the City, and

22 WHEREAS City staff will execute a one-time donation in support of Raising
23 Girls "One Bag Drive", and
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WHEREAS RCW 35.34.250 and 35.34.260 authorize a withdrawal from the Council Contingency fund for any municipal expense, the necessity or extent of which could not have been foreseen or reasonably evaluated at the time of adopting the budget, and

3 A RESOLUTION authorizing the one-time use of funds in the amount of \$5,000,
4 budgeted from the Council Contingency Fund, to sponsor the Mayor's Youth
5 Commission of Tacoma 2023 Youth Summit.

6 WHEREAS the Mayor's Youth Commission of Tacoma ("Commission") was
7 formally established by Resolution No. 40502 in December of 2019, after a year of
8 outreach and development with young people on what they would want to see in a
9 youth-focused commission, and

10 WHEREAS since then, the Commission has engaged with students and
11 organizations across the City to address such topics as youth mental health,
12 climate change, public safety in schools, and leadership development, and

13 WHEREAS the Commission has worked closely with contracted partners
14 through the Foundation for Tacoma Students ("Foundation"), which has provided
15 general support, facilitation, and education for the Commission, and

16 WHEREAS since the Foundation's inaugural "Charting our Future"
17 conference in 2021, the Commission has hosted a panel or learning track
18 specifically for young people to engage with, and

19 WHEREAS this year, following participation in the "Charting our Future"
20 conference on May 4th, the Commission will host a half-day youth summit
